

Why speed matters




Low traffic neighbourhoods


- Move to low traffic neighbourhoods that are more pleasant to live in
- Safer speeds are the first step towards these, we ask what is an 'acceptable' speed?
- Design features required so all road users can understand the speed environment, so it feels different to higher speed places, narrowing of roads will calm traffic (self-explaining roads)
