2.1 Long-term Plan Amendment and 2025/26 Annual Plan Process

- 1. **Receive** the information.
- 2. **Note** that the driver for the LTP amendment is the Council decision of 10 October not to proceed with the sale of Wellington International Airport shares and establish a PIF, and the process, scope and focus of the work programme outlined in this paper has been integrated with the annual plan programme to achieve that.
- 3. **Note** that Council's Water Services Delivery Plan options and the impact of reduced NZTA funding will also be included in the 2025/26 Annual Plan / LTP amendment process as per the committee paper of 26 September.
- 4. **Note** that the 10 October Notice of Motion paper included a series of principles that will be used to develop options for the review of the capital programme, and these are outlined in the paper.
- 5. **Note** the principles are being used to develop options to reduce the capital works programme in the early years of the LTP including the impact of reduced National Land Transport Programme (NLTP) revenue.
- 6. **Agree** to delay the review of the rating base (Land value or Capital value) until after the 2024-34 LTP amendment. Recommendations following the review of the rating base will be used to inform the 2027-37 LTP.

- 9. Agree that a key consideration of a 'disaster resilience fund' should be to minimise overheads and management costs
- 10. Agree that officers provide advice on high level options for a fund by December, including advice on:
 - a. fund structures and objectives and associated management costs
 - b. fund capitalisation (including advice on ground leases and carbon credit holdings)
 - c. how the fund might work alongside current insurance roadmap work.

2.2 Local Water Done Well. Water Reform - Regional Joint Water Services Model and Evaluation Objectives

Water Services Delivery Plan requirements

- 2) **Note** that council is required to submit a Water Services Delivery Plan to the Secretary for Local Government by 3 September 2025 and that this plan will be binding.
- 3) **Note** that the Local Government (Water Services Preliminary Arrangements) Act 2024 provides alternative decision making and consultation arrangements that Councils must use when considering the future water services delivery model

- Note that under these arrangements Council <u>must</u> consider and consult on the (enhanced) status quo and the proposed or anticipated model, and <u>may</u> consider and consult on additional options if it chooses to.
- 5) **Note** that the option to establish a water services CCO would involve transferring the ownership of water assets to an independent water entity (in which WCC would have a shareholding interest).
- 6) **Note** that the consultation on the options to establish a new water services entity, will take place in conjunction with the broader 2025 LTP amendment activity.

Regional collaboration

- 7) **Note** that on 14 March 2024 Council agreed to adopt the non-binding MoU to jointly investigate a water service delivery plan with the other councils in the region.
- 8) **Note** the attached *Recommended regional approach to a joint Water Services Delivery Plan and delivery model report* ('the report') is the result of the work so far on this joint regional option.
- 9) **Agree** to continue with the regional process to develop a joint regional option for a water services CCO.

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LTP Amendment and 2025/26 Annual Plan

Updated process and timeline

Background

- On 26 September, paper was presented to K
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 end Performance Committee on the 2025-26 Annual Plan's (Year 2) initial approach this included:
 - Key dates, Early planning assumptions
 - Uncertainties impacting the Annual Plan including WIAL shares sale, Local Water Done Well, and NZTA transport funding
- On 10 October, Council voted and agreed a NOM to amend the 2024-34 LTP, aiming to stop the sale of WIAL shares and halt related work.
- Following the NOM decision the Council's underlying risks remain unmitigated i.e. an undiversified investment portfolio and the increasing underinsurance risk.
- We are now required to do an amendment of the LTP along with the Annual Plan for 2025/26.



Where we are at now

- We have now:
 - incorporated the LTP amendment process into the 24/25 annual plan timeline
 - as part of the LTP amendment process to revise our financial strategy, we propose reviewing and reducing the LTP capital programme
 - Proposed principles to guide that review
- The aim of the capital programme review is to free up borrowing headroom to manage the risk of an undiversified investment portfolio and the increasing underinsurance risk.



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Capital Programme Review-Guiding Principles

- Changes/reductions to the capital programme are required over the full term of the LTP
- The 10 October Council paper outlined the following principles to guide changes to the capital programme:
 - Prioritise the maintenance and renewals of existing assets over upgrading or building new. Reductions to the capital programme should avoid further reducing renewals expenditure. The LTP renewals expenditure is set at 75% of unconstrained renewal funding (apart from water) for year 1 to 10 (note: and this a matter of emphasis by the auditor);
 - Continue projects that are substantively in train (i.e., contractually committed and spend well advanced)
 - Ensure that the Council meets its legislative and regulatory requirements;
 - Early savings should be prioritised (they have more significant impacts on operating costs) and
 - Projects part funded from development contributions (DCs) could move to later in the LTP period. (Note: if removed from the plan entirely, DCs would need to be returned and/or the DC policy may need amending



Financial Strategy

- Through the LTP Amendment the Council will need to update its Financial Strategy to manage its risks an undiversified investment portfolio and the increasing underinsurance risk.
- This will involve reviewing the insurance headroom held within the debt/revenue ratio and the Council's debt capacity.
- The amount of insurance headroom, debt capacity and the deb/revenue ratio limit are all considerations when assessing financial prudence.
- Some of the other parameters for assessing financial prudence include:
 - Condition and performance of assets
 - Balanced budget considerations
 - Depreciation funding
 - · Debt and credit ratings
 - Insurance risks
 - Climate change & unplanned events
 - Rates affordability
- Further advice will be provided at the 12th November workshop regarding financial prudence.

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Insurance Roadmap

The proposed establishment of a PIF was only one component of managing Council's insurance risks. The Insurance Roadmap endorsed by Council's Audit and Risk Committee includes other options to help mitigate the underinsurance risk.

Traditional insurance is not sufficient to manage the Council's risk, and several alternative risk transfer methods are being investigated.

Some of the work being done through the Insurance Roadmap includes:

- Loss Modelling this will update our understanding of the amount of coverage required in a 'worst case' scenario.
- Climate Risk Assessment research/develop scenarios for a physical risk assessment of climate related risks and opportunities.
- Assess alternative risk transfer options captive insurance vehicles and catastrophe bonds.



Next steps

- Two workshops in November:
 - 12 November: Financial prudence / insurance
 - 13 November: Capital programme review
- Committee will review and consider the capital programme on 21 November.
- Decisions from this meeting will help build both the amended LTP budget and the 2025/26 Annual Plan budget, which will be presented on 11 December.
- The following slide outlines the timeline and key dates between 21 November 2024 to 26 June 2025 (adoption date).
