NDRF | Darren Brunk 6.23pm Darren introduced himself, and the council for international development NDRF represents 50 agencies around the Pacific Representing 17 Humanitarian agencies around the Pacific Looking to engage with Pacific communities within NZ Also have been talking to Auckland Council and Local Government NZ Important to build contacts so that when there are issues networks are in place to respond NDRF looking to support Pacific communities with their initiatives with the resources available Prepositioned resources set out in the Pacific; could respond materially to Cyclone Winston within 24 hours due to these placements NDRF key role is the coordination of the agencies within the Pacific, advocating on behalf of agencies when dealing with government Right now conducting a review of the response to Cyclone Winston Would like to present the findings to PAG, and hear their response Darren asked that communities provide information, while they have people on the ground they don't hear everything (example of Cyclone Winston). Creating a clear picture of what is required is very important when a crisis arises. Being able to provide information from on the ground agencies can also directly help the Pacific community in return, a '2 way street' communication channel

#### PAG:

- Cr Free advised Darren that currently trying to organise a concert for Fiji
- Sai advised that he appreciated the coordination effort, as information overload and communication can be a challenge when crisis occur
- Anthony asked what support was being requested from the community

- PAG interested to see what kind of support can be provided
- Sai raised that the PAG members can provide access to Pacific media and communicate within the native language. Can also disseminate information in a way that they know the community can quickly utilise

## 6. Let's Get Wellington Moving | Jane Black & Adam Nicholls

Presentation made available to members

- Organisational response to how transport is looked at within the city
- Part of a wide engagement process, talking to councils, groups etc
- Beginning of an engagement process, so open to come back to talk to people based on responses to the initial proposal
- Currently want to talk about principles
- Website is www.getwellymoving.com
- Responses update and show users the current polling opinion in real time
- Option to take a longer survey also included within the website
- Jane asked PAG to pass the message about the website along to their communities to facilitate engagement
- Sarah Free reiterated she is passionate about getting real transport solutions
- LGWM are going out to the region to ask what is required and needed
- Aim of the project is to inform the best way to plan transport. Relates to how Wellington 'feels' about their city and how they want to move about it
- Website open until July/August
- Taking the principles from this work and the voice of wellington will help identify possible solutions
- Transport operations are ongoing, some contracts are being decided (for example with busses)
- Nothing stands still, consultation has begun for the Hutt Road for example
- The audience isn't broken down into demographics on the shorter survey
- Survey does work on mobile devices
- The popup workshops haven't yet had dates or venues confirmed, but the timeframe is the last week of April till the first two weeks of May
- PAG raised the concern that consultation takes place already, costing large sums of money flyover didn't take place
- Jane reiterated that this may not inform specific projects, rather to form strategy
- PAG concern that consultation is pointless if nothing arises from it (flyover)
- LGWM raised that having another issue like the Flyover could put Wellington back a generation in terms of transport solutions.
- LGWM gave an example of a principle "solutions must be multi-modal"
- Cr Free asked why the current public transport approach hasn't been halted if a review is underway
- PAG asked that the group advocate and lobby those opposed to transport progress to convince them of
