The Wellington Rugby League was established in 1912. The new WRL Zone was established in 2010 after the SPARC driven restructure of rugby league across New Zealand. The new zone administration has simply taken over the ongoing role. We have approximately 2800 registered playing members through our established 11 clubs. 2 clubs, Harbour City and University Hunters, are within the WCC boundaries and represent around 10% of the registered players. In addition 4 local colleges participate in our the annual Stephen Kearney Cup competition, St Pats Town, Rongotai, Wellington College and Tawa providing around another 100 players representing 25% of the competitions participants.

The Harbour City club had teams competing in the following junior grades, 6,7,9,10,12,17,19 and 1 senior team in the 3rd ranked grade. The University club have 3 senior teams.

The WRL Zone board consists of 6 appointed members.

We have identified a need to establish a development program for our clubs to work in partnership with local schools to grow the sport. Over previous years there has been a

decline in the number of Wellington rugby league clubs and in turn playing numbers across the region. This decline has been halted over the past 2 years with growth up 10% each year but with only 1 junior club in Wellington City we need to provide development services. The "Leadership through League" program has been established to provide a professional development team to foster and promote the game and enhance club to school links. All 17 colleges that compete in the Stephen Kearney Cup have links to our clubs and are provided both coaching and management services for no cost. The program is being supported by Sport Wellington through KiwiSport funding but is only part funded.

The Program is already underway in terms of planning for delivery in 2011 and has the full support of all our clubs.

WRL KiwiSport Development Officers will work with each college to provide training in the areas of coaching, refereeing and event management to the sports leaders who will then deliver programs of Flag Rugby League modules to local primary schools culminating in a flag tournament.

Rugby league as a sport generally caters for kids at the lower end of the socio-economic scale and is played predominantly by Maori and Pacific Islanders with participation by these groups at about 85% of playing numbers.

The program has very specific project aims and KPI's along with quarterly reporting structures for the KiwiSport funding. Our target is to engage around 1500 primary aged children in 2011 and we see 25% of these coming from within the WCC boundaries.


As more participants flow into our sport we aim to take this program a step further by providing stepping stones for aspiring Rugby League players, administrators and coaches through an academy program and the development of clear and transparent pathways.

We have a number of organisations that we are actively working in partnership with this project including NZRL, Sport Wellington, Secondary Schools, Intermediates and Primary Schools.

PRIMARY AND INTERMEDIATE SCHOOLS

Students receive a 5 week training program using Flag League vehicle to deliver the essential core skills:

- Run core technique speed technique balance
- Catch eyes up, hands up, give targets
- Pass hand eyes targets, upper torso working in co-ordination
- Kick hand eye and foot co-ordination
- Evasion swerve, balance and instinct
- Team work communication, fair play and understanding the basics of team dynamics
- Progression Tackle Technique rolling and tumbling

A festival will be staged at the conclusion of the five week program hosted at the surrounding secondary school.

All our coaches will be up skilled to deliver the latest ideology with regard to the core skills as per Athletics NZ or GYMSPORT and NZRL.

The 5 week training block will be delivered with assistance from Senior Sports Leaders at the local Secondary School with supervision from the WRL Coaching Coordinator.

Progression

Working with School to Club links, an afterschool club can be set up within a primary school. The club can either play in the local WRL completion or join other local primary schools in an after school competition.

KIWI League Resource

To encourage Flag League sustainability within each primary school WRL will develop a KIWI League coaching resource that will consist of a Coaching Manual, Flags, Balls and Cones.

The resource will include skills and drills that are transferable from year 1 through to year 6. Cost will include resources + delivery of components to teaching staff

OUTCOMES

- Students gain essential core skills
- School to club links providing easy flow from a school program to a club

- Community building with secondary schools providing leadership and roles models to their local primary school.
- Schools are left with the tools to deliver core skills to rest of school

SECONDARY SCHOOL

WRL will provide coaching courses for your students as well as helping to liaise and plan AND deliver coaching within your local primary schools free of charge.

NCEA Year 11, 12 and 13.

Working within the current curriculum to provide students with a practical experience that provides NCEA credits. Rugby League and Flag Rugby League will be a vehicle for the students to deliver a 4 – 6 week block that **includes coaching, leadership and event management components.**

Flag Rugby League is used as a coaching vehicle to coach kids in the fundamentals of sport and thus appealing to all sports minded students:

- Run
- Catch and pass
- Evasion
- Hand eye coordination
- Kicking
- Teamwork and communication

In 2010 Aotea College successfully used this program for students to gain NCEA credits in **Planning, Implementing and Evaluating an event**. (4 credits NCEA Unit standard 12536?)

PROGRAM:

The program can be either 4 to 6 weeks in duration. Flag Rugby League is used as a coaching vehicle to coach kids in the fundamentals of sport – run catch and pass etc. At the conclusion of the program a festival will be hosted at the secondary school to provide the students the ability to host, promote and manage the delivery of a real life event.

Contact and non contact League can be used as a coaching vehicle. The program can be delivered to either an entire class or to a group of 4 -6 students within a larger class.

Students will receive Coaching Certification in Essential Movement Skills from Athletics NZ or GYMSPORT NZ and the Mini Mod Coaching Certificate from NZRL as well as an introduction to refereeing

SIX WEEK COACHING PROGRAM:

Four lessons allocated per week:

Week One: Program overview – goals and objectives

Delivery of coaching course - 3 Hours


Week Two – Five: Coaching within primary/intermediate courses



WRL CLUBS

School to club links is high on the priority of WRL Development. Clubs will be involved in each step of the program.

- 1. FLAG LEAGUE Primary Schools. Clubs will supply support staff to run end of program Carnival (potential for this to run on Sundays)
- 2. After School Clubs primary schools will be attached to their local club
- 3. Intermediate Tournament Clubs to provide assistance to their local Intermediate
- 4. Stephen Kearney Cup Clubs to provide coaching support to secondary schools

WHERE TO FROM HERE

Are you interested? The program has many levels and is flexible to work to your needs. What you need to do is decide which year group you want to focus on i.e Year 11, 12 or 13 and what components and assessment areas these meet.

We then jointly need to assess how this fits into your timetable and the logistics of delivery to your local primary and intermediate schools.

WRL will then liaise and book the primary schools for to work in with your timetable.

If you are really interested we can work the program in for all three year groups.

- Year 11 helps to promote and plan a lunch time Flag League competition during the wet winter months in the school gym.
- Year 12 works with the local primary schools to deliver Flag League to year 5/6
- Year 13 work with intermediates and full primary schools to deliver tackle league to year 7/8 students
