Long-Term Plan Outcomes

From 17 April the public will get the opportunity to say how they want the city to be developed over the next 10 years.

The Council will create its 2024-34 Long-term Plan (LTP) over the next year, with extensive public input throughout the process. The first phase includes a short online survey asking Wellingtonians to identify and rank priorities. It's open from 17 April until 21 May on [Kōrero Mai | Wellington City Council](#).

The survey asks Wellingtonians to rank priorities in five categories – Wellington's natural environment, economy, urban form, culture, and community – and add anything they think is missing. It takes just a few minutes to complete, with feedback used to inform the strategic direction for the plan.

LGWM consultation on Golden Mile Traffic Resolutions and engagement on City Streets projects

Consultation on Golden Mile Traffic Resolutions and Engagement on three Better City Streets proposals open on Wednesday 26 April to midnight Tuesday 23 May 2023.

Let's Get Wellington Moving is consulting with stakeholders and the public on proposed traffic resolutions that will allow changes to the way people move around and access the Golden Mile and its side-streets.

They'll also be seeking feedback on several Better City Streets projects to improve connections for people on buses, bikes or walking on key routes between the central city and Hataitai, Kilbirnie, Mt Victoria and Miramar; from John Street to Taranaki Street; and Featherston Street and some side streets.

There will be a variety of public events and webinars to share the work that's been done to date and provide an opportunity to ask questions of the experts involved.

Speed Management Plan

Between Friday 19 May to Friday 30 June 2023, consultation will be open for Wellingtonians to have their say on the proposed Speed Management Plan.

Waka Kotahi's national 'Road to Zero' – which aims to reduce deaths by 40% by 2030 and eliminate deaths on New Zealand roads by 2050. Chances of survival or serious injuries decreases rapidly when a pedestrian, cyclists or motorcyclist are hit above 30-40km/h.

Wellington City Council is required to introduce safe speed limit of 30km/h near 40% of its school by June 2024 – that's 33 out of 81 schools in the city. Safer speed limits need to be introduced outside all 81 schools by the end of 2027.

As Wellington has a high density of schools, council has agreed to consult on reducing speed limits on all roads. Around 80% of Wellington's streets currently have speed limits that do not align with the safe and appropriate speed calculated for the streets.
