It is regrettable in some ways that this change needs to happen, but climate change has made the sea wall in its current position untenable. It will be a costly exercise to attempt to maintain the status quo, so I feel that putting a long term strategy in place now by giving up the road and enhancing the shoreline for recreation (and as a habitat) is by far the most prudent approach for the council to take. It will be controversial, but I strongly believe within a decade, people will point to this as an example of good forward-planning, and the community will have embraced it. It will be a brave decision, but the right one to join the beach to the park.

Hi Wellington City Council,

I have tried to register to make a submission for the Island Bay Seawall initiative, but I am yet to receive my confirmation, so hopefully this email will suffice.

The unfortunate events of the June 2013 storm appear to have a silver lining, providing an opportunity to make this regionally significant area into a destination far superior to the existing configuration.

I would be in favour of option 3a, to create synergies from the existing park and enabling a connection to the beach that doesn't involve crossing a busy road.

Wellington already has an enviable road hugging most of its beautiful coastline, and I believe it can afford to reroute a small section inland in order to create a superior recreational facility that will be less vulnerable to erosion and future storms, while being making far better use of this historic beach and surrounds.

Part of the attraction of the pre-storm seawall was its history, but rebuilding this will struggle to retain the original look, so I believe the benefits of 3a will far outweigh retaining the previous layout. The existing road and wall, in my opinion, is grey and relatively unattractive, whereas extending the park to the beach will create a much more inviting environment in this special part of Wellington, in line with the council's strategy of making this city a place where people want to live, work and play.

I applaud your foresight for taking this opportunity to improve the area and hope that option 3a is the chosen layout.

I look forward to the final decision.

I have another suggestion about the Island Bay seawall.

The nature of the beach just there is a definitely curved bay. The sea runs up in a curve & the wall is straight. The curve reaches its capacity where the wall is broken & in a normal, really high tide, hits the wall. Last year's storm was much more than a normal high tide & breached the wall.

The wall should have been built originally to follow the curve of the bay, & not straight. I suggest the wall be rebuilt back from its old position, prefably following a curve. Some sections on each side of the break could be demolished & a new wall built.

The road & pavement would then have to follow the same curve & take over a little of the land there from Shorland Park.

If it's not a good idea to demolish any more of the existing wall, the new part could still step back from the present place & the pavenment widened. The road there is wide enough to allow for a wider pavenment.

We wish to register our strong objection to Option 5 <u>Remove section of seawall, close some local roads and establish some coastal dune systems linking the beach with Shorland Park (Option 5)</u> of the Island Bay seawall debate.

This Option would mean all south coast traffic would be rerouted through Brighton and Trent Streets. The top of Brighton Street is barely one car wide and traffic currently has to stop to give way (also in parts of Trent Street). The congestion would just be too great. Not so long ago we saw that a car towing a boat had to reverse back down Brighton Street as it could not get through.

I communicated regularly with Go Wellington for 18 months to stop buses travelling along Brighton Street as it was not an authorised bus route. My neighbour was loading her babies into a car at the narrow end of Brighton Street and was tooted at loudly by a bus that could not get past her. Go Wellington/Wellington City Council agreed to put signs up at the entrances to Brighton Street to prohibit buses entering the street as it was too narrow; therefore unsafe.

To even consider that large volumes of trucks/trailers/buses could drive up these narrow residential streets is frightening. Island Bay is full of families with young children and increasing the amount of heavy traffic through this particular area is unacceptable to us.

Option 5 would take away many of the Esplanade car parks that people use to visit the beach. Trent/Brighton/Reef Streets would struggle to have capacity for this volume of parking over summer.

Our preferred option is number 3 as this includes a coastal road, allows for a larger beach, and will retain the car parks (we assume).

On the weekends it can be dangerous for my family to cross the roads to shorland park due to the already crowded roadways.

Cars, 4wds and trucks often speed over the hump from the esplanade heading north into derwent street. This creates havoc for pedestrians wanting to cross the road and residential cars emerging onto the roadside at the southern end of derwent st. In what can sometimes be a very crowded neighbourhood, with cyclists (especially in summer), buses (no4 during week days although at limited times) and trailers pulling refuse to the tip (always on the weekends), the redirection of traffic from the esplanade WILL create new problems for the local families and community. I want to be convinced the council has thought the needs of the residents living in the areas that will be affected.

Whilst joining the park to the beach might be aesthetically pleasing and more user-friendly from a pedestrian's point of view, I really worry about the volume of traffic that would be re-routed around the park, particularly at the intersection just past Beach St / Derwent St, which is difficult enough as it is without pushing more traffic through it. I walk down to the beach from my house on most fine days and I drive the coastal route about once a week. My observation is that people are either using the park, or they are on the beach or they are walking the coast using the Esplanade. Whilst there is some foot traffic between the park and the beach , I am not sure to what extent people use both teh park and the beach during the same visit. If they do, the current point for crossing the road is narrow enough to enable people to get across the road reasonably easily.

Island Bay Seawall

Underlying issues which must be considered.

Sealevel will rise – through the rate of change is uncertain.

More violent weather events will occur, leading to more, and more severe, storm surges and to heavier rainfall events.

The southern end of Island Bay settlement is a drained swamp. It is probably still sinking, and a moderate earthquake could cause liquefaction and further settlement.

This means that the area is vulnerable to flooding by a major storm surge or high rainfall event.

The coastal road "Esplanade" is busy with "tourist" traffic on summer weekends and with heavy landfill trucks during the week, making diversion of the traffic more difficult and liable to arouse negative reactions.

Scheme 1

Scheme 1 does not take account of the focussing of wave energy onto the part of the straight seawall which was damaged. If the wall is simply replaced where it was, it would be liable to a future repeat failure.

Scheme 2

Scheme 2 has the same troubles as scheme1, combined with uncertainty of the effects of added sand. Where would it go, how long would it last, etc.

Scheme 3

Scheme 3 overcomes most of these problems.

Provision for future sea-level rising could be made by raising the seawall, and the road behind, to the level of the Esplanade to the west of Shorland Park, with provision to ultimately raise the whole road and seawall as far as the eastern cliffs.

While this is being done consideration should be given to installing non-return gates to the stormwater outfalls. Storm pumps should be installed to deal with any ponding behind the raised road.



Scheme 4

Scheme 4 diverts the traffic via Reef St and the Parade, but makes no provision for protecting the settlement area from storm surges.

The roading changes of scheme 4 could be combined with the seawall proposal of Scheme 3 to provide a modified scheme which increases the amenity value of the beach and Shorland Park, while providing the necessary protection. The required roading changes could be improved by easing the corner of Reef/Esplanade by incorporating part of the dog-exercise area and that of Reef/Parade by incorporating part of Shorland Park. Parking would have to be restricted for the end of the Parade.

If this proposal goes ahead the ultimate raising of the seawall level across the whole entrance to Island Bay should be included.

Scheme 5

Scheme 5 introduces more extensive roading changes with no obvious advantages.

I therefore support Scheme 3, largely on the grounds of economy, but think that my proposal of the combination of Schemes 3, with a raised seawall across the whole of the Bay and 4, with diversion of traffic up Reef St. would provide a better long-term solution.





Both options will create obvious additional traffic conflicts for vehicles moving around the coast as they meet the turning circle for trolley buses at the junction of Reef Street and The Parade [and parking for Shorland Park especially in summer].

Having lived along The Parade bordering Shorland Park I can confirm that the use of Winter AADT figures with respect to usage of a stretch of coastal recreation roading is a simple nonsense. The surveys have to be made in January when road usage figures are likely to be at least three times higher.

Nevertheless, the May 2011 figures show that Option 4 will more than double traffic levels for The Parade Extension and Reef Street. Clearly also forecasts are required for the expected growth in traffic volumes over the next 20 years.

NOT IN MY FRONT YARD

Back in 2002, we bought a house on the extension of The Parade in Island Bay, Wellington in the expectation of the arrival of a baby son. The Parade, as its name suggests is a wide boulevard between Island Bay Village Centre and a paddock sized triangular public space named Shorland Park. The Parade runs more or less along the line of a now piped stream that drained the valley down from the higher suburban village of Berhampore.

When the boulevard meets Shorland Park, traffic divides either left down Reef Street to the beach and the coastal / seaside route represented by The Esplanade, or right to a much narrowed extension of the Parade that leads down past a junction with Derwent Street to an alternative meeting with the Bay-hugging Esplanade. We learnt from our house deeds that the 'extension' had originally been a narrow lane and that half the front gardens of the fringing houses had been compulsorily purchased by Wellington City Council to form a trafficable road.

One of the great attractions of the house was that it stood across a quiet road from the park and thence across The Esplanade to the beach – more or less ideal for families with small kids.

Having moved in, I learnt that our fairly new Green Councillor Celia Wade-Brown had plans to rearrange the roading to consolidate Shorland Park with the beach. This implied rerouting traffic around the western [Parade Extension] and northern [Reef Street] segments of the Shorland Park triangle and closing the third beachside segment. The rationale was that a 'more natural' set of sand dunes could redevelop while the users of the park would be able to walk straight down to the beach unimpeded.

Celia held a presentation in the village that I attended and I made my case that diversion of the traffic from the Esplanade around the proposed dog-leg would increase journey times and vehicle emissions for coast-hugging traffic by 50 percent while funnelling it into a narrow and unsuitable road and increasing the number of junctions [and potential accident black spots] from three to four.

Of course, I also argued that householders along the Parade Extension would suffer a significant loss of amenity and greater risks to their small children – together with consequent losses in the values of their properties.

Celia as I remember was less than sympathetic and made great play of the desirability of restoring the natural environment. When she played the card that it would be safer for children to access the beach from the park, I asked not unreasonably why traffic separations, pedestrian islands or dedicated crossings had not already been installed. We used to regularly hear youths at night ramping up their motorbikes flat out around this stretch.

Anyhow, I think that the project was relegated to the too hard basket – and as she was then a Councillor and not the Mayor that she subsequently became, she had little clout.

But like the Monster from the Black Lagoon or the Bay, the project has surfaced again under a different guise as a Seawall Replacement Option.

THE SEAWALL REPLACEMENT OPTION

As reported by Jessica Rapana in the Dominion Post of 15th May 2014:

'A 200-metre stretch of The Esplanade in Island Bay is to be closed for three months from June. The closure is to allow the Wellington City Council to determine whether that part of the road should close permanently.

'Part of the seawall on the beach was badly damaged when a storm lashed the capital last June, leaving the stretch of the Esplanade behind it unprotected from southerly storms.

'Council officer, and head of the seawall replacement project, Nicci Wood told the council's environment committee last week the preferred option was to permanently close part of the Esplanade, diverting traffic via Derwent St and either Reef St or Trent St.

'The beach area would then be joined to Shorland Park.

'That would cost ratepayers about \$1.3 million, in addition to costs for consent and diverting traffic, which had not yet been assessed. Reinstating the wall was still an option, and would cost about \$950,000.

'But while technically feasible, climate change was likely to mean the wall would be more frequently damaged and would require more frequent maintenance, Wood said.

'The return period of a similar "energetic storm event" was estimated at more than one in 50 years, but less than one in 100 years.

'Other options included shifting the seawall and road 20 metres inland, or replacing the sand to create a "sand buffer" for the seawall. Either way, the wall would not disappear completely, because it would remain at the surf club and down the eastern side of the coast'.

Although we shifted from our house on The Parade three years ago, I remain deeply sceptical of the proposals, not least because, as seems so common with Green Party politics, consistency in argument is not observed in its Ends Justify the Means / Throw in the Kitchen Sink / Winner Takes All mindset. And I pity the couple who bought our old house as they have just started a family with a baby daughter.

At least, let's make sure that the evaluation is comprehensive and thorough. Some pointers:

- The damage area corresponds more or less with the open channel wave fetch from Wellington Harbour entrance between the western tip of Tapu te Ranga island and the coast. This is a storm accentuating corridor that hits what was formerly the mouth of the stream that debouched from its line along the boulevard – now a piped storm water drain. Special efforts will have to be made to protect the piping unless the stream mouth is reinstated. As we learnt to our cost during massive and delay-plagued storm water piping renewal by WCC outside out old house in 2004, the whole area is a mish mash of mud, sand and shifting / quick sand with the latter presenting a nightmare for public works.
- The houses across from the proposed replacement sand dunes will suffer extra windblown sand and may need special protection by boundary planting
- The junctions between the two broken ends of the old sea wall will require significant reinforcement – the natural tendency will be for a surging sea to scour out the gap that will be created. Hydraulic modelling is almost certainly required.
- As I pointed out above, the diversion of the traffic from the Esplanade around the
 proposed dog-leg would increase journey times and vehicle emissions for coast-hugging
 traffic by 50 percent while funnelling it into a narrow and unsuitable road and
 increasing the number of junctions (and potential accident black spots) from three to
 four. These costs must be taken into account. If the traffic is diverted through Trent
 Street, these costs will rise by 100 percent rather than 50 percent and the number of
 junctions will rise to six.
 - The notion that sand dunes will inevitably perform better than a seawall in future in
 protecting property and amenity is a matter of faith rather than reason. If global
 warming results in significant rises in sea levels and in the incidence of storms in the
 next few decades, it may still be necessary to impose heavy-weight man-made barriers.
 This would best be done on the smallest perimeter [i.e. the existing line of the
 Esplanade].
 - And given the Green Party's claimed special interest in protecting heritage structures, I
 think that the Mayor and her colleague Iona Pannett should provide us with a detailed
 explanation of why these values should be overruled in the case in point [see the old
 photo above of what many of us locals regard as our 'iconic' beachside].

I could go on about the Seawall / Sand Dunes Project but WCC has been warned that if the cost-benefit analysis that is promised is shoddy, I will rip into it

Ironically additional sea defence strengthening is occurring at a number of other places along the Esplanade, most notably between Houghton Bay and Te Raekaihau Point. In the latter case, part of the problem is the damage caused by increases in the use of this road by heavy trucks travelling from the terminus of the motorway and the City to retail and wholesale enterprises in Lyall Bay / Kilbirnie and the ever-expanding airport. The trucks have taken to this route because it avoids the bottlenecks created by the Basin Reserve and the Mt Victoria Tunnels.

Sigh - if you want to follow that one up, there is plenty on this blogsite about the Basin Reserve Project and its tooth and nail blockage by Green Party antagonists.

But while we are at it, I have to agree with Island Bay resident Keith Robinson who made a very good case in a letter to the Editor of the Dom this morning that, as far as The Parade is concerned its 'Cycle Lane Changes [are] Pointless'. He argues that all that is needed is to widen the existing cycle lanes somewhat and colour them green to give them greater prominence.

Again as the Dom reports:

Under a plan for a Cycleway more or less from the cyclist Mayor's door step to the Town Hall, \$1.3 million will be spent on creating a dedicated cycle path between parked cars and the foot path kerb, as part of an eventual \$5-10million cycle corridor. [Like so many of New Zealand's transport projects, this is a segment that doesn't really need doing but one that has been chosen because it's easy and visible].

The Dee St roundabout will be replaced by a give-way intersection, and about 45 parking spaces will be lost at intersections and near bus stops, although which parks would go is still unclear. Two bus stops will be lost, and nine redesigned so cyclists looped behind bus shelters.

'Parade resident and mother of four Fiona Cockerill-Ghanem comments that 'a narrowed road would mean more car congestion, and visibility would be reduced for cars turning out of driveways' [heard that before?]. As a good many of our cyclists are louts in lycra, bikes travelling at 40kmh plus will make crossing the road or opening car doors a nightmare, with the journey from parked car to pavement being especially dangerous for children and the elderly'.

This all reminds me of a scene from the film Dr Zhivago where the Commissars requisition a family dacha in the name of The People – and the good doctor's old uncle cries out 'But we are People too'. At least under Lenin it was done ostensibly in the name of the community at large – and not for Sand Dunes and Bell-less Bike Bovver Boys.

I would like to have my say regarding the proposals for the Island Bay Sea Wall.

My preferred choice is to re-instate the wall as it was prior to the July storm for the following reasons:

Changes were proposed around 20 years ago and after public consultation the wall was left as it was. Has any thought been given to the fact that the erosion problem appears to have been exacerbated by the building of the storm water drain into the harbour? I have lived in the Bay for over 40 years and prior to this drain being built we possessed a lovely bay with no scouring and breeching of the harbour wall. Wellington is unique in that it is possible to walk around the entire south coast without having to clamber over any sand dunes, and I would like this to remain an option. I would prefer to see a combined cycle/footpath around the entire south coast (similar to that around Lake Taupo). Closing the road and allowing the sound dune to be enlarged would for me as an older person, result in an inaccessible beach. It is fine to do this when you are younger but more difficult as one's joints age. Having pushed a wheelchair around Island Bay for 18 years, I also know that it is virtually impossible for disabled egress through dry sand without pulling it backwards.

I have tried several times to register and login to the online submissions form for this - but to no avail. Even when I've registered and then changed my password, the system doesn't recognise the user-name and password.

My submission -

I suggest temporarily closing the Esplanade road between Brighton Road and the Parade (to imitate option 4) and do some traffic analysis to estimate the likely traffic impacts of option 4. That would greatly inform the evidence and consultation.

Subject to (after analysis) that option having manageable traffic impacts and reasonable cost, I prefer Option 4. Otherwise I prefer Option 3.

I do not prefer options 1 or 2 as the current path of the wall fights nature - i.e. is a straight line where there should be a natural curvature of the bay. The current straight line may add to risks of flooding or transferred erosion / floods (e.g. deflecting flooding to other parts of the coast).

Please find attached pdf plan and comment for my submission to the Island Bay Coastal Development

The plan is included in a now completed 4 book series, ready for proof-reading, dealing with the Early History of Island Bay (1850 – 1940) and includes a detailed study of 3 buildings associated with the Island Bay Entertainment period, namely the Island Bay Hotel (1882), the Blue Platter Tea Kiosk (1906), and the Cliff House Tea Kiosk and Accommodation House (1907).

Long term the scheme suggested may require the shoring and widening of the 'Cutting' end of Derwent Street or limited parking in this area with perhaps a turning circle at the junction of Trent Street and The Parade. A cycle-way can be planned through Shorland Park to provide a more direct and scenic route around the coast. The Island Bay Hotel, early in its history, used to be the centre for traffic in the area with the Omnibus arriving from Newtown and departing when servicing the Hotel and the Island Bay Racecourse (1883 onwards) and for people coming for picnics and promenades. There used to be a direct road from Clyde Street to the Hotel before Trent Street was formed.

It would be good to build up the sand dunes to provide sea protection and give large sandy areas for picnics and recreation and for linking Shortland Park with the sea again. It is the heavy Southerly storms that are the problem — the remaining straight west sea wall will not last much longer. Also keep in mind Wellington is the fastest sinking area in NZ. From the Dominion Post 13 July 2012: Two reports issued yesterday by Greater Wellington regional council show Wellington's sea level is the fastest rising in New Zealand – made worse by seismic rumblings causing the city to sink 1.7mm a year since 2000

The Sand Dunes' Return

When The Blue Platter was built there was no dividing line between the beach and the land and it has often been suggested that traffic could be rerouted around the bay. This would effectively link Shorland Park directly with the beach, enable the sand dunes to grow, provide natural protection from sea in storm conditions and dramatically increase the size of the recreation area available. As alluded to previously, the current Surf Club building is out of scale with the sea front and has been built on the best part of the beach formerly used for recreation. The seawall can be seen as an artificial device for claiming the marginal land between the sea shore and land for urban and traffic purposes. The disadvantage is the serious inconvenience to the residents of Trent Street and the extended vehicle route around the coast bay.

Add car parking Trent St, Queens Drive.

Serpentine shaped seawall length retained.

Top floor only of existing Surf Club House craned to new site to form community hall and cafe at ground level; outside seating to the north: clear sea view of bay to the south: access to service area from Reef Street; new ground level changing rooms.

As a long-term economic solution sand dunes should be allowed to grow and form protective sea barrier and sand collector with huge increase in beach space.

Existing marine aquarium.

Existing jetty with direct link to playground.

Expanded dune area with existing road reduced to cycle lane with car access.

Board walk promenade snaking through dunes with view of seashore.

Than you for your Email The scheme I am suggesting is closer to option 5. Please find attached revised scheme plan for the Island Bay foreshore.

Your options 1-5 perhaps should encompass a larger area so the effect of the changes on the traffic flow on streets and people patterns for the whole area can be explored. There is little indication in options 1-5of planting, parking areas, pedestrian facilities; increase times for traffic to flow around the alternative road routes; consideration for the surf club/community facilities as part of the overall scheme. The forgotten triangular green to the east of Reef Street needs to be integrated into the scheme. Unlike the Lyall Bay beach buildings, the Island Bay Surf Building is located on what use to be the best part of the beach and is not well sited detracting from the existing curved serpentine section of the seawall with left-over gaps. Island Bay is a small scale beach. The building has only one means of egress for the upper floor with the rusty reinforced concrete steps on the verge of collapse. Moving the build back from the beach (top floor only) should reduce damage due to sea, sand, wind and improve beach use.





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

If similar damage was to occur to the seawall in Lyall Bay would a similar option to divert traffic onto inland residential streets also be proposed.?

A new modern style sea wall is constructed.

It is clear that the existing seawall is old and potentially open to further storm damage. Any proposal to repair it or extend it are flawed. The opportunity exists to construct a new sea wall which could be designed to be extendable around the coast (to meet future sea level rises) or extendable upwards.

- Widening of the beach will to some extent alleviate rising sea levels and possible storm damage.

Yes I do have one further alternative recommendation.



## Comments

Options 1 and 2, which attempt to restore the status quo, are short-sighted and ultimately will not work. The forces which damaged the wall in June 2013 will wreck it again sometime in the future. The sand buffer of option 2 will simply wash away. An opportunity will have been missed to restore the natural curve of the beach. Option 3 is better, but will diminish the size of Shorland Park. Option 4 is my second choice and option 5 my first choice. See the next box for my reasons.

## Comments

My husband and I have lived in our own house in Island Bay since 1963; prior to that we were renting here. I took my two young daughters to the beach and Shorland Park regularly in the 1960s. Both daughters have settled back in Island Bay and during the last 18 years we have taken our four grandchildren to the beach and Shorland Park from time to time. We have discussed the five proposals as a family and think this is a wonderful opportunity to think years ahead and make changes which will in time transform our beach and foreshore. The four grandchildren, aged from eight to eighteen, all think the linking of the park to the beach and the re-creation of sand-dunes is an excellent idea, and I suspect most children would think the same. I am therefore advocating option five, with option 4 as second best. I would like to urge the Council to give some thought to changing social habits, the changes in the use of beach and park which have been observed over the last 100 years, and likely changes in usage patterns in the next few years. If we look at old photographs, early last century a visit to the beach was a formal social occasion, with men in suits and hats and women in elaborate dresses and even more elaborate hats. There was slow change, as bathing sheds appeared, followed by the first Surf Club building, the diving platform and steps and ramps to the beach. Very large crowds gathered on the sand and surrounding areas, whereas today there are far fewer people sitting and swimming. By contrast the park area was little used until the first play area was opened in 1927, followed by the Band Rotunda in 1930. There was little traffic and crossing from park to beach was easy. Now the park is a very important amenity, with two play areas and much use made of the barbeques by families and other groups. What use is likely to be made of park and beach in 10 years, 20 years, in 50 years? In any event the linking of the two will anticipate many changes.

Heavy vehicle traffic increase

## Comments

Long-term, traffic density is going to decrease in the next 50 years. Quarrying around the South Coast, ubiquitous in the late 19th century and for most of the 20th century is unlikely to recommence. Although Carey's Gully is likely to remain a landfill for many years more enlightened views on recycling and dealing with refuse should ensure that dump trucks become much less of a problem. In any event it is appalling that vehicles have priority over people when it comes to beach access.

I wish to make the following submission regarding the Island Bay seawall.

I have been a resident of Island Bay for all of my 60 years. I have been a ratepayer for 43 years and my parents were ratepayers in Island Bay from 1951 until 2007.

I wish to make it clear that my strongly held view is that the sea wall needs to be replaced where it was destroyed by the storm of 2013 and that the entire wall should be upgraded to a decent standard so that it continues to provide protection and a safe and reasonable boundary between the sea and the land. I believe some of the alternatives that have been proposed are pie-in-the-sky thinking, an over reaction, costly and unnecessary. I am in favour of the three options offered by the council that see the wall retained and supported. I am relaxed about option 3 which recognises the potential need to push the wall further back to allow for sea rises arising from climate change - but in all respects the wall must stay.

My view is supported by the following:

## Heritage

The sea wall is very much part of Island Bay's waterfront history. It is a place of rest and observation, it acts as a safety barrier from the sea. Certainly it needs improvement and a stronger structure but there is no need to alter its height or shape. The sea wall allows promenading around the coast and ensures the retention of Wellington's unique waterfront road stretching from Oriental Bay, around the eastern side of the city to the south and ending at the old quarry west of Owhiro Bay.

## Alternatives

The option to replace a large part of the wall with sand dunes that would effectively merge the beach with Shorland Park is ill conceived. The park is already well used and so is the beach and there is no need to link the two. I grew up playing at both as did my children - I don't see what bringing them together will achieve. Sand dunes will take five years to be established and even then may never flourish because of the constant sand drift caused by strong winds in both southerly and northerly directions. I can only imagine what sand dunes will mean for the poor people who live in and around Reef Street, Trent Street and Brighton Street where I used to live. Anyone who has visited the section of the wall that has disappeared on a windy day can see for themselves how much sand gets thrown onto the road and beyond.

## Traffic

Cutting off the road to establish sand dunes will effectively redirect Esplanade traffic to use Reef, Trent, Brighton Streets. Reef is a problem because of the Shorland Park playground, Brighton and Trent are narrow residential streets that would not cope with additional traffic, especially heavy vehicles using the accesses to rich the Happy Valley landfill. There will also be a detrimental effect on the southern end of Derwent Street, again in the neighbourhood of the park. Additionally, another access to the tip, up the steep and narrow Severn Street, will cause only further danger in what is already a hazardous street. Concerns over the existing heavy traffic on the Esplanade and children crossing between the beach and the park can be addressed through traffic calming measures, including a pedestrian crossing.

In summary I am opposed to options four and five and strongly support the retention of the wall which should be enhanced, not removed.

#### ISLAND BAY SEAWALL

I've lived in Island Bay for 60 years. The local parks and the beach were my playground as a young boy. I still have great memories of learning to swim around the old diving platform (which was later wrecked in a storm) and I was a member of Island Bay Surf Club during my teenage years. I currently live on the Parade a few blocks from the beach and I regularly walk (and drive almost daily) along the Esplanade. I am an architect and I have a Masters Degree in Landscape Architecture.

Of the 5 options that were presented at the recent public meetings, in my opinion, there is one that stands out as an obvious choice for many reasons.

Some of the options should be discounted from the very outset because they don't seem to have been given much thought and I'm sure local residents would take to the barricades in protest. While the idea of joining Shorland Park with the beach by blocking off the Esplanade would have some obvious merits in an ideal world, Options 4 and 5 should be discarded immediately because of the negative impact on the existing local roading network. Trent Street, Brighton Street and the south end of Derwent Street would simply not cope with more traffic (including trucks and buses) without huge and costly structural changes.

While a bigger beach would also be nice, Option 2 (to create a larger artificial beach by importing sand) seems quite far-fetched with little likelihood of success without continuing maintenance. The sand will most likely need to be constantly replenished as it will almost certainly be eroded by natural processes of waves and wind. There may also be significant planning hurdles to overcome since the new beach would lie entirely within the Taputeranga Marine Reserve.

The current alignment of the seawall (a straight line from the stormwater outfall to the surf club) may have been an easy way to build a wall when it was originally constructed, but it is the very reason that the sea wall was breached in the storms of last year. The natural crescent form of the beach was compromised, and the point at which the wall was breached is where the beach is at it's narrowest and most vulnerable to wave action during storms. Significant amounts of ratepayer funded repairs to the seawall were carried out in 2006 to no avail. Accommodating natural processes instead of trying to counter them with man-made structures is fraught with difficulty (as the experience of Haumoana in Hawkes Bay clearly shows).

Option 3 which is to build a new seawall further inland to follow the natural crescent shaped alignment of the beach would provide several benefits:

- Larger naturally formed beach area- no need to import sand –it will be delivered by natural means at no cost to the ratepayer.
- The beach environment itself will be far nicer. Currently users of the beach in the area immediately opposite Shorland Park are restricted to quite a narrow stretch of sand especially at high tide. At low tide much of sand in this stretch remains wet. A

299 The Parade, Wellington 6023 Phone/Fax (04) 934 7659 e-mail: <u>ascape@paradise.net.nz</u> broader, more natural expanse of sand above the mean high tide mark (which could be groomed if necessary) could result in Island Bay becoming a more popular destination beach with easy access from the city.

• The curved seawall alignment will provide a far more logical defence against storm tides since the wave action would be dissipated on the larger and higher expanse of beach sand.

I am of the view that that heritage value of the old seawall could be retained by incorporating sections of the old wall (perhaps distributed along the length of the entire wall?) and then constructing the remainder of the wall to match and join up the old remnants. The new wall would have the same curved cross section through its entire length. It may be feasible to leave the foundations of the existing seawall in place as a further defence against the sea (depending on the geotechnical issues of wave action). The area between the old foundations and the realigned wall would probably be enveloped in sand in a short time.

The new (re-aligned) road and footpath/cycleway which would be built behind the sea wall could be elevated by say a metre or two to deal with the prospect of future rises in sea level. The road and seawall would follow an even gradient from the existing high point at the West Beach end, down to the intersection with Brighton Street near the Surf Club building. The slightly elevated road and seawall would not unduly affect local views and those living closest to the beach (who will most likely reap the greatest benefits of a more protective sea wall and beach environment in the event of higher seal levels) are hardly likely to object.

The relationship between Shorland Park and the beach could be easily improved by introducing (for example) raised pedestrian road crossing points which would be integrated with new sets of steps down to the beach.

The existing roading network would remain largely unaffected with the route of hugely popular south coast drive route preserved (and possibly even enhanced) for both motorists, cyclists and pedestrians. Planting of new street trees (most likely Pohutukawa), traffic calming measures and parking improvements on streets in the immediate vicinity could be incorporated into an overall foreshore development plan.

The eastern end of Shorland Park is currently a scraggly undeveloped and underutilised area of scrub and largely unmaintained sand dune. While the new road and seawall alignment would encroach further into Shorland Park and also the small dog exercise area on the corner of Reef Street, the trade off is that the beach itself (also usable public open space) would be greatly enhanced.

We have reviewed the options and support both options 3 and 4. Our key reasons being:

> both give the beach improved width so that a proper beach formation can occur above the regular tide line.

> At present the wall constricts the beach with wave action occurring right upto the wall. This not only affects beach ecology/processes but impacts on recreational enjoyment of the beach. Options 3 and 4 improve on this situation and will result in a healthier beach environment.

> Option 4 is preferred over Option 3 given the linkage. To shore land park and avoidance of dune impact on the existing Nth side of the esplanade road.

> Option 4 retains good options for parking and access to the beach while the short detour for cars would not present me with any concerns, I'd happily trade off the convenience for the improved outcomes.

> Option 4 provides improved safety and Ped connection to shore land park. I suspect it will also help reduce vehicle speeds over Option 3.

I recommend maintaining the status quo (Option One). As a mother of a small child and Island Bay resident I think this is the most sensible option, from my experience of both the beach and park environments.

I'm not convinced that adding sand to the beach (Option Two) would keep the sea away, and making the beach bigger (Option 3) will necessarily entail reduction in the size of an incredibly popular park.

Connecting beach to park (Options 4&5) will encourage the beach to take over the park. Moreover, park - beach separation is part of the attraction at the moment. Beach goers can get away from the frenzy of the park, and parkgoers get to escape the sand (in strong wind, the sand drives everyone home, whereas the current arrangement shelters park users' eyes from the gritty stuff).

### SUBMISSION 1 November 2014

The most practical solution to the seawall replacement is option **3** where the wall and road is relocated to match the natural contour of the beach. This is less disruptive to residents and does not destroy the area.

This road is a necessary route to the **TIP**. We cannot have it removed and thus turning a residential area into a motorway by rerouting traffic. As long as the tip is where it is we need the access to the tip.

Wellington is on the coast and is surrounded by beaches. Princess Bay below the Pines is within walking distance.

Island Bay beach is not so popular as it is in the Cook Strait and is very cold and on some occasions we have had sewage coming out while people were in the water. Not very pleasant.





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

I most strongly support option 3 however would be satisfied with option 1 and 2 also. I DO NOT support options 3 and 4. I live in one (and jointly own two) of the six houses located between The Esplanade and Derwent Street. Closing part of The Esplanade would affect us on both sides of our properties. There would be a large increase in traffic on the narrow section of Derwent Street on one side of our house, and parking spaces created on The Esplanade on the sea side of our house. The increase in traffic, including heavy trucks, on the Derwent Street side of our properties, would create safety issues for residents and for visitors to Shorland Park. It is likely that creating parking spaces on the closed section of The Esplanade would encourage night time parties involving cars and loud music. This already happens to some extent but a closed off section of road would be very appealing to some groups of people. # Comments

The problem with options 4 and 5 is the traffic problem. There is a lot of heavy traffic going to the tip that passes along the coast route and I am concerned that some of the diverted traffic will use the narrow part of Derwent St that continues from the end of The Parade to the Esplanade and the route to Owhiro Bay. Already traffic going through that end of Derwent St often goes too quickly and causes me concern when I walk along there. I am sure that the problem of traffic going up Reef St, where people going to the park are often clustered around cars or crossing the road carelessly will have been raised. So I find the traffic/road issues problematic. But I really prefer the more natural options otherwise. My suggestion is to make the contour of the wall more natural - to the 2065 suggested level and by then expect that traffic management issues will be clearer anyway - will the nature of road traffic have changed a great deal then, what are sea levels and climate change causing, etc.

## Comments

As indicated already - my preference would be to have some restoration of natural dune systems - options 4 or 5 - as that provides the best environment for the plants and animals of the shoreline and the best connection for humans with the environment. It does not reduce amenity values, I think, - natural dunes are much more attractive than the depleted beach that exists beside the wall. It would also potentially protect us better from storms etc - but the probability that wetland restoration would not occur probably limits that benefit.

I'm what is known as a 'life time's resident' of Island Bay! Sixty seven (67) years ago I was born on The Parade, where I grew up and lived until I married, in the Bay, in 1969. My husband and I made our home in this great suburb, raising our children here and where we still reside. I am also a leader in the Italian community.

In saddens, disappoints and disturbs me to listen to groups of very vocal ageing hippies and Greenies, Johnny-come-latelies, and people living outside of Island Bay, of their ridiculous plans and ideas for Island Bay, in particular the demolition of the Island Bay sea wall and closing off part of The Esplanade to traffic.

For decades the sea wall has been of huge historical significance for the Italian community in that it has been a 'special meeting place' for many homesick Italians; where they would gather in friendship, and to share family news from within Island Bay and back home. I recall as child and up to the age of 15, waiting with my mother and groups of Italian women and children, for the return of their husbands and fathers from a fishing trip in the early evenings, each of us scanning the horizon for sight of our loved ones, as we sat or learned on the sea wall. After consideration of the 5 Options I support these as below:

**Option 4 - Strongly support this** as 1/ it is a long term strategy to potentially reduce later work and 2/ as it will improve the connectivity between Shorland Park and the beach greatly increasing the amenity value of both.

**Option 3 - Would also support this** (as a fall-back position) bearing in mind possible local opposition to roading change. It has little impact on the two park areas - altho' it doesn't appear that the old concrete toilet could be retained. (Loss of whimsy there!)

Options 1 & 2 are both short-term fixes and do not offer any increase in amenity.

Option 5, while an attractive result this would have a huge impact on roading and properties and is unlikely to achieve much local support. It also offers little more than Option 4.

# Shelter structure

In rebuilding the seawall, or during other related work I believe that some form of **bidirectional shelter structure** in the area of the seawall would be a big improvement. This would ideally incorporate a wind wall, trellis/slatting etc (think the Frank Kitts Lagoon bridge), with some roofing and seating on either side.

It would cater to use during both the predominant northerly and storm southerly winds and would relate to both the sea and the park.

Am happy to discuss any of the above further.







Option 1-3 The idea of dropping hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of sand which will be quickly washed away due to its location immediately in front of a poorly performing sea wall is abhorrent to many local residents.. What an outstanding waste of public money that would be !? You can bet we will all be back again spending more money in 10 - 20 years when climate change 'takes us by surprise' even though the writing is on the cards.... it would be immoral and disrespectful to our children - to put something in place that fails to meet even current building / development codes and guidelines... (ie, Science) and maintains the gross preference to the car (even though most of us know that cars and fossil fuels will be dinosaurs not very long from now) Rebuilding the sea wall at or near its current location is highly likely to increase the speed of water (and therefore the rate of erosion) now that the sea is right up to the wall at high tide. Next we will be seeing pavements being eroded from underneath much like as happened in St Clair in Dunedin. I attach this document to this submission for your information. Suggesting any removal of public spaces (such as the removal of the natural dunes in shoreland park ) so we can maintain a vast road along the waterfront seems absolute madness to me. Options 4-5 The amount of land devoted to the car along the esplanade (when compared with land used for public spaces / pavement / residential properties ) is wasteful from a planning point of view and it is extremely dangerous for people to cross these vast wide roads safely... As provided in option 4-5 we should be encouraging bikes / pedestrians and putting less emphasis and focus on helping out those who choose to travel by car. Reef street is wide enough to handle the increase in traffic, and as for the road most affected by future traffic - Derwent street near the ocean - It should be noted these residents would now own beach front properties .. as for the other side of Derwent street - there are no properties fronting onto this area - making this a one sided road... I therefore do not feel that these residents will be any worse off than they are with the current arrangement of coastal streets. I am a resident of Brighton street - a very narrow street which will no doubt be subject to extra traffic if options 4 or 5 go ahead nevertheless I can see this is the best long term solution and certainly the best option in terms of good urban planning.. Lastly I am concerned that many young families (who make up the main part of Island Bay's residents) are not likely to be voicing their opinions on this matter - and instead we are listening to many elderly and long term residents who are afraid of change and cant imagine the amazing benefits improving island bay's coastline and increasing resilience to climate change which should be on everyone's agenda first and foremost.

Option 4 is the only option that takes account of traffic issues as well as providing a long lasting solution for Island Bay. I am well connected to playcentre and school families and have been asking opinions of everyone I have met over the last fortnight. I would like to make a submission on the Island Bay seawall consultation please.

I am firmly in favour of closing the Esplanade and diverting the traffic down Reef Street (option 4). I think the traffic issues can be managed, and it will slow the traffic down as it travels very fast along the Esplanade. It provides the opportunity to create a more natural and usable public space for the Island Bay community and visitors.

I would actually be in favour of option 5 if the traffic could be managed down Trent St but I am not sure it can. It would be great to integrate the little dog park with Shorland Park somehow.

I strongly disagree with options 1 and 2 as I think they are shortsighted and don't mitigate the risk. I don't know much about climate change or erosion etc but it seems that rebuilding the sea wall is not a long term solution, but a temporary band aid, which will just fail again. A natural solution of dunes would be more suitable.

Shorland Park is a huge asset to Island Bay and must be one of the most well used parks in Wellington. I am amazed at how run down and shabby it has become with virtually no maintenance and improvements in years. I was astounded to see the cool plan for improving the park that WCC had ten years ago (<u>http://wellington.govt.nz/~/media/your-council/projects/files/island-bay-seawall/shorland-park-stage2-concept-plan-file4c.pdf</u>) and which was never implemented. I don't understand why not or why such a well used park has been left to become so shabby. I think this is a tremendous opportunity to do something awesome and we shouldn't let those who are afraid of change stand in the way of doing something new with the park.

I would like to see Shorland park made more user friendly – at the moment there are large areas of the park that are unused and unusable spaces. My children are 8 and 10 and I would like the park to be a space we can use as a family, but also that they can use as they get older and become teenagers.

Some of the things I would like to see are (note some of these are already in the 2005 plan mentioned above):

- A flat space where kids can play soccer etc, this could be done around the band rotunda and perhaps some tiered seating like in Frank Kitts park added around the edge.
- A decent adventure playground the ship is a great asset and could be done up and made really cool. See playground ideas below. Please don't just add a kitset playground like all the other parks around Wellington!
- Add a climbing frame like the one at Scorching Bay.
- Keep the slide!
- A good playground for little kids that is near the older kids playground so if you have kids of both ages you can watch over both at the same time! At the moment the little kids playground is on the other side of the park.
- Nice public spaces for bbq's and picnics, with sheltered areas for those windy days.
- Good access from the park to the beach whether this is boardwalks through the dunes or what ever.
- Lots of big trees, perhaps a row of pohutukawas or Norfolk Pines behind the dunes? (I am getting a bit sick of pohutukawas as that's all the council seem to plant these days.)
- A café with indoor and outdoor seating so that it can be used all year round. Perhaps this could be in the dog park and extra parking added there? Or on the corner of Shorland Park where the Maori statue is? Or in the surf club like Maranui?
- Perhaps a water playground? We have seen neat ones where water can be pumped out of the top of a small mound and as it flows down can be channelled through different routes by opening and closing gates etc.

• A concrete court for basketball or tennis or whatever, if there is room.

Playground ideas:

- It needs to have a theme to do with the sea pirate ship is the obvious one with the ship already there.
- We saw a great example of a pirate playground in Currumbin on the Gold Coast a few years ago. It has climbing ropes, barrel swings, a merry-go-round, you can dig for pirate treasure buried in the sand, a treasure map, a tunnel/cave etc. I have attached some photos.
- Or another great one was on the waterfront in Cairns where the playground equipment was all hidden away in jungle like plantings. Photos also attached.
- There is also a cool pirate ship and water park in London Kensington Gardens, the Diana, Princess of Wales Memorial Playground.
- Christchurch has a neat wee playground which was a joint thing with DoC I think where you can hunt for (wooden) native birds and insects hidden in various landscapes.
- It would be cool to get some design students or local kids to design the playground (like the one in Wanganui which is pretty special). You could have a design competition.

I asked my children what they would like in the park and their answers were:

Sebastian age 8 – more trees for climbing, a flat area to play soccer, keep the big slide and turn the ship into a pirate ship. Charlotte age 10 – a hamster wheel like the one in Carterton park, more stuff to play on, a special picnic area, a flat surface to play sports and games on, new play equipment, I want the playground to look nice, not like it is now.

Good evening

My name is Maria Elenio and I have been a resident and ratepayer of Island Bay and Wellington city for over 33 years.

I wish to make a submission to the council as it considers what to do about the Island Bay sea wall.

I am firmly of the view that the council should restore the missing section of the wall and in general upgrade the wall so that it will stand up to whatever sea and weather elements are thrown at it.

I have studied the five options that have been put into the public domain. I endorse option one as the minimum step. I feel option two is unnecessary and not a good use of hard-earned ratepayer money. I am favourable towards option three if it meets the concerns about the increasing effects of global warming and wave heights. I support this option as long as it means the sea wall remains and is enhanced and the Esplanade road remains open.

I do not favour options four and five which would see major changes to the waterfront that will not enhance the bay at all. I believe it is foolhardy to even attempt to replace the beach wall with sand dunes. Surely your experts among council staff will recognise that sand dunes will suffer enormous erosion, not only by the sea but also the sometimes storm strength winds from both north and south directions. The reasoning given in part is to "join up" Shorland Park and the beach. This is fanciful at best. There is no need to link the two – generations of children have managed to play at both the park and the beach and found the road easy to cross.

I am most definitely opposed to the loss of Wellington's unique marine parade that spans the coastline from Oriental Bay to Owhiro Bay, a 15.5 kilometre ocean view that makes Wellington special. We are lucky to have this seaside road – why would we want to sacrifice it for inadequate reasons?

I am also opposed to cutting the road and forcing traffic headed in both easterly and westerly directions to use narrow local residential streets including lower Derwent Street, Trent Street, Brighton Street and Severn Street. There are a number of heavy vehicles that use the Esplanade to get to the Happy Valley landfill and forcing them through alternative routes will cause delays and accidents. I do hope that both councillors and council staff become familiar with these traffic safety issues before giving any further consideration to options four and five.

I am at a loss to understand why the council has gone to the extreme lengths it has to spark debate about this. The council acted quickly to restore fencing and footpaths that were damaged by last year's southerly storms and yet has effectively put the replacement of the demolished part of the sea wall into the too hard basket. In sitting on its hands for the last 16 months the council has created a tension and anxiety that did not previously exist and raised some people's hopes of solutions that just don't make sense. After all, the wall has successfully defended the bay for more than 70 years with virtually no money spent on it. What other structure would last that long without some preventive maintenance.

Instead the council has been a party to the creation of a marine reserve which, bizarrely, they have chosen to interpret as a means by which they no longer need to keep Island Bay beach tidy by removing dried seaweed that cuts children's feet. The photograph in today's Dominion Post illustrates perfectly what we have lost at the beach.

Please restore the wall.

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# **Greater Wellington Regional Council: Submission**

Submission on:	The Island Bay Seawall Project

# 1. Reason for submission

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Island Bay Seawall Project options document. We commend Wellington City Council (WCC) for taking the opportunity to consider alternatives to the rebuild of the existing seawall. The options outlined in the analysis are clear and well considered.

This project is of interest to Greater Wellington Regional Council (GWRC) both in relation to policy direction provided by the Regional Policy Statement for the Wellington Region, 2013 (RPS), and because there is potential to impact on GWRC's operations in and near the project area, including the delivery of public transport services and harbour navigation and safety.

GWRC is keen to ensure that any options being considered as part of this project are consistent with the direction and policies set out the RPS. The RPS is a document required by the Resource Management Act, which identifies resource management issues within the region and sets out the objectives, policies, and methods to achieve the integrated management of natural and physical resources for the whole region.

# 2. Island Bay beach

Island Bay is a pocket sandy beach that has formed between two rocky headlands behind Taputeranga Island. This landform has allowed sediment to accumulate to form a sandy beach. The sand comes from the nearshore seabed and is transported onshore under wave and current activity. As waves break on a beach the water runs up the foreshore and the energy is dissipated over the length of the beach as it absorbs into the sand. In stormy conditions this process is overwhelmed by wave activity and sand is eroded from the beach and deposited on the nearshore (i.e. the sub-tidal part of the beach below low tide). Over the ensuing weeks the sand is transported back to the beach face, replenishing the beach in time for the next storm. This sediment transfer cycle is common on all sandy beaches and is the way in which beaches absorb and dissipate wave energy making them extremely resilient to storm events.

A further characteristic of the Island Bay beach, though significantly reduced in extent, are the dune ecosystems. Dune plants bind the sand and prevent it from being blown away. They are thus another important characteristic of the natural resilience of the beach in this location. Despite the severity of the June 2013 storm the planted dune systems at the western end of the beach remained largely intact.

# 3. Natural hazards and climate change

Policy 52 of the RPS promotes the use of non-structural and soft engineering methods, such as restoration projects for dunes, as the first option for hazard mitigation. GWRC considers that the Island Bay situation presents an opportunity to start planning for the inevitable impacts of sea level rise and to rehabilitate the beach, which is a major community asset, so that it is resilient to the effects of climate change.

Building hard structures on a beach interferes with the natural process outlined above and reduces the ability of a beach to absorb incoming wave energy. The hard structure prevents the beach from absorbing the wave energy and it reflects back on the beach creating turbulence and scouring and preventing sand from depositing on the beach.

Under a rising sea level beaches respond by adjusting inland to accommodate a higher tide limit. If a hard structure prevents this from happening the beach begins to erode and becomes narrower over time. After a time, there is no longer a beach at high tide (such as has happened at Paekakariki) and eventually the beach is lost entirely – as we see from many places around Wellington where seawalls have been used alongside roads. Placing coastal protection structures on the foreshore does not stop erosion - the natural processes continue - rather, it protects assets behind the structure and affects how the erosion occurs.

The Wellington region, like the rest of New Zealand, is experiencing a rising sea level. Wellington is undergoing the fastest rise of any of the main centres in New Zealand due to tectonic subsidence which is adding a relative component to the sea level trend i.e. the land is going down whilst the mean sea level is rising.

Current predictions of sea level rise due to climate change in this area are for around 1.0 m rise over 100 years.¹ The long-term rate is 2.1 mm/yr since records began in the 1890s, which equates to 0.25 m. This rate has increased over time. Since 1990 it has been more in the order of 3.1 mm/yr. In addition, it has been shown that there is regional tectonic subsidence in the order of 1.7 mm/yr for Wellington City. We need to be planning for an 80-125 mm sea level rise within a 20-30 year design life of a coastal structure.

This is significant, because the tidal range is only in the order of 0.86 m above mean sea level and these increases in average sea height have been pushing up the reach of the tides over time. This has a big impact during storm events, allowing waves to penetrate higher up the shore. Local sea level is elevated with low barometric pressure and during storm events when the sea is blown up against the shore (an effect known as storm surge). For Wellington city, this can result in sea level being raised by close to 1.0 m during a storm. Large waves and wave run-up add on to this and consequently, wave activity can reach 2-3 times higher up a beach than normal during a storm at high tide.

We have seen the impacts of this three times already in the past 12 months along the Wellington south coast with large damaging waves overtopping seawalls, damaging roads, boatsheds, houses and other utilities infrastructure. The Island Bay seawall was damaged in the largest of these events in June 2013.

Sea level rise will continue for the foreseeable future and will be exacerbated by the tectonic subsidence that is currently at rates of 1-2mm/yr downward. We might expect that the events of June last year, where large waves easily overtopped seawalls and roads and encroached into waterfront property, to become a much more frequent and regular occurrence. These storm tide events can be damaging because they result in a temporary rise in the local sea level for 24-72 hrs from a combination of low air pressure, strong onshore winds and high waves. When this coincides with high tide, these storm events can be destructive to infrastructure and waterfront properties.

# 4. Natural character and indigenous ecosystems

Policy 23 of the RPS provides criteria to identify ecosystems and habitats with significant indigenous biodiversity values. Ecosystems and habitats will be considered significant if they meet any one of five criteria, including rarity. Rare ecosystems or habitat have biological or physical features that are scarce or threatened in a local, regional or national context. The Ministry for the Environment Statement of National Priorities² notes that only 21,300 hectares of dunelands are left in New Zealand, comprising only 11.6 percent of their original extent. The dune system within the area of the existing seawall and Shorland Park is classified as 'acutely threatened'³. We note that the protection of this ecosystem type is supported by National Priority 1 of the Statement of National Priorities, which is 'to protect indigenous vegetation associated with land environments⁴ that have 20 percent or less remaining in indigenous cover'. As nationally threatened ecosystems, the dune systems at Island Bay therefore meet the criteria for rarity under the RPS.

Policy 47 of the RPS provides guidance on managing the effects of activities on ecosystems and habitats with significant indigenous biodiversity values. It notes that particular regard should be given to 'maintaining connections within, or corridors between, habitats of indigenous flora and fauna, and/or enhancing the connectivity between fragmented indigenous habitats'. Through the planting of native species, the soft engineering options would reconnect a significant area of dune ecosystem, restoring the connection between the dune

systems in Shorland Park and the beach, and potentially between Shorland Park and the re-vegetated dunes at the western end of the beach⁵.

Policy 47 also states that particular regard should be given to 'protecting the life supporting capacity of indigenous ecosystems and habitats'. This is supported by Policy 35 of the RPS, which promotes 'maintaining or enhancing biodiversity and the functioning of ecosystems' in the coastal environment specifically. Policies 35 and 36 in the RPS further emphasise the need to both preserve and pursue 'opportunities to remedy or mitigate previous damage to the natural character', including the value of dune systems. GWRC therefore supports the development of options that seek to employ soft engineering approaches to managing the Island Bay coastline and provide an opportunity to restore previous damage to ecological functionality and natural character.

# 5. Operational matters

### 5.1 Public transport operations

The Island Bay community is currently served by bus routes 1, 4 and 32 which give residents access to Wellington CBD.

Route 1 is a frequent core service operating an average of every 10 minutes throughout the day. Routes 4 and 32 are peak services which also operate an average of every 10 minutes during peak times.

While none of these services use The Esplanade as a through route while in service, the current road layout allows buses to use Reef Street, The Esplanade, and The Parade to re-position and turn around. Any roading change that affects use of these streets would mean an alternative re-positioning route, or method, will be required.

Options 1, 2, 3 and 4 will have little impact on current public transport services as they do not alter the ability for bus services to use The Esplanade. However, ongoing discussion between GWRC and WCC would be required to ensure that any roading design which maintains The Esplanade as a through-route would meet the design requirements for bus services to operate on them.

As The Esplanade remains a through route under options 1-3, it is unlikely that general traffic patterns would significantly change to cause congestion on Reef Street and The Parade where bus services currently operate.

Option 5 impacts the ability for traffic to through route along The Esplanade. There would be an impact on the operation of the peak time Route 32 Houghton Bay bus route which travels along The Esplanade, Reef Street and The Parade.

In addition, the out of service buses that currently also position between Kilbirnie bus depot and the Island Bay Terminus on The Parade using The Esplanade and Reef Street would be impacted by losing the link between The Esplanade and Reef Street.

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As The Esplanade could not be used as a through route by general traffic under options 4 and 5, there is also the potential that this traffic would migrate to roads currently used by bus services and cause congestion.

It is important that public transport considerations are taken into account as work progresses on the Island Bay Seawall Project. Island Bay is a key terminus for bus services in the public transport network and the ability to turn a bus at this terminus is crucial.

# 5.2 Harbour navigation and safety

GWRC currently has poles located on either side of The Esplanade to provide lead lights for vessels coming and going from the Bay in darkness. If the seawall and/or parts of the road are removed or realigned and it becomes necessary to move the poles from where they currenty stand, GWRC would like to work with WCC to ensure that they are relocated to a position:

- near to where the current poles are positioned;
- where power is available; and
- where there are no bright lights facing out to sea, to ensure the navigation lights are visible to vessels entering and leaving the Bay.

# 6. Recommendations

In summary, GWRC:

- supports the further development of options that seek to employ soft engineering approaches to managing coastal hazards and indigenous ecosystems, consistent with the direction provided the RPS
- requests that harbour safety and navigation, including the possible need for relocation of navigation lights, be given appropriate consideration in the evaluation of options
- requests ongoing discussion with WCC as the options are further developed to ensure that public transport considerations are taken into account
- requests that Traffic Management Assessments be undertaken once the list of shortlisted options is known.

# 7. Conclusion
