

# Retail/Hospo spend: inflation adjusted




- Suburban centres see the love, CBD does not
  - CBD 14% down Dec 23 vs Dec 2022
  - Suburban 6% down Dec 23 vs Dec 2022
  - Working from home, recession, retail interest rates rising on mortgages and perhaps job uncertainty are likely causes
- Comparison TOTAL spend (Q4 2023 vs Q4 2022)

Wellington CBD	Auckland CBD	Wellington Suburban
-11%	-3%	-2%

Note: Auckland CBD consumers are different (large visitor market and less public sector)



## Train: Snapper weekday users




- Demand relatively stable
- Subsidy (50%) fare removal
  - Appears to be business as usual despite prices doubling







## CBD bus routes: Snapper weekday users




- Subsidy (50%) fare removal
  - Growth continues after some initial 'wobbles'
  - This is despite WfH, economic challenges and staffing issues
  - Insensitivity to price change indicates commuter need for this service







# Tourism: spend growing




- Tourism returns
  - Visitor (kiwi and international) share of consumer spend growing
    Kiwi has traditionally dominated
    Almost back to pre-COVID-19 levels
    International spend currently growing by 27% per annum
    High value US arrivals







# Migration: net migration at historic high




- · Net migration at an historic high
  - Wellington City attracts fair share: 3.7% compared to pop @ 4.0%
- Kiwi exodus grows
  - Australia has traditionally attracted Kiwis
    - · Higher wages, lower costs, warmer climate, despite the dangerous wildlife
    - Minerals sector remains buoyant
      - · FIFO (Fly In Fly Out) jobs for Aussies and Kiwis are well paid.... If you can tolerate it
      - · Fuels the wider economy (especially Iron ore)
        - Iron ore profit estimated @ \$90/Tonne for 900 million Tonnes exported in 2023





## Migration: skill mix shift post-COVID-19



- Skill mix has shifted post COVID-19
  - Trades now dominate
    - Meeting need in construction and agriculture sectors
  - · Traditional skills (professionals and carers etc) still in demand but no longer dominant
  - Note: high level of undefined skills in data (i.e. 60%)



# Migration: region of origin post-COVID-19

- Asian ascendency
  - 50% of new migrants now from Asia; versus 25% previously
- Asian mix shift
  - · Philippines risen from 'bit-player' to equal share with China and India







#### Summary:

#### Economic conditions

- Interest rates high for a while
  - Wholesales rates (OCR) expected to fall in 2025
  - Spend and investment likely to remain low(ish)
- But some export prices are recovering (dairy and horticulture)
- · In summary, current challenging conditions likely to persist for some time

#### Migration

- Solved the skills shortage BUT now demand is falling
  - Wellington attracts its fair share (on a per pop basis)
  - · Supplied much needed jobs in construction, primary sector, health, tourism etc
  - But growing problems due to unemployment and business failure
- Inflationary impact (i.e. housing) yet to be felt
- Kiwis continue the 'great exodus'









#### Change in the Wellington environment

The Spotlight focuses on the change in the policy making and transport tech activity measuring environment:


- Public sector jobs
  - The rhetoric from the new Government is strong, BUT history tells a slightly different story
  - Expect a slowing of historic growth and re-distribution of jobs among public servants and contractors/consultants
- New technology
  - Pedestrian counts among others







# Public sector jobs: what history says



- History indicates public sector growth continues irrespective of the colours
  - Left-of-centre government (red): 6% pa growth across two governments
  - Right-of-centre government (blue): 1.5% pa growth in John Key's government




# Wellington region jobs: what history says



- History indicates regional jobs grow irrespective of the colours
  - Left-of-centre (red): 2% pa jobs growth across two governments
  - Right-of-centre (blue): 1% pa jobs growth in John Key's government
- I.e. Wellington economy tends to do better under RED than BLUE



#### New Technology: activity counter locations




- Pedestrians, cyclists, and vehicles counted
- · Will be used to establish baseline trends in street activity
- Augments current tools to monitor retail spend
  - Will be used to inform policy making around road layout change
