Local government officials talk about building bike lanes in the face of opposition

You're never going to get 100 percent consensus on anything ... But if you let that get in the way, the recipe is to leave your streets in suspended animation.

We knew there was going to be this pushback, but we wanted to show [the new protected bike lane] and let people see it. That type of a reaction starts to dissipate and go down over time. 
