BACKGROUND

 Our purpose is to support, facilitate and represent businesses.

 We became Toitū carbon zero certified in 2016 and have reduced our emissions by 38.5% since our baseline year.







2022 PILOT

- Two cohorts completed, in June and October of 2022
- 25 businesses supported to start their journey
- Community of climate action champions created, businesses can celebrate successes and work through challenges together

KEY LEARNINGS

- Programme flow: speaker order was altered in cohort 2, allowing content to flow better.
- **Delivery structure**: participants liked the mix of in person/ online over 3 weeks, this format will remain the same.
- Content: we will continue to review and edit the content depending on businesses in attendance, to provide relevant examples.
- Attendance: due to COVID and staff shortages, numerous 2022 businesses dropped out of programme before completion. To accomodate this challenge we plan to extend the geographical reach for 2023.
- Follow up/ alumini group: businesses got great value out of the continued meetings and follow ups. The closing ceremonies were a great networking opportunity too. We will continue these for 2023.



EXPANDING THE REACH

- By expanding our reach, there will be larger impact across the wider Wellington region.
- Sustainability support will be accessible to more SMEs.
- With the success of our pilot programme, we will gather case studies to promote the 2023 bootcamp





2023 STRATEGY

- Following the success of the 2022 bootcamp, we will put together case studies to showcase the value of attending the sessions.
- Our partnerships with Te Awe and the Wellington Pasifika Business Network have formalised and continues to developed, so we will further promote the programme through these networks.
- We already have committment from businesses to attend the bootcamp in 2023.
