### Background

The Wellington City Council Pacific Advisory Group (PAG) is one of five Council community advisory groups providing a broad range of advice and connection to specific Wellington communities.

PAG brings its Pacific knowledge and insight into Council on how the needs of Wellington's Pacific communities can be addressed in the context of Council's roles and priorities.

While PAG is not seen as representing all Pacific people in the City, members utilise their significant support and leadership roles within their ethnic and local communities to enhance the responses and services the Council provide.

PAG's membership includes representatives from; Samoa, Cook Islands, Fiji, Melanesia, Micronesia, Niue, Tonga, Tokelau and Tuvalu.

### Introduction

This Annual Report covers the engagements and activities undertaken by the Wellington City Council Pacific Advisory Group (PAG) for the period July 2022 – June 2023.

This past year has seen outgoing members, as well as a broad range of topics discussed and presented at PAG.

We have been working to embed and maintain a strategic approach to advising and supporting the Wellington City Council (WCC), especially following the 2020 Review of the Advisory Groups.

We have contributed to various council strategies, plans and consultations, and have fed back Council information to our respective communities.

We have maintained our practise of building whanaungatanga in our agenda format, continuing to share knowledge and information about our respective cultures and selves, to build and strengthen our relationships not only amongst members, but also with Council staff and those who engage with PAG. It sets the tone for the meeting and helps to build effective partnerships and stronger engagement.

We acknowledge our outgoing PAG members for this past year, and are grateful for their contributions, time, and support. They have been strong advocates for PAG, and we will continue to build on the momentum that they helped to build.

We are also excited to welcome our new/incoming PAG members and are especially pleased to fill what has been a long vacant position for the Micronesia community.

PAG continues to build on the recommendations that the Advisory and Reference Group Review report of June 2020, including:

- Continued support co-designing alongside Council staff, to shape PAG work programs
- Continued consistency of democracy officer representation
- Attendance at PAG meetings by a senior Council staff officer.

A previous recommendation PAG have made to Council, is about closing the feedback loop, back to PAG. It has often been the case that PAG have provided insights and feedback on Council consultations and presentations, but it has been unclear if and how those insights and feedback from PAG have been taken into account. We would encourage Council to promote proactive use of the feedback loop process that PAG understands was established i.e. a feedback form for Council staff to complete, after presenting to PAG.

We thank Council and staff who have proactively engaged with PAG as early as possible in the co-design process for strategies and plans, so that Pasifika perspectives are actively considered and incorporated.

# Pacific Advisory Group Work Programme – 2023-24

## Introduction

The Pacific Advisory Group terms of reference requires an annual work programme to be developed and presented to the relevant Council committee once a year. The work programme will be determined jointly between the Pacific Advisory Group, Council officers, chair of the appropriate Council committee, and the Councillor liaisons.

The work programme is set out below and highlights key areas of work that the Pacific Advisory Group will contribute to over the 2023-24 fiscal year.

## Purpose

As per the advisory group terms of reference, the purpose of the Pacific Advisory Group is to:

- Advise Council on how to help grow a great City, where Pasifika peoples thrive and contribute to Council's priorities.
- Bring knowledge and extra insight into Council about how the different needs of Wellington's Pasifika communities can be addressed in the context of Council's roles and priorities.
- It is recognised that members come from and remain connected to their communities, it is from this foundation members share their expertise and lived experience in this advisory role and engage with their communities and others as part of the wider council consultation processes. The expectations around this connection are set out in the *Communication and Involvement of communities* points [in the terms of reference].

## Draft work programme:

In the 2023-24 year, the Pacific Advisory Group will contribute to Council projects and priorities in the following areas:

- Fale Malae developments
- Sports fields and recreation centres
- Water infrastructure including the impact of the Three Waters Water Reform
- Public transport, bike network engagements and Let's Get Wellington Moving
- Long-term Plan engagement
- Digital City Model/Digital Twin
- District Plan
- Climate Change mitigation and adaptation
- Economic Development
- Pasifika Festival

Additionally, the Pacific Advisory Group has the following areas of interest:

- Pacific Migration into Wellington – support for employment and connectivity to city services offered by WCC
- Support for Pacific language weeks led by the Ministry of Pacific Peoples
- Internal WCC progress including support for Pasifika staff and machinery of Wellington City Council

- Elections – supporting Pacific engagement for both the General election and local elections in partnership with the Electoral Commission
- Newtown Festival

This work programme is not prescriptive and the group may work on projects outside of these priorities.
