Quarterly Review – Wellington Museums Trust

Wellington Museums Trust has presented its report for the guarter ended 31 March 2013 for review. A summary of key findings is presented below and the report is attached.

Highlights /Summary

- The 6th biennial Capital E National Arts Festival for young people was very successful, achieving a high standard of critical acclaim and positive public feedback. Final attendance was 50,536
- Capital City Connections programme which is an education delivery collaboration (Capital E, Museums Wellington, Carter Observatory & City Gallery) using smart technology is a finalist for the Museums Aotearoa annual awards.
- A new suite of exhibitions opened at City Gallery on 1 March including Moving on Asia which is both the largest showing of video art at City Gallery and the Gallery's most significant presentation of work from Asia.

Overall, Q3 saw exceptionally strong visitor numbers, particularly for the Cable Car Museum. The Trust has not been able to identify any particular reason, other than the strong cruise ship season and very good weather causing higher visits to the precinct.

Visitation at Capital E was significantly ahead of budget due to the bi-annual National Arts Festival for young people and was not accounted for in the visitor projections.

Activities during the quarter

- Redevelopment of the MoW City & Sea on target to make its application to the Lottery Environment & Heritage Committee for funding assistance for Stage 1 of the project (development of the top floor of the Bond Store)
- ۶ Online market research across the Wellington region was undertaken on the name of the museum.
- The National Theatre for Children will present its Wellington seasons at Downstage Theatre.
- The Colonial Cottage Museum closed on 25 March to strengthen the chimney. During the closure the visitor experience is being reviewed. It will re-open on 1 July.
- ⊳ Recovered Plimmer's Ark timbers previously displayed in the Shed 6 annex have been moved to dry storage. Analysis of the stern timbers will be undertaken prior to recommencing its conservation programme.

Financial Commentary

- The trust has restated its 'actual' financials for Q1 and Q2. Officers ≻ have accepted this as the most pragmatic solution to ensuring the Trust's financial reporting is reliable going forward.
- Both income and operating expenditure were above budget for the \triangleright quarter (due to timing of funding), but are near budget for YTD. Operating surplus is \$150k YTD led by higher than budgeted income. Notwithstanding and subject to un-budgeted costs relating to Capital E, the Trust expects its year end result will align with the budget.
- ≻ The balance sheet simply reflects higher than forecast holdings of cash and receivables at quarter end. YTD operating cash flow is \$2m versus forecast \$184k, which effectively culminates in the Trust's holdings of cash and equivalents at 31 Mar 2013 of \$2.2m versus forecast \$324k. The reason for the variance is due to timing of receiving Council grants - the position is expected to normalise by year end.
