
1. Outstanding, intimate and unique visitor experiences

1.1 Visitors and events


- Total visitor numbers year to date December were 97,266 against a budget of 89,021 above budget by 8,245 and 9,012 above last year.
- We had a lovely lwi Blessing for our new building The Roost Te Pae Manu on 22 December.
 We were lucky enough to have Councillor Jo Coughlan and Councillor Paul Eagle with us to celebrate this along with Sam and June Jackson and Mark Te One from the Tenths Trust.

1.2 Learning

2.1 CX340 Zoo Upgrades

Significant activities include the following:

The Nest – Te Kōhanga

We finally have an agreed design for the replacement walkways around the salt water pool and work can start as soon as some native animals, currently using the pool for recovery, have been released or moved on. This is expected to be in early February.

The Roost - Te Pae Manu

The Roost -Te Pae Manu is now completed and an lwi blessing was held on 22 December, with the official opening planned for 14 February 2011. We held a Zoo Crew event for this exhibit on January 22.



The Hub

Works on The Hub are also slightly ahead of programme with the rammed earth walls and all the floor slabs completed.

5. Commercial Development and Promotion


- On 22 November our social media presence stands at well over 3,000 members: 1,504 liking the Zoo on Facebook and 1,597 following on Twitter.
- We are doing a joint promotion with the Interislander, where we are offering all passengers with a vehicle free child entry to the Zoo with any paying adult until 31 January 2011.
- On Friday 19 November we welcomed Zealandia's marketing team to the Zoo for a visit to discuss possible further options for working together.
- Marina Greco, our Functions and Tourism Advisor, is visiting accommodation providers in the Wellington region who fit with the Zoo's demographic. The aim is to encourage them to promote the Zoo to their customers, as part of our plan to encourage more tourists to the Zoo. She also attended the Wellington Conference Expo in October.



5.1. Communication Highlights

- Much earlier than expected, we received exciting news that seven tuataras had hatched at Victoria University. We invited *The Dominion Post* to visit the hatchlings on Wednesday 20 October, and the story was covered in the proceeding *Dominion Post Weekend Green Zone* column (23/24 October).
- Our three lionesses returned to their rightful place in the redeveloped enclosure at the top of the hill on 21 October. The Dominion Post and TV ONE News were in attendance to cover this significant team effort in action.
- It's hard to believe, but Beni the chimpanzee turned three on 22 October. The Primate Keepers put on an amazing birthday party enrichment session for the little guy, and *The Dominion Post* was only too happy to come and cover the fun!
- The end of October saw a baby boom in terms of our Zoo primates. First Samantha the chimp gave birth in broad daylight on 27 October, closely followed by Picchu giving birth to New Zealand's first ever pygmy marmoset baby two days later. *The Dominion Post* covered both arrivals, and *TV ONE News* visited to capture some footage of our latest chimp baby.
- We had a sad case at The Nest Te K\(\bar{o}\)hanga to start the month of November. A little blue penguin had been brought in after it was found caught in fishing netting on a beach in Plimmerton. The Dominion Post wrote an excellent piece on the case, placing the incident in a broader context in terms of the issues seabirds face living close to an urban environment.
- Francois Lampen was interviewed for the Our Changing World programme on Radio New
 Zealand. The visit on 8 November concentrated on the scientific aspects of the native care at
 The Nest Te Kōhanga, featuring a procedure on an injured mollymawk the vets were treating.
- Our latest British imports received an official visit from British High Commissioner on Tuesday
 16 November. TV ONE News came along to film Vicki Treadell meeting seven meerkats, and
 the story featured throughout its daytime bulletins. The Dominion Post also covered the visit on
 its Capital Day page the following day (Wednesday 17 November).
- Our two lion boys, Malik and Zulu returned from their working holiday at Orana Wildlife Park in Christchurch. TV3 News, The New Zealand Herald and The Dominion Post all covered their return on Thursday 2 December 2011.
- On Christmas day our animals were featured on TV3 on their only day off for the year.

6. Valued and motivated staff

People and Culture Projects

After analysing our 2010 JRA Best Workplaces Survey results a combination of initiatives have been chosen to address some key areas of the People & Culture portfolio. Essentially this project is about making the Zoo a better place to work. The project will begin in December 2010 with a plan to launch all initiatives by October 2011.

Leadership, Talent and Career Development Framework

With ideas and input from staff across all levels of the organisation, a flexible framework will be developed that will help us grow leadership within the Zoo, identify and manage talent, and support individuals in their career planning. This project will take priority as we believe it is the one that will reap the greatest rewards. The aim is for a framework to be ready for implementation during July 2011.

Unwritten Ground Rules (UGRs)

We will establish what our current organisational culture we plan to take a bottom up approach, surveying staff to find out what our existing UGRs are and asking them to generate other positive UGRs they feel we need in addition to the ones that already exist. Through this we will end up with a picture of our desired cultural values through a series of UGR statements worded "around here we ..." and an action plan will be established to encourage and embed the desired UGRs. These will shift our organisational culture over time as they become part of the way we naturally do things at the Zoo. This project is planned to conclude by the end of the 10/11 financial year but understand that embedding any new UGRs will be an ongoing process.

Team effectiveness

To ensure teams are equipped with the knowledge and tools to be effective and cohesive, two initiatives will be launched. The first initiative will involve developing team building guidelines, with a focus on making it easier for all teams to benefit from team building activities. Our goal is to make sure all teams in the Zoo see the benefit of purposeful team building activities and these opportunities are built into annual budgets. The second initiative is a small series of learning sessions for leaders on "what it takes to build an effective team". This will be supported by a practical toolkit that will largely contain existing material but be made more user friendly and put in a central place. We plan to have the learning sessions scheduled and toolkit ready to go in June 2011.



7. Lead or participate in conservation and research programmes

- Places for Penguins project, of which the Zoo is partner with Forest and Bird, was recognised as the Supreme Winner of the Wellington Airport Regional Community Awards
- Wellington Zoo Conservation Fellowship projects are now underway. These Fellowships support the Kea Conservation Trust and Victoria University research into environmental behaviour in Wellington.
- Our Senior keeper Birds went to Codfish Island to work with the Kakapo Recovery Team annual survey.

8. Lasting community support and participation

- Two information evenings held for new volunteers information evenings replace one on one volunteer interviews and induction held in November for 18 new volunteers.
- Volunteer Co-ordinator spoke at first Careers Day held at the Zoo for senior school students

- Volunteer recruited to help with general cleaning duties at The Nest Te K\u00f6hanga
- Volunteer Coordinator interviewed for Massey University research
