WCC Reserve re-classification, Belmont Regional Park

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the reserve re-classifications. In particular I would like to focus on the following area (excerpt from your report):

Name and location Reserve managed as part of Belmont Regional Park

On eastern side near end of Horokiwi Road, Horokiwi. Slopes down towards Korokoro Valley

Ecology and landscape This large reserve is managed by Greater Wellington Regional Council as part of Belmont Regional Park.

This north facing reserve contains several significant forest remnants, totalling almost 15ha. This provides important ecological connectivity between Belmont Regional Park, the Hillcroft Road Reserves and Caribbean Avenue Reserve. This reserve contributes to the bush covered slopes of the Korokoro Valley and can be seen from western hill suburbs in Lower Hutt.

Current use Recreation: This reserve has the Horokiwi Bridleway track for horse riding, mountain biking and tramping. The track starts at the end of Horokiwi Road and goes down towards the valley floor.

Utility: Electricity and telecommunication.

Other values The historic Maori track between Hutt Valley and Takapu crossed this land.

Future development Investigate future management options.

Legal description Pt Sec 14-16 and 20 Horokiwi Road District

CT WN19B/69 105.9142 ha

Proposed classification Scenic B Reserve to protect

- 1) ecological values -forest remnant, seed source, ecological connectivity and
- 2) landscape values contributes to Korokoro Valley.

Current recreation activities and utility uses can still occur on scenic B reserve.

GW agrees with the proposed classification of 'Scenic B Reserve'. While there are still sections of gorse, there is a súbstantial amount of regenerating native bush, particularly prevalent in the gully's within the reserve. It is an important part of the upper catchment of the Horokiwi stream. We note that the adjacent reserves, namely Belmonth Reserve, Hillcroft Road Reserves and Carribean Avenue Reserve, within WCC jurisdiction will also be Scenic B Reserve. Classification as Scenic B will ensure that the catchment is management consistently.

We do, however recommend that the recreation values of this section of Belmont are noted in the description. The reserve contains a bridle way and has the only access from this side of Belmont Regional Park. It is intended that these recreation connections be maintained.

As noted in the description, this land is managed by Greater Wellington Regional Council. We are interested in formalising this though a Section 17 Agreement under the Local Government Act 2002.

Comments on proposed reserve classifications: Dear Michael Oates,

Greater Wellington supports the proposals in general and would like to commend Wellington City Council on the considerable effort they are putting into formalising the legal protection of these public assets. This submission is on the entire proposal, and should be read alongside the specific submission from GW Parks Deartment on the land that forms part of Belmont Regional Park.

Most of the proposals for classification seem to be entirely appropriate, but some seem to be inconsistent with the general approach taken, or some of the values or issues may have been overlooked in the description provided. The few specific concerns we have are outlined below.

Grasslees Reserve - a provision should be made to protect the stream values and plant appropriate native vegetation on the stream banks of the Porirua Stream where possible in the future.

Waihinahina Park- while recognising that the current Open Space B zoning

gives some short term protection, a large proportion of site is regenerating native forest providing an important back drop to harbour and city and with natural character and scenic values, Greater Wellington suggests a Scenic Reserve B status is more appropriate for most of the land. Only a small proportion of site is used for recreation, and could be defined and classified accordingly as a recreation reserve.

Caribbean Avenue - appears to be a water reservoir on the land but not mentioned in description of utilities present.

Awarua Street - Support classification, but suggest either cessation of grazing or fencing to formalise grazing area and protect ecological values.

Otari Farm - Plans for future harvest or removal of pines should be developed. View Road Headland - Support classification, but there appears to be some encroachment in the reserve by an adjoining landowner.

We also would like to note that the proposal is consistent with both the proposed and operative Regional Policy Statements, in particular the Indigenous Ecosystems provisions. We would also like to note that Greater Wellington continues to work with WCC to achieve a high standard of management of pest animals and environmental weeds many of the reserves in the proposal, in particular those containing regenerating native forest, coastal ecosystems and wetlands. We also note that the protection of these areas will considerably add to the protection of ecological connectivity at a landscape scale within Wellington City, but also with existing and developing natural areas in Porirua and Hutt City.

Comments on proposed reserve classifications: I strongly support having all council land brought under the Reserves Act. This provides a far higher level of protection for the public interest than simply relying on the Local Government Act.

The council should be raising with the government the current legal problems in achieving reserve classification for reserves taken on subdivision.

I question the recreation reserve status proposal for Waihinahina. For such a large reserve with "a significant forest remnant", scenic B reserve would be more appropriate, perhaps with some split off under recreation reserve status.

I question the scenic B reserve status for Otari Wilton's bush. This is the most significant bush reserve in that part of Wellington, and should have Scenic A reserve status. The status for the part being classified and the existing reserve should match - for administrative purposes it would be presumably easier if they were all the same reserve. I have looked at the gazette notice for the existing reserve and it appears to only be classified scenic, not as A or B. Tidying that up would be useful.

I also think that Tawa reserve also warrants a Scenic A classification, given its

significance.

Proposed reserve classifications for Otari Wilton's Bush and surrounding areas

Otari Wilton's Bush Trust welcomes the opportunity to comment on the proposed reserve classifications for Northern Reserves, Outer Green Belt and some city sites.

In addition to the proposal concerning Otari Wilton's Bush, the Trust has a view on the proposed Scenic B reserve classification for Kilmister Tops, Johnston's Hill and Otari farms, all of which are adjacent to or close to Otari Wilton's Bush. The Trust supports the recommendation for these areas to be classified as Scenic B Reserve as it will protect these areas for the future. It also supports the classification of the sport field area covered by the Otari Wilton's Bush proposal as Recreation Reserve.

With regard to the proposal to classify the area of Otari Wilton's Bush (OWB) not already classified as Scenic Reserve, particularly the area surrounding the Kaiwharawhara Stream and Track, the Trust does not support the proposed Scenic Reserve B classification. We assume, but have not been able to verify this, that the existing area of Otari Wilton's Bush classified as Scenic Reserve is classified as Scenic A Reserve. If this is not so, then we believe it should be.

To maintain consistency with the current classification of the existing Reserve area, assuming that it is Scenic A, we believe that the southerly end of Otari Wilton's Bush listed as Area 8 in Section B on page 32 of the proposal document should receive the same classification as the existing Reserve area of Otari Wilton's Bush.

The purposes set out for a Scenic A and a Scenic B Reserve are different. For Scenic A it is: "to protect and preserve in perpetuity, for their intrinsic worth and for the public benefit, enjoyment and use, areas of scenic interest or beauty or features worthy of protection in the public interest" while for Scenic B it is: "a suitable area of land (or land and water) which by development and the introduction of flora, whether indigenous or exotic, will become of significant scenic interest or beauty". We believe that a Scenic A classification would seem much more appropriate for the OWB areas which already have a good cover of flora and are already of significant interest or beauty rather than the Scenic B purpose which is looking to the future for those areas to become of significant scenic interest or beauty through the introduction of flora.

One of the main differences also between Scenic A and Scenic B is that for Scenic A one of the objectives of management is to: "preserve indigenous flora and fauna, biological associations and the natural environment as far as possible" and "exterminate exotic flora and fauna as far as possible" whereas for Scenic B it is to: "as appropriate, exterminate exotic fauna and (to the extent consistent with purpose) exotic flora as far as possible.." In the management of the Kaiwharawhara Stream area south of the Troup Picnic area the Trust is attempting to meet the objectives for Scenic

A rather than the lesser objectives set out for Scenic B. Our objective is to eliminate all exotic vegetation and only plant eco-sourced indigenous plants and that objective certainly seems to be shared by the Otari staff.

The Trust believes that the area under consideration for classification should be incorporated into the OWB management area with staff resources sufficient for the realisation of this objective as set out in section 3.7.2 of the Otari Native Botanic Garden and Wilton's Bush Reserve Management Plan approved in July 2007.

Thank you for the opportunity for NZ Historic Places Trust Pouhere Taonga (NZHPT) to provide comments on the Wellington City Council proposed Reserve Classifications. NZHPT is an autonomous Crown Entity with statutory responsibility under the Historic Places Act 1993 for the identification, protection, preservation and conservation of New Zealand's historical and cultural heritage. The Historic Places Act also confirms NZHPT as New Zealand's lead historic heritage agency.

Introduction

Wellington City Council has a rich history, and historic places that are inseparable from the community's sense of place. The town of Wellington was planned in 1840 and one of its early innovations was to set aside extensive parklands around the town. Along with the natural features shaping the region, built form and Maori heritage are significant contributors to its identity and character. These features and places of significance help us to remember, to learn and to share our stories with others.

Proposed Reserve Land Classifications

As stated in the reserves classification document Wellington City Council is planning to classify some areas of land as reserve in the northern suburbs and in the Outer Green Belt, as well as a small number of other sites around the city. The purpose of this is to strengthen and standardize the protection of these sites. There are a large number of sites that the Council intends to classify or re-classify as reserve land according to their primary purpose; 49 sites are managed under the Northern Reserves Management Plan, 16 sites under the Outer Green Belt Management Plan and three other sites in the city.

Definition of Historic Heritage

NZHPT understands that for the purpose of these reserves, historic values are to be considered under the Reserves Act. The purpose of a historic reserve being: to protect and preserve in perpetuity places, objects and natural features of historic, archaeological cultural, educational and other special interest. However it may be useful to note that the 2003 RMA amendments elevated historic heritage to a matter of national importance under Section 6f of the RMA directing Councils to recognise and provide for the protection of historic heritage from inappropriate subdivision, use and development. Additionally these amendments include a comprehensive definition of historic heritage, where previously there was none. The definition is:

historic heritage-

- (a) means those natural and physical resources that contribute to an understanding and appreciation of New Zealand's history and cultures, deriving from any of the following qualities:
- (i) archaeological:
- (ii) architectural:
- (iii) cultural:
- (iv) historic:
- (v) scientific:
- (vi) technological; and
- (b) includes—
 - (i) historic sites, structures, places, and areas; and
 - (ii) archaeological sites; and
 - (iii) sites of significance to Māori, including wāhi tapu; and
 - (iv) surroundings associated with the natural and physical resources

This comprehensive definition of historic heritage may be important to note for Council when assessing heritage values within the reserves. In particular tangata whenua values and archaeology are important considerations for heritage values within these areas.

Old Coach Road

The NZ Historic Places Trust has statutory responsibility for the National Register of historic places which is another important consideration for historic values. It is noted in the document that *Old Coach Road* is in the District Plan as a heritage site and is registered as a Category I Historic Place by NZHPT. However the proposed classification for that site is to protect the landscape values only and historic values are not considered within this reserve. The document states that one area will not be classified as reserve until the alignment of the McLintock Street extension is finalised. NZHPT would like to see historic values included within the criteria for this reserve, as the Old Coach Road is a significant heritage site and an important component of this reserve.

NZHPT is supportive of Fort Buckley coastal defence site being included as a historic reserve

Archaeology

There are a number of recorded archaeological sites within Wellington City on the New Zealand Archaeological Association records. NZHPT advocates that Wellington City Council use *ArchSite*, which is the NZ Archaeological Association database for recorded archaeological sites in New Zealand. This database can be used to ensure that no recorded archaeological sites have been missed in any of the reserve areas, therefore ensure that all of the historic values of the reserves have not been missed. *ArchSite* is GIS format and is 'live streaming' therefore has the most up to date information available for archaeology in New Zealand. For any works to an archaeological site the archaeological provisions of the Historic Places Act 1993 will apply. Subscribing to *ArchSite* will help Council meet their legal obligations under the HPA.

Management plans are a statutory requirement under the Reserves Act. NZHPT is able to provide input to development of any management plans for reserves with historic values.

NZHPT looks, forward to working with Council towards the proposed reserve classifications, and providing greater protection for these sites within Wellington City.



I live alongside the yellow striped strip of land from Cranwell St through to Edward Wilson Park which is flat alongside my home and that of my neighbour in the other half of a two flat building. The strip of land which is the stormwater drain then goes down a steep bank to the park below my property.

For many years, since the death of our neighbour at number 26 Cranwell who used to mow this strip of land, my neighbour and I have paid every three weeks to have the marked strip of land mowed to keep it under control. When the stormwater drains were renewed some years ago the area was "re-grassed" with very poor seed and it is now mostly weeds and moss and over time the ground has subsided somewhat, making mowing more difficult.

I would like to know what difference it is going to make by the rezoning - does this mean that because it is no longer residential but "open space" that the Council will be tending it to make sure it doesn't become overgrown? The area down the bank - partly my land and partly Council land, has also been a problem with blackberry, convolvulus, "wandering willie" and other weeds which make their way up the bank onto my land. The Parks and Gardens have sprayed the blackberry to keep it under control over the years since the death of the neighbour at No. 26 who used to also do the spraying. However, the "wandering willie" and convolvulus come up the bank and strangle the plants I have on both sides of my back fence. I am finding it increasingly difficult to keep the weeds on the bank under control as it is very steep.

I would be interested in having a talk with someone about the area and the responsibility for looking after your strip of land.





I am writing, on behalf of Powerco Limited ("Powerco"), with regard to the proposal by the Wellington City Council to classify a number of reserves in the Wellington City under the Reserves Act 1997.




Grenada North Park [Map 1]



Caribbean Avenue Reserve and Hillcroft Road Reserve [Map 3]







Hi Mike,

A grand effort getting this document together!!

I know I am out of time, but I wanted to make a couple of minor comments for you to consider.

Wingfield Place Reserves.

I feel that you should note the current utilities on the site.

The main water supply pipe to Churton Park comes down the narrow access link to Otanga Place, then heads across the site north to Halswater Drive.

The main sewer from the northern slopes of Johnsonville comes down Middleton Rd, then crosses diagonally across the site

There are also local sewer and stormwater pipes from Otanga Place.

These utilities were not advised to the group before work started, as they should have been.

Also the reserve is managed in conjunction with the strip of road reserve on the western boundary.

GW land adjacent to and including Stebbings Dam

I raised this issue with WCC in my earlier submission.

This are is used as a de facto WCC reserve by the locals, but no mention appears to be made of it. The area will become an important link in the network of reserves and walking tracks to be established in due course from Stebbings Road up the valley.

I do not wish to make a presentation as these are just editorial comments.

General Comments

(a) Introduction

I strongly support strengthening the protection of these areas and thus support the proposals in general. I commend the Council on continuing to check through our open spaces to identify situations where this should be done. I, like I suspect many other Wellingtonians, had assumed that some of those that are not reserves already actually were.

(b) Scenic A/B

I note that Scenic A has not been proposed for any of the areas and wonder if there are some parts where the level of modification is sufficiently low and remnant/regenerating values potentially high enough that that rather than Scenic B should be used. I would support submissions that provided such evidence and reasoning.

(c) Use of Local Purpose:

I agree that local purpose rather than recreation is an appropriate classification where buildings have more of a community than sport focus. Where a significant part of the site is not occupied by such buildings it would be preferable to split the classification using "Local Purpose" for only the footprint of those buildings with the remainder having the more protected(restricted) purpose. I note that approach has apparently been adopted for Spenmoor Street and Seton Nossiter Park. I say "apparently" as I am unfamiliar with those two sites, and indeed others. I assume the same judgement has been applied elsewhere and support that.

(d) District Plan rezoning:

I generally support the rezoning, in particular that to Open Space B. I note that having to deal with the reversed significance of the "lettered" suffix (Scenic A gives greater protection than Scenic B, but Open Space B more than Open Space A) is potentially confusing.

Specific points

(e) Hillcroft Road, Carribean Avenue & Belmont Reserves plus part of the Regional Park
These form a valuable connection across to the Regional Park, not only for trampers, but more

significantly as part of the network of ecological corridors. I strongly support these being properly protected.

(f) Old Coach Road

While I support protection of the environment of the Old Coach Road and the enjoyment of that through recreation by the classification of the areas here as scenic B reserve, I am concerned that there is still talk of the "McLintock Street extension".

(g) Aerial Maps:

These maps certainly help in identifying the location of the proposed new/reclassified reserves. They would be much more useful if existing reserves (that weren't being reclassified) were also shown. Having a "complete picture" would allow the value of the additions/changes to be judged in context (otherwise some look distinctly odd e.g. Tawatawa Reserve). Additionally that would allow potential omissions to be picked up. For example the continuity, or otherwise, of the outer green belt and its formal protection as reserve from the South Coast to Colonial Knob is very important, but cannot be assessed from these maps – is a particular gap on the map because it is already protected as reserve or because it is not and is not (yet) proposed to be ? I'm sure it would also be positive for Council in that residents would see how much of this good work it has already been completed. Please include this detail information in future reserve classification proposals.

(h) Awarua, Kilmister Tops, Otari Farms & Johnston Hill

I strongly support the classification (& reclassification from recreation) to Scenic B of these. The Skyline Track is a highlight of Wellington walking opportunities and its open, undeveloped character with scope for (and some actual) regeneration is fully deserving of such protection.

(i) Wright Hill, Makara Peak, Carey's Gully & Birdwood Reserve These deserve protection, in particular as they adjoin the Karori Sanctuary and form the immediate connections thence for ecological corridors across Wellington.

(j) Te Kopahou

The wild and rugged South Coast is a significant feature of Wellington and this large area connects to that and forms the southern end of the ecological corridor. It is also "local" for me.

(k) Tawatawa Reserve:

The omission of this strip from the previous set of classifications was an obvious anomaly questioned by many at that time. Thank you for fixing that this time around.

Additional Points

(l) Page 3:

Counting the Northern reserves sites listed separately under section A (pages 1&2)) I found a total of 50 [Tawa(19), Grenada North & Takapu Rd(5), Churton Park(5), Johnsonville(1), Newlands(12), Woodridge(2), Grenada Village(3) and Horokiwi(3)]. Counting by category in section A detail (pages 7-24) I found Sports(6), Local Parks(13), Bush Reserves(27), and Others(3) totalling 49 to match (page 3) "49 sites are managed under the Northern Reserves Management Plan". I am concerned at the apparent inconsistency and hope one of the sites listed on Page 1 & Page 2 has not somehow been missed from the detailed entries.

(m)Implications of classification categories

I'm pleased to see that the explanation here has been extended from that in the previous proposal by noting classification provides certainty on not only what can but also what cannot take place on the land.

Comments on proposed reserve classifications: We totally support the proposed classification of the Hillcroft Road Reserves to at least Scenic B. Scenic A classification would recognise the ecological value of the area more and protect the area from the encroaching urbanisation of the Lincolnshire Farm development. There are endangered ecosystems containing "Spaniard Grass" (Aciphylla squarrosa) on the uppermost tussock hills above the current reserves which should also be recognised and protected.

This region can be identified as the penny plains and are therefore, by association, ruggered and inhospitable much of the time. This creates unique environments and colonisers, both flora and fauna which must be protected. At the southern end of the Hillcroft Rd Reserve, there are waterfalls and remnants of native bush which are a delight to tramp through, as a group local residents did last Sunday. The greater population and future generations should be able to enjoy this area as much as we do. Our community is actively replanting the newly named Horokiwi Reserve, between Horokiwi Rd and Woollaston Way, as we look to our future generations' wellbeing. We own one of the lifestyle blocks that are adjacent to the Hillcroft Rd Reserve. We have fenced off large areas of bush and streams to let the native regenerate as a continuation of the neighbouring reserve. This is our commitment to managing the native environment.

Organisation Name: Seton Nossiter Park Working Group

Comments on proposed reserve classifications: The Seton Nossiter Park Working Group was formed in the mid nineties, to coordinate the community contribution to the planning of the Park, in particular, the 1996-2006 Management Plan. Since then, it has continued to advise Wellington City Council on community aspirations for the Park and carry out native tree planting. In the last three seasons, it has combined with Woodridge Planters to plant 2000 trees in the park, with excellent community support. It is restructuring its organisation to scale up this restoration work. Seton Nossiter Park is a Wellington City Council reserve of more than 13 hectares, situated between the suburbs of Grenada Village, Paparangi and Woodridge. It is connected to the equally large Belmont Gully, which will be vested in the Council as part of the Lincolnshire Farms residential development. The Park is of high importance, as a recreational area for the surrounding suburbs and as a critical component of an ecological corridor that links the Belmont Reserve on the western hills of the Hutt Valley with the reserves in the northern suburbs and the Tawa basin. Seton Nossiter Park has regenerating native bush and a remnant titoki/tawa forest on the valley floor. A major tributary of the Porirua Stream runs through it, providing habitat for native fish. The Park is long and narrow, with steep hills on both sides that provide a

sheltered environment for many native birds, including a large population of kereru. As noted in the Proposed Reserves Classification document, Se ton Nossiter Park has significant historical value also.

The Seton Nossiter Park Working Group supports the reclassification of Seton Nossiter Park to Scenic B reserve, as a way of strengthening the protection of its ecological and historical values, consistent with its recreational use.

Comments on proposed zoning changes: If the rezoning is to now include the 3 higher terraced fields, I like to propose that Council take actions to clean up and maintain the edges of the reserves where rubbish are dumped and grass overgrown. Moreover having a property next to the proposed rezone reserve, it is noticed that there is very poor drainage in the low areas - rain water flowing off the higher grounds are flowing down towards the lower lying areas of the reserve and the surrounding properties, and causing the grounds in the lower reserve area and the adjoining properties to be water-logged especially after heavy downpours and during the wintery months. It would be appreciated if Council will consider installing proper drainage to trap the downwards-flowing water from the higher grounds and channel the flows into the stormwater drainage available in the area, thereby keeping the whole rezoned reserve area dry.

Comments on proposed reserve classifications: 1. Woodridge Planters Inc. is a volunteer organisation involved in restoration projects in Newlands, Woodridge, and Paparangi.

- 2. Generally, Woodridge Planters supports the increased protection provided by the reclassifications.
- 3. We are surprised that some of the more outstanding areas of forest, such as that in Otari-Wilton's Bush and Khandallah Park, are not recommended for Scenic A reserve status and would urge Wellington City Council to adopt this higher level of protection for such areas.
- 4. White Pine Avenue Reserve: Woodridge Planters Inc. supports the reclassification to Scenic B reserve status. We note that there are mature pukatea, kohekohe and rewarewa in White Pine Avenue Reserve and, in the weedy pockets, a neighbouring household has undertaken restoration (with the support of Woodridge Planters and WCC).
- 5. 79 Kentwood Drive Reserve: The reclassification to Scenic B reserve is supported. Recently, Woodridge Planters has started restoration activity in this reserve.
- 6. Kentwood Drive Reserve: This is not mentioned in the document. More than 5,000 native trees have been planted in this small, 2.7 ha reserve in the

past 6 years, including a high number of podocarps. In time, the bush will turn into forest. The Reserve is also used for recreational activity, more so since the installation of a playground in 2010. Woodridge Planters would encourage a classification that recognises the high potential of this reserve, given the restoration work that has been carried out.

- 7. Woodridge Reserve: This reserve is adjacent to the reserves in Kentwood Drive and to Seton Nossiter Park. It is not mentioned in the document but should be given scenic reserve status, if it has not been already.
- 8. Seton Nossiter Park. This park has significant ecological and historical value and a Scenic B status, as a minimum, is supported. In recent years, Woodridge Planters has worked with the Seton Nossiter Park Working Group to carry out restoration work, with strong support from the community.
- 9. Gilberd Bush reserve: This reserve is an important corridor to the reserves which Woodridge planters is helping to restore. A strengthening of its classification to Scenic B reserve status is supported.
- 10. Waihinahina Park in memory of Dennis Duggan. As noted in the document, Nga Hau e Wha o Papararangi Society has started restoration in the vicinity of its papakainga. The Society's restoration programme is supported by Woodridge Planters, which regards restoration as badly needed. Woodridge Planters supports the proposed reclassification, with the proviso that it should be reviewed as the park undergoes restoration.

Comments.

- 1. First I would like to congratulate Council officers for the excellent material contained in the various reports, eg the maps will of great use for other purposes. My comments relate only to those areas with which I am familiar.
- 2. I SUPPORT the changes to Scenic B Reserve for the following, which will protect landscape/bush features and allow walking tracks to remain:
 - for land around the Old Coach Rd;
 - for additional parts of Johnsonville and Khandallah Parks;
 - Awarua St Reserves:
 - Kilminster Tops:
 - Otari-Wilton Bush additions
 - Otari Farms
- I SUPPORT the change to Historic Reserve for Fort Buckley.
- 4. I am disappointed that no in-depth consideration seems to have been given to changing the zoning of the land around the 'lower' sections (Johnsonville side) of Old Coach Rd. Reserve Classifications.

I spoke to you after receiving your letter of 30 June (concerning reserve classifications on the south coast) mentioning that the Trelissick Park Group had written to Council twice concerning arious classification and map details. We did not get replies although some action was taken. I attach copies of the two letters. The following comments are made:

- we were grateful for the Meade land (upstream from Wightwicks Field) to be reclassified Conservation. However there are still two important strips of land either side of the Field – part of the Northern Walkway – which do not appear on maps and which are zoned Outer Residential as part of the private ownership. These need examining for clarity purposes. What sort of 'ownership' does WCC have?

- there is also the zoning of Wightwicks Field itself. Surely, like the historic magazine site, it could be rezoned Conservation.

- since the letters were written, more land has been leased by WCC from KiwiRail alongside the Korimako Stream. This has allowed our Group to arrange for the eradication of weeds and plant with natives. Can some marking be included on the maps to show this. There is also an area below Wadestown which is leased from KiwiRail.

- there was the question of adjoining private land (below Hanover St) covenanted to QEII National Trust which could be usefully marked on the maps.

- in the letter of 14 March 2007 road reserve areas were mentioned. The Group has had to be eavily involved in the plans for WCC's road strengthening work alongside Ngaio Gorge Rd. including restoration plantings. The upper two garages have just been demolished on the latest site. It would seem that some of this extensive road reserve should be part of the Park. A major issue relates to the road reserve which encompasses the main entrance to the Park off Kaiwharawhara Rd. That should definitely be considered for Conservation zoning and within the Park boundaries.

- the same letter refers to showing the route of the streams throughout the Park. It just disappears in various places.

We look forward to your reply. It would be good to have a' tidying' job.

ZONE CHANGES TO MAP 21 OF DISTRICT PLAN

We have noted some recent small changes made by WCC to District Plan Maps to 'tidy' up various situations in Wellington.. We were not aware of the exercise or would have requested some changes to zones relating to Trelissick Park. We mention these below:

- we note that since WCC purchased the 'historic magazine' site, the zone was changed to "Conservation" aligning with most of the rest of the Park

Wightwicks Field was gifted to WCC and is zoned Open Space B – it should be Conservation

the land upstream from W Field with a main entrance to the Park from Waikowhai St. was purchased from Meade by WCC but is still zoned Outer Residential. It should be Conservation. We have done a lot of pest removal and revegetation on this steep site and it makes an attractive area accessing the stream at various points...

does Map 21 need altering to show the fenced strip of land belonging to the Pitchforths which now connects Wightwicks Field with the new bridge upstream on to the former Meade land. This will depend on the type of WCC agreement allowing this through-way. There is a similar situation regarding the narrow access downstream from Wightwicks Field but perhaps this strip was purchased by WCC.

- there are two odd shaped pieces of Park at the top bend of Ngaio Gorge Rd which we believe are both zoned Conservation. Please confirm?

It would seem helpful to get rid of this messy situation and get all the Park zoned consistently into Conservation zone. These are mainly longstanding issues and it is important that they are dealt with before any review of the 1995 Management Plan which does not incorporate some of the above areas as part of Trelissick Park and, therefore, governed under the Reserves Act.

At some stage it would also be helpful and 'tidy' to incorporate some of the very wide pieces of road reserve along Kaiwharawhara and Ngaio Gorge Roads into the Park and zone them Conservation. For example, the new lower entrance into the Park from Kaiwharawhara Rd is road reserve for a long stretch. This is incongruous.

We look forward to your reply.

TRELISSICK PARK - SUGGESTED REZONING CHANGES FOR DP MAPS

Thank you for your letter of 31 January on the above subject enclosing a copy of DP Map 21 and an enlarged portion of part of the Park. It would be helpful to see similar aerial maps for the rest of the Park, particularly for the Ngaio Gorge Rd area to show the exact location of the road reserves in relation to the footpath/road.

We apologise for the delay in replying but have had a heavy load of work in recent months. We give below our requests with the paragraph numbers located on the map for reference.

1. Waikowhai St Road Reserve. The road reserve in this area includes a major entrance to the Park, where we have been doing a lot of clearing work and planting. We would like to a stretch of the reserve incorporated into the Park and zoned Conservation. We believe that only a minimum buffer is required alongside the pavement for road reserve.

2. 'Meade' land below Waikowhai St (Meade was the owner from whom the land was purchased by WCC). There are two sections (one crossing the stream) which are zoned Outer Residential and should be changed to Conservation. We have done a lot of work in this area to restore the bush and improve the streamside.

3. Wightwick's Field. This is an open area given by the Wightwick family. It is zoned Open Space B and could also be considered for Conservation zone. NB. The open historic site in the lower Kaiwharawhara valley is zoned Conservation.

4. Two strips of land alongside the Korimako Stream. One strip is immediately upstream from Wightwick's Field to allow access to the Meade land, whilst the other is immediately downstream from Wightwick's Field to provide access to all the other Park tracks. Both strips are part of the Northern Walkway and both are zoned Outer Residential, as they are part of private properties. WCC has negotiated with the owners to obtain this access (we do not have copies of the agreements). Somehow these strips need showing on the DP maps as they are important links.

5. <u>Railway land leased to WCC</u>. There are two pieces of railway land (Ontrack/Railways Corporation) leased to WCC allowing track access (by four new bridges) down the Korimako Stream and these areas are to be planted with natives this winter. It would be helpful to have these leases delineated somehow on the Map.

6. Road Reserve Areas. Along the south side of the Ngaio Gorge Rd and the Kaiwharawhara Rd the road reserve (presumably historically) dips into the

perceived Park area several times. As stated above, we believe that only a minimum buffer is required alongside the pavement for the road reserve and would request that other bits of road reserve be included formally in the Park and zoned Conservation. In addition the **major** entrance to the Park off Kaiwharawhara Rd (leading to the historic buildings and alongside an historic wall) is all road reserve and should be formally included in the Park and zoned Conservation. Much native planting has taken place here. The other entrance further up the road with a carpark should the Park,

it is in a slightly different situation. These anachronisms need to be rectified - we have wanted something done for many years concerning road

reserves and to tidy the boundaries.

7. Special marking for land covenanted to QEII Nat. Trust. All except one of the properties on Hanover St with land stretching down to the Kaiwharawhara Stream have covenanted their land to the QEII Trust. We believe that it could be a positive step for the owners and WCC to consider some special marking (ie stripes) on their (yellow) Outer Residential land to show the areas covenanted

. We (the Group and Trust members) have been conferring with several

Trelissick Crescent owners for similar covenanting.

We will be opening discussions again this year.

8. Map to show the streams. We note that DP Map 21 does not show the Kaiwharawhara Stream as it flows through the historic site (No.163) to the Park exit. Outside the park, but on Map 21, other bits of the streams (particularly along the Korimako) do not appear on the Map even though they are above ground. Where the streams pass through private land, it would be most helpful if they could be shown and, where in a culvert, appear as a dotted line. Such information is sometimes needed to obtain exact locations.

It would probably be useful to meet with you and discuss the situation 'on the ground' so that you can see for yourself the exact locations.

Comments on proposed reserve classifications: RE: 79 Kenwood Drive Reserve

Thank you for including the local residents in your consideration of the Newlands area Wellington City Council reserve land.

Our property at 12 Pigeonwood Lane, borders the reserve at 79 Kentwood Drive, Woodridge.

In 2001, prior to our home being built, our section was leveled to become one area with the reserve which we currently utilize as part of our lawn. Neighbouring properties eitherside of us had boundary fences established on their boundary connecting the Wellington City Council reserve as part of the subdivision development, but our section didn't. At the time we approached the Wellington City Council, with a view to purchase or lease this small piece of land to increase the size of our lawn. The person we spoke to indicated that the Wellington City Council would not be interested in doing this, and were not concerned with gorse growing prolifically within a few metres of our home. They were however happy for us to care for it.

We then planted in excess of 200 native plants down the bank to try and

eliminate the gorse becoming a fire hazard so close to our home, along with a 'hedge' of flaxes to encourage the Tui and other birds to share our lifestyle. We are pleased to see they are coming in increased numbers every year. To the best of our knowledge, our caring for the land has been of benefit to the Wellington City Council Reserve and it's birdlife.

We saw this extra lawn area as an extension of our lawn (with the understanding that it is not legally ours) and have used it to that benefit. We have not erected any permanent structures on it, and our children and neighbouring children have enjoyed the benefits of having a slightly larger yard.

We understand your need to clarify the Council land boundaries, as any land owner would want to. Given the inaccessibility of this land to public, we would like to propose that an agreement be made between the Council and residents on the use of publicly inaccessible Wellington City Council reserve land (which will be for private benefit, given it's inaccessibility to others) with either;

- guidelines set by the Council for its use i.e. no permanent structures being erected
- or, the potential of residents being able to lease the land.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

It has come to our attention that land at the end of Hillcroft Road, Horokiwi is to be officially classified as Reserve with some changes. It disappoints us that Wellington City Council has, in this instance, failed to individually notify residents who will be directly affected by the changes. Again we have heard of Council intentions through our neighbours. It concerns us that Council may have some hidden agenda with developers at the expense of existing residents/ratepayers.

While we endorse the Reserve classification on the whole, we would like to take this opportunity to comment on certain aspects of the above proposal.

Although we would have preferred a larger slice of the area to be designated and kept as Reserve as part of the Outer Green Belt, we are particularly concerned about the change marked as "4" on the coloured sheet in "Lincolnshire Farm Structure Plan – Amendments Agreed Between the Council and the Appellant to Resolve Appeal from Lincolnshire Farm Ltd in Part".

We note that this land was originally identified in the structure plan as Reserve 1 but is now identified to become Rural Residential. The land in the gully north-east of our property is already designated as Reserve and has been officially named Horokiwi Reserve. This Reserve is currently under a planting scheme jointly operated by Wellington City Council and the residents of Horokiwi. It is proving to be a very successful scheme and is an on-going work-in-progress. Working bees are held as and when necessary for further plantings, to keep new plantings free of weeds until well established, and for general maintenance of the site.

Looking at the plan, it would seem far more sensible, as far as continuity is concerned, to have the land designated previously as Reserve 1 to retain that classification and become

part of the Horokiwi Reserve along with the remainder of the proposed Reserve area. This is a small enough area of Outer Town Belt without encroaching even further on it.

Moreover, we would like to see a strengthening of the Outer Town Belt depth to a minimum of 500 metres to run contiguous with the existing Horokiwi Reserve. We envisage the expanded green belt reserve be planted with suitable vegetation that is native to the local and/or Wellington area.

We also note the intention to link a road through to Hillcroft Road from Grenada and have many concerns about this possibility. Our main objection here is that Hillcroft Road and Horokiwi Road (together with their side roads) are not only access roads but also serve the community (both Horokiwi and the wider public) as a recreational route e.g. for cycling, horse riding, walking. There are no footpaths or street lights on these roads and they are little desired up here. However, expanded traffic volumes using the area as a through route will undoubtedly compromise the personal safety and security of people undertaking these activities. The road widths are far from suitable for increased traffic while the general public travelling through this area would be unaware of and probably not concerned about the multiple uses these roads serve.

A through road would also jeopardise the safety and security of homeowners. Currently there is only one route for both access to and exit from Horokiwi. Since the installation of a community funded security camera recording vehicle movements into and out of the area, burglaries and other illegal activities (e.g. car dumping) in the Horokiwi area have significantly diminished.

Our values and lifestyle will be decimated with this continuing intrusion (bit by bit) into the rural lifestyle of the area, and will, over time, erode the reasons for people moving to the Horokiwi area. We feel this loss to all residents far outweighs any financial gain by commercial development interests.

We would ask you to place considerable weight on the viewpoints of residents such as ourselves to counterbalance the demands of developers.

Proposed reserves

The Wellington Branch of Forest & Bird welcomes the general intent of the *Proposed Reserve Classifications for the Northern Reserves, Outer Green Belt and some city sites* and commends the council for proposing to grant reserve status to many areas of land around the city. We strongly support these proposals.

We are pleased to see that these proposals are accompanied by changes to the District Plan, giving a high degree of protection to these areas.

Other areas that would benefit from reserve status

We are concerned that two sections at the end of Owhiro Bay Parade, numbers 178 and 180, which were the subject of an Environment Court ruling recently, have not been incorporated into the Te Kopahu reserve. We understand that, although council officers recommended that both sections be reserved, a decision was made to sell number 178.

We urge the council to reconsider this decision. Little blue penguins are known to be nesting in the hillside behind these two sections. WCC is supporting Forest & Bird's Places for Penguins project in other parts of the South Coast and we would urge them to show support in this case by agreeing not to sell number 178 and by granting reserve status to both sections.

Summary

- We welcome and strongly support the proposals for reserve classification contained in the consultation document.
- We welcome the accompanying changes to the District Plan, which give a degree of permanence and certainty to the reserve classifications.
- We ask that action be taken to withdraw 178 Owhiro Bay Parade from sale and grant reserve status to 178 and 180 Owhiro Bay Parade.

The objectives of the society include:

- to encourage the study of botany, the New Zealand flora in particular
- · to create an interest in, and foster an appreciation of, the native plants in the field
- to collect and disseminate knowledge of, and encourage the cultivation of native plants
- to advocate the preservation of lands and waters under protected area statutes in their natural state
- to make, or to join or to cooperate with any other group in making representations on any existing, draft or proposed legislation, regulation or planning document having any repercussions on the preservation or protection of the flora of New Zealand.
- The Wellington Botanical Society (the Society) appreciates the opportunity to present a submission on the Proposed Reserve Classifications. Please note that we wish to speak in support of our submission at any hearings.
- 2. The classification initiative contributes to the vision articulated in Council's Biodiversity Action Plan 2007: Wellington is a city that protects and restores biodiversity and proudly showcases its natural areas. It is a city renowned for its kaitiakitanga, its environmental guardianship.
- 3. In particular, we congratulate Council on recognising the importance of acting now to gain statutory protection for areas with special ecological values which are not as well protected as they could be.
- 4. We agree with Council's assessment that the proposed areas with significant areas of indigenous vegetation meet the criteria for classification, or reclassification, as Scenic B Reserve. This will confirm that the primary purposes of these reserves, for the purposes of management, include preserving "the indigenous flora and fauna, biological associations, and natural environment and beauty as far as possible." It will also facilitate exterminating exotic fauna and, (to the extent consistent with purpose), exotic flora.

- Other benefits of reclassification as Scenic B include:
 - a) protection of the landscape values of these areas
 - b) maintenance and the development of recreational activities that are consistent with the purposes of the reserves
 - c) enhanced ecological connectivity between indigenous areas in the Wellington area and with those under the management of adjacent councils
 - d) social and cultural well-being through opportunities for people to have frequent exposure to, and experience of, nature.
 - e) larger and more resilient areas of indigenous vegetation through a combination of natural regeneration, assistance from community groups and making use of ecological stepping stones between fragmented areas
 - f) increased capability for generating ecosystem services.
- We agree with Council's assessment that the proposed areas with minor areas of indigenous vegetation meet the criteria for classification, or re-classification, as Recreation Reserve.
- 7. We would like to draw to your attention to the apparent unevenness of the information about proposed future developments of specific reserves. This unevenness may not be important in the context of the current classification/reclassification initiatives as they may be part of another planning exercise such as Open Space.
- 8. We were pleased to see that some thought had been given to some of the larger areas and reserves with specific values as outlined in the following examples.
 - a) Caribbean Avenue Reserve (Map 2) between Grenada North and Horokiwi Road is one of the larger reserves at 79 ha. Plans include preparing a landscape development plan and possibly an ecological management plan. We recommend that Council consider requiring the 'paint ball' tag wargame site lessee to cease building structures or doing earthworks on this reserve. Cessation of these activities would help to limit the damage to this ecologically and scenically significant reserve. Regular shooting of goats, and poisoning of possums, and control of pest plants, are essential for the protection of this reserve.
 - b) Plans for the Woodburn Reserve (Map 1) in Takapu Valley, 15 ha, include monitoring forest health and preparing a Restoration Management Plan.
 - c) The Larsen Crescent Reserve (LCR) (Map 1) is a very small reserve with a mataī and tawa stand and a mature tōtara. Plans include reviewing and updating the LCR Vegetation Management Guidelines 1998 and monitoring indigenous forest resilience and health. Barbara Mitcalfe, who was an official party on behalf of Wellington Botanical Society before the Environment Court, successfully challenged the evidence of the

developer's arborist that driveways to be built for houses proposed for the site would not be within the drip-lines of the large totara, tawa and mataī trees.

- d) Waihinahina Park in memory of Dennis Duggan (Map 4). We recommend that Council classify as Scenic B reserve those parts of the park with significant forest remnants and regenerating forest. Our society held a field trip there on 23 January 2006. Members were impressed with the condition of the forest, and noted the presence of possum bait stations.
- e) Grazing is to continue on the Otari Farms, (Map 6), to maintain the open rural landscape and suppress weeds. If cattle are to be grazed on this property, officers should monitor the ground surface, particularly in winter, to check for signs of pugging. If this is occurring, the leasee should be asked to use sheep to graze the property instead of cattle. We note that grazing by sheep, year-round, would also be because it would allow some indigenous, divaricating, shrub species to thrive. This would help to control erosion on the site without obscuring the views enjoyed by the public.
- f) Reserve managed as part of Belmont Regional Park (Map 3). This reserve includes impressive forest in the gully leading down to 'Baked Beans Bend, on the true right branch of Korokoro Stream. We support Council's intention to classify the entire property as Scenic B reserve, including the grass and scrub strip, near the southwest corner of the reserve leading from Horokiwi Road to the top of the gully. Botanical Society members have been impressed by the nīkau and pukatea forest in the gully.
- g) Khandallah Park, (Map 5): We support Council's intention to classify the strip between nos. 60 and 64 Amapur Drive, and the forest beyond, as Scenic B. This access to the Northern Walkway was used by a Wellington Botanical Society field trip on 5 March 2005. The forest, and the grass strip which gives access to it, justify Scenic B protection.
- We notice that there are no plans for the future development of Te Kopahou, (Map 9), one of the largest areas proposed for Scenic B status at 450 ha (west of Owhiro Bay). The valley provides habitat for several plant species that are uncommon in Cook Strait Ecological District, and in Wellington Ecological District. We believe that control of pest plants, and shooting of goats, and pigs and deer if present, and poisoning of possums are high priorities for this site.
- We congratulate Council staff on the quality of the maps and the overall clarity of the consultation document.
- 11. We urge Council to do what it can to keep this process moving with a view to ensuring that the new and changed reserve classifications are formally gazetted before any potential changes to the structure of local government in the wider Wellington region start impacting on Council's priorities and delegated authorities.
