## YOUTH COUNCIL ANNUAL REPORT 2012

#### 1. Purpose of report

To report on the work and achievements of the Wellington Youth Council (WYC) in 2012. The WYC's Annual Report for 2012 is attached as Annex 1.

#### 2. Executive summary

The WYC has written its own Annual Report for 2012, which is attached as Annex 1.

The WYC is positive about 2012, which it views as a "step up" from 2011. It has produced significantly more advice and has developed an ongoing work programme.

The WYC considers that it is engaging actively and well with WCC's decision making processes. The next step for the WYC is to improve its engagement with Wellington youth.

The Wellington Youth Council (WYC) is an advisory group set up under a Terms of Reference (TOR)<sup>1</sup> to inform the work and activities of the Wellington City Council (WCC). The purpose of the WYC is to:

- provide WCC with a youth perspective on the range of issues covered by WCC, as well as issues relating directly to youth;
- build young people's knowledge of WCC processes to enable them to participate in WCC's decision-making processes; and
- build WCC's knowledge of the needs of young people in Wellington City and how these can best be met.

The TOR, which were revised in March 2011 following a 2010 review of WCC advisory groups, require the WYC to report annually on the "work it has undertaken, attendance and number of meetings held, the group's achievements and any issues or initiatives it wishes the Council to consider further."

The WYC's report for 2012 is attached as Annex 1. It contains responses to the reporting requirements set out in the TOR.

The WYC is positive about 2012, which it views as a "step up" from 2011. It has produced significantly more advice and has developed an ongoing work programme. It has continued to improve its systems and practices.

The WYC considers that it is now engaging actively and well with WCC's decision making processes. The next step for the WYC is to improve its engagement with Wellington youth. It plans to start working on this in 2013 by:

- interviewing university students to develop advice on how to help 'flatting youth' be prepared for emergencies
- developing relationships with youth organisations that work with 'hard-toreach' youth

## Annual report for the Wellington Youth Council

The Wellington Youth Council (Youth Council) is an advisory group set up under a Terms of Reference<sup>2</sup> to inform the work and activities of the Wellington City Council (WCC). The purpose of the Youth Council is to:

- provide WCC with a youth perspective on the range of issues covered by WCC, as well as issues relating directly to youth
- build young people's knowledge of WCC processes to enable them to participate in WCC's decision-making processes
- build WCC's knowledge of the needs of young people in Wellington City and how these can best be met.

This annual report is for the 2012 calendar year and is organised under the following main headings:

- Overall assessment 2012
- Governance and administration
- Member inductions and development
- Communications
- Achievements

### **Overall assessment 2012**

Overall, the Youth Council believes that its work in 2012 has stepped up from 2011. It credits this to improved systems and practices, particularly its use of working groups.

The Youth Council considers that it is now engaging actively and well with WCC's decision making processes. It almost doubled the number of submissions it produced in 2012 compared with 2011, and made oral submissions for the first time in a number of years.

The next step for the Youth Council is to improve its engagement with Wellington youth. It plans to start working on this in 2013 by:

- interviewing university students to develop advice on how to help 'flatting youth' be prepared for emergencies
- developing relationships with youth organisations that work with 'hard-to-reach' youth

#### Governance and administration

This section reports on the support the WCC provides, and on membership and meetings over the course of 2012.

#### Support

Simon Wright and Rekha Jatav from the Consultation and Engagement team have provided strategic, operational and administrative support and guidance to

the Youth Council. The Youth Council has appreciated the regular attendance and advice of Cr Simon Marsh.

#### Membership

A list of Youth Council members as at November 2012 is set out in Appendix 1. Fifteen people applied to join the Youth Council during the annual recruitment drive and 10 new members were appointed in February 2012 to bring the Youth Council to its full complement of twenty members. Four members resigned over the course of the year and 2 members have decided not to seek further terms in 2013.

The figures in Appendix 2 show that the 2012 Youth Council had good diversity and balance of membership against most of the criteria set out in its Terms of Reference. In 2013, mainly younger members need to be appointed.

The Youth Council has improved its recruitment processes. During the 2011-12 recruitment drive, 15 applications were received. After appointing 10 new members, the diversity and representativeness of the Youth Council improved. The 2012-13 recruitment drive started in October. By 26 November 2012, 30 applications had been received. Applications close on 11 February. The Youth Council has successfully targeted Year 10, 11 and 12 students by writing to schools.

#### Number of meetings and attendance

The Youth Council met 23 times in 2012. A record of agenda topics and meeting attendance is contained in Appendix 3.

#### Member inductions and development

The 2010 review of advisory groups found that better induction processes were needed to improve the effectiveness of the Youth Council and its ability to provide relevant advice. In addition, Youth Council members should have opportunities to develop their capacity to perform their role over the course of a year. Towards these ends, the following activities took place in 2012:

- Induction sessions were held over the course of 3 meetings in March and April and include a game that identified WCC functions, services and budgets. Jane Patterson, the Manager of the Consultation and Engagement team, provided an overview of the WCC's advisory groups and of the role of the Youth Council. Cr Marsh presented on formal roles of councillors and officers, and on the WCC's policy and decision making processes
- One member took part in the Human Rights Commission's National Youth Forum on Cultural Diversity with the Mayor's rangatahi, Alex Michael Taniwha. The forum was held in Auckland in August.
- One member attended the Youth Forum on regional governance in Porirua, hosted by the Independent Panel on Wellington Region Local Government Review
- Two members attended the Festival for the Future 2012 at Te Papa in November

#### **Communications**

With the help of Richard MacLean from the Communications and Marketing team, the Youth Council began to actively develop a media profile in 2012. To support this, it further developed its Communications Policy.

The Youth Council achieved prominent coverage in the Dominion Post and on radio about its proposal for an adult playground in Wellington. It achieved national coverage on radio networks and on Prime News regarding its position on national alcohol policy.

The Youth Council signalled in its last Annual Report that it would like to begin publishing an e-newsletter in 2012. Instead of doing this, it further developed its Facebook page.<sup>3</sup> The Youth Council appointed a member to administer it. By regularly updating and refreshing it, particularly with WCC content publicising Wellington, the number of people who 'like' the page has grown by 12% to 514.

#### Achievements

This section summarises some of the Youth Council's achievements in 2012, including information about the advice it has given, the work programme it has developed, and its improved systems and work practices.

#### Advice

The Youth Council provided advice on a wide range of topics to Wellington City Council and other bodies. This is detailed in Appendix 4 and included:

- 7 written submissions to WCC
- 2 oral submissions to WCC
- Early advice to WCC officers on 4 topics
- 2 written submissions to the Greater Wellington Regional Council
- 1 written submission to the Independent Panel on Wellington Region Local Government Review
- 1 written submission to Central Government

In 2011, the Youth Council produced at total of 6 written submissions. With 11 written submissions completed in 2012, this output almost doubled. In addition to this, it should also be noted that the Youth Council made 2 oral submissions to WCC. This is something that has not happened before during the tenure of any of the current members.

#### Work programme planning

The Youth Council went through a comprehensive process to develop its work programme in mid-2012. This was done by reviewing activity across all the WCC's portfolio areas and then prioritising the findings down to a manageable number of themes. The Youth Council will be working on the following themes into 2013:

- Youth and economic development
- Youth-focused civics work
- Youth and Emergencies

- Youth discounts
- Adult playground

#### Improved systems and practices

The Youth Council has greatly improved its productivity over the last two years by improving its systems and practices. In 2011, the Youth Council started forming working groups to progress work between meetings and it started a 'portfolio' system to monitor issues and activities across the WCC's portfolios. In 2012, the use of these work practices intensified and paid dividends in terms of the amount of advice produced and in the development of its own work programme (see sections above).

In addition to working groups and the portfolio system, the Youth Council further improved its systems and practices during 2012 by using online services to:

- Store, share and modify documents
- Schedule ad hoc working groups meetings
- Enable discussion and decision-making between formal meetings.

The Youth Council would like to acknowledge and thank Loomio for the free use of its online discussion and decision-making tool.
