



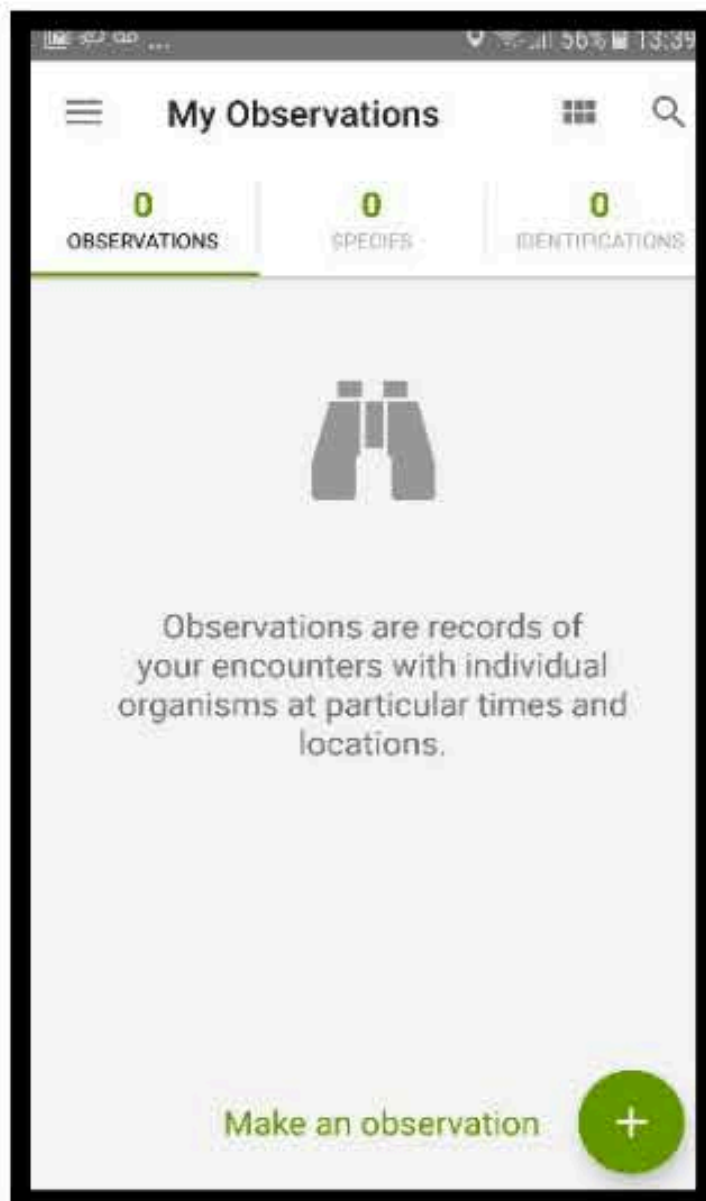

# How to use iNaturalist



Guide to making your first wildlife record on the iNaturalist app - for **Android** phone users

Use iNaturalist to record wildlife! It's great way to learn more about about the nature you see. It can also help scientists and conservationists get a better understanding of where our wildlife is.



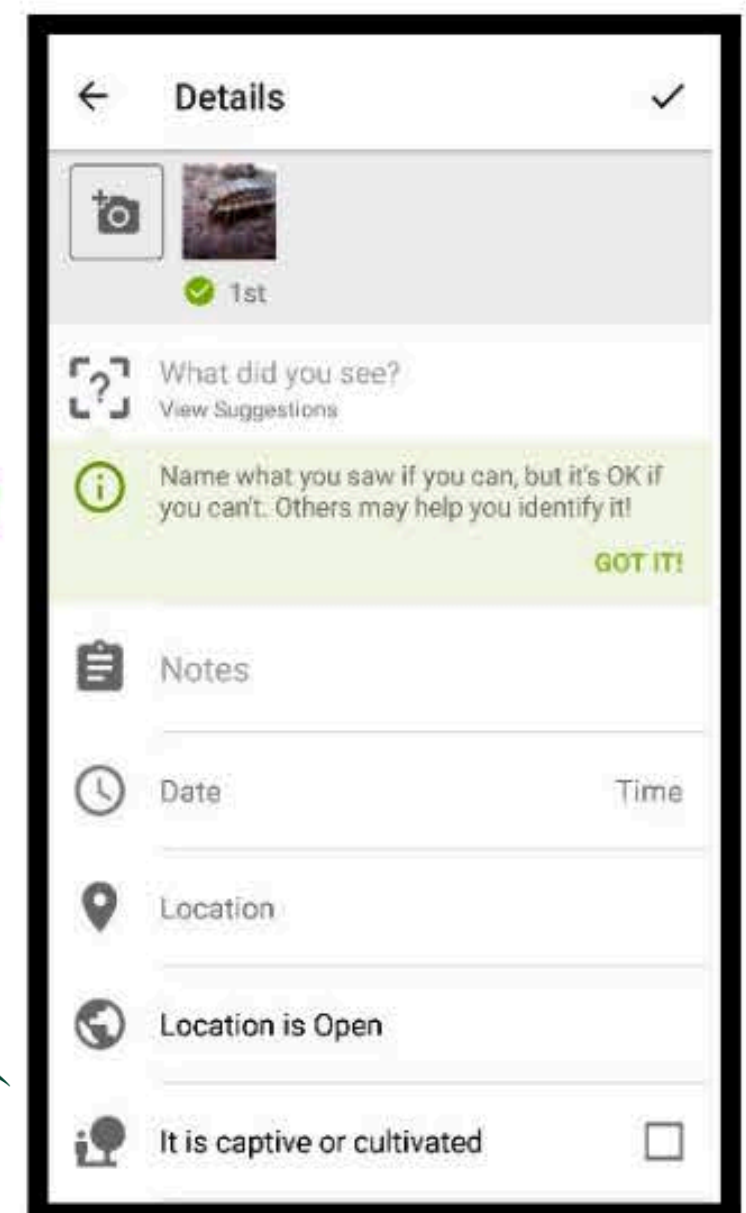
## Step 1: Uploading a picture or sound

**Download the free iNaturalist app** onto your mobile device & **log in** or create an account.

**Press the + icon.** You can choose to **take a photograph**, upload an image, or record a sound of wildlife.



**Select "What did you see"** to see what iNaturalist suggests! **Choose the best match**, or type in the name of a species. Don't worry if you're not sure - other iNaturalist users will verify your record.



If you are happy with the match **press "select"**, or go back (arrow in top left) to choose something else.

**Top tip!** You can add up to 4 photos per record. More photos make it easier for experts to confirm your sighting. Remember to take photos from different angles, and include photos of different and distinctive parts. For example, if you're recording a plant, take pictures of the flower or fruit, and the leaves.

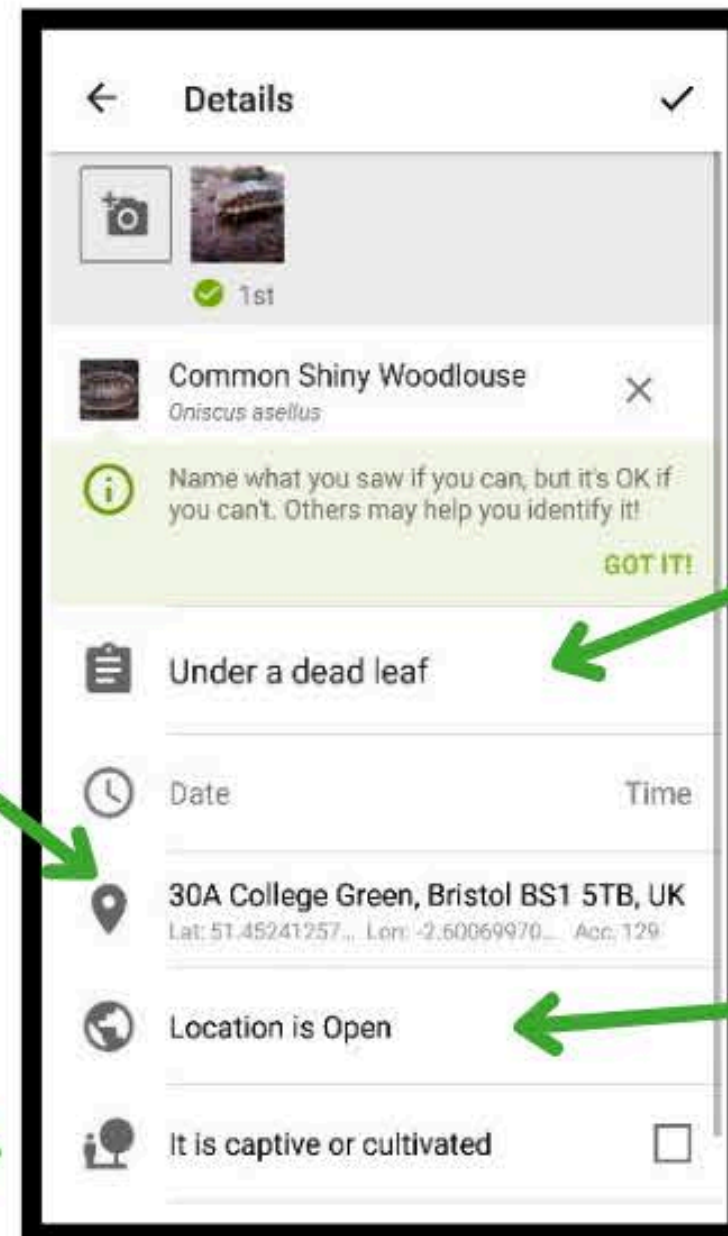
## Step 2: Check the details



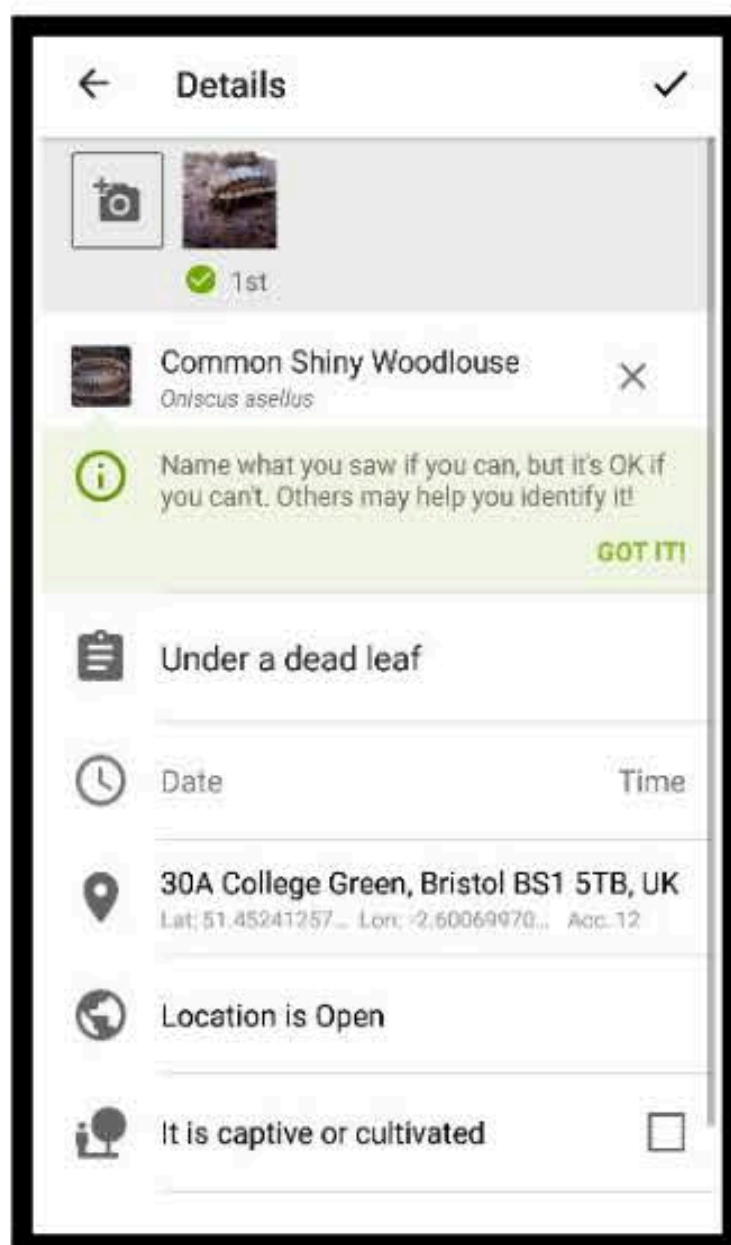
Check the location is correct. Click to see map and change the location if needed

Optional. Any extra comments that you want to share about your observation.

Select this box if your observation is **captive or cultivated**. For example, if it is a pet or something you are growing in a pot



Optional. If you do not wish the exact location public, you can change this to 'obscured'

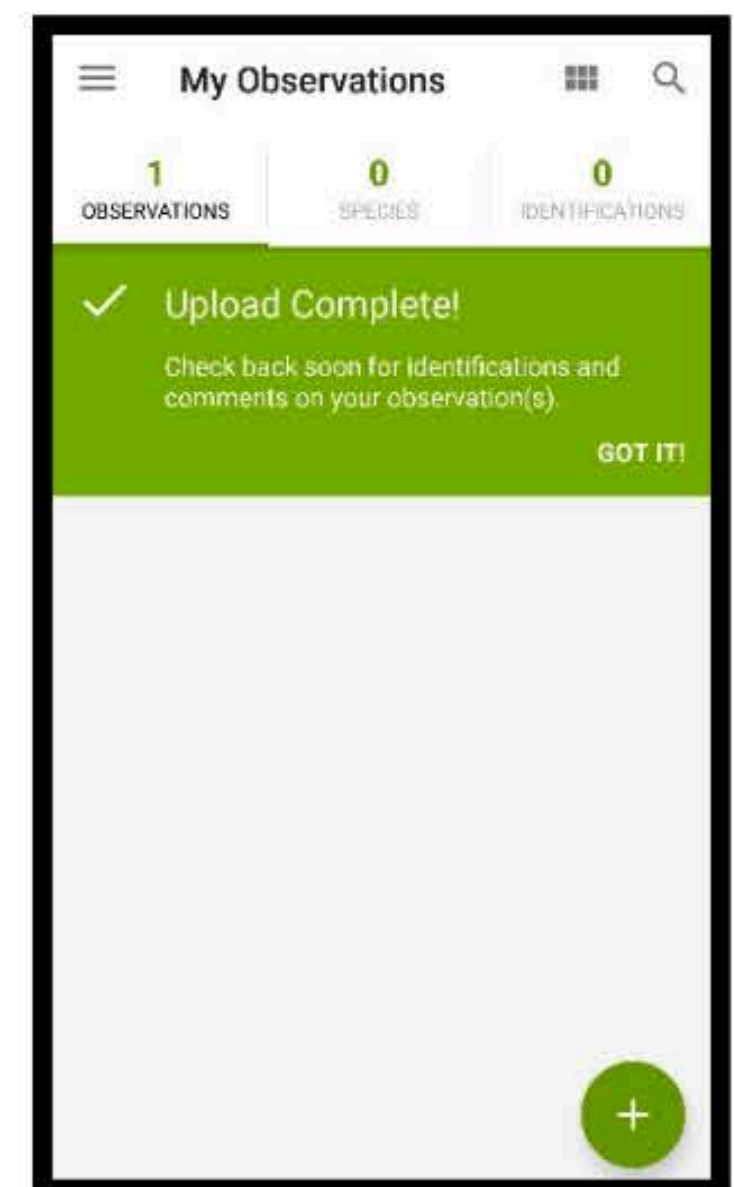


Use the tick symbol to **save your record**. If you make a mistake, do not worry - you can always edit it later

Hooray! **Your upload is made**, and you are now part of the iNaturalist recording community.

Other iNaturalist users will look at your record, and confirm it is correct, or they might suggest it as something else. Now all you have to do is keep on recording.

By uploading your photos of plants and animals you can support local conservation and international research.



## Step 3: Option to make your records more accessible

When you create an iNaturalist account, you have the option to grant permission for your records to be used by researchers - which is great for science!

However, if you'd like your records to be of **even greater use** to a wider variety of organisations, including the potential to be used by government bodies, town planners, ecologists and record centres, you'll need to change the observation settings to be "**open copyright**". This means anyone can use it for any purpose. You can do this by heading to the **settings menu** of the app or [iNaturalist website](#), and **switch your iNaturalist default observation licence setting to "CC0" or "CC-BY"**. Thanks for making your records count.
