MY SUBMISSION IS ATTACHED AS THE LAST APPENDIX, HOWEVER MY COMMENTS ARE RECORDED BELOW:

In response to the questions in the consultation document I say:

1) Do I support an alcohol ban in Kilbirnie: Figure 1 (A)

Yes: but in my submission of the 25 October 2018 and as advocated to Councillors that for operational and common sense reasons a Kilbirnie ban area should be linked and joined to the banned area in Newtown. This means it would much easier to all and the zone would be easier to have signage and

compliance. I am aware that the consultation document put out provides for A and B options, but I recall that at the Council meeting an amendment was made to the "A" area to include a fairly big traffic island/ crossing zone at the corner of Coutts St and Onepu Rd which was not then portrayed in the plans, hence why not consider a wider area.

Mt greater concern now is that although we not able to foresee or predict the terrible tragic events in Christchurch of the killings at the Mosque(s). Councillors will be aware that in Kilbirnie we have one of the largest Mosques in Wellington. Presently it is outside the proposed liquor ban. I have had discussions with Council Officers on the matter and I think it would be appropriate for Councillors to receive information about that. The indication that the car park adjoining the Mosque is a 'public space' therefore would be included as a public street liquor ban area, and enforceable. My thought was that the Liquor Ban should be widened being at Coutts St/Onepu corner, down Onepu Rd to Cruickshank St, then along Cruickshank St to join with Queens Drive, then up the hill to link to the Newtown banned area. Thus all around the surrounding area of the Mosque would be totally included in a public street liquor ban.

I have friends at the Mosque as there is a large community of Muslims of different ethnic cultures particular in Kilbirnie and Newtown. They have experienced abuse, insults and bad behaviour in and around their place of worship over the years. Having a ban will diffuse issues quite a bit.

2) Do I support an alcohol ban in Kilbirnie Park: Figure 1 (B)

Yes: but as suggested above I want to see the social housing units, school and ASB centre included. (Appendix A) People who commute (walk, bus, cycle or by vehicle) from Newtown realize they are

leaving a banned area at the top of the hill (Constable St joining in Crawford Rd) so it would be sensible to have the banned area all the way through without a land gap between the two suburbs. I attach a map of my suggestions. Another option could be to bring the ban

3) Do I support a 24 hour ban 7 days a week.

Yes: all of the other liquor banned areas in Wellington are 24 hours 7 days a week. Very few places in NZ have any other configurations of hours other than a 24 hour ban. Confusion would arise if it was for any shorter period of time, or a day versus night ban. I refer again to the District Licensing decision in 2015 involving Pak and Save, Kilbirnie where their analysis of data supplied by police noted that there was a spike in alcohol related offences between 3pm and 6pm, and again after 9pm in Bay Road.

4) Do I support an alcohol ban in Kelburn Park.

Yes: Kelburn Park has long been a place of destination for young drunk university students. Isn't it all rather boring as we are in a new age now. The alcohol is cheaper with a greater range and sadly some of our statistics show increases in sexual abuse and drunkenness associated with this university (who wants to change it's name). International students (and their paying parents) get alarmed at the alcohol excesses of young students from around NZ. Do we really want to be another Otago!

5) Should a Kelburn Park ban be 8am to 8pm.

No: I support a 24 hour ban for this area. All of our other banned areas are 24 hours so it would be confusing for locals and those passing through. I'm aware that sponsors of booze (couched under the guise) of either sports or music really want to hold alcohol functions in Kelburn Park.

The University of Victoria say they are managing the (student) situation but I think they fall far short. I reject the notion that to have a Kelburn Park ban would shift the students into the Botanic Gardens.

The Vice chancellor of Wellington University is disingenuous!

The vice chancellor has made enough comments that he does not favour a Kelburn Park liquor ban. How appalling. He has the responsibility for his staff and students in regards safety on and around campus. He has failed. I refer in Appendix C and D attached reports in the university's own student publication "The Salient" which shows that all is not well in regards a lack of accountability, lack of policy, lack of investigation, and failure to protect all students. Residential Advisors (being in charge of Halls of Residents for young students from around NZ and overseas) being a big part of the problem!

How appalling that a young woman student writes:

"My mum only recently opened up to me about the RA who date raped her when she was 18 and living in a hall. Jack shit was done about it when she came forward in 1998, and it appears that jack shit is being done in 2019. Isn't that infuriating?"

6) Have I experience alcohol related crime or disorder in the two proposed areas:

Yes: Kelburn.

I completed study in Vic. As did my three adult children and we all experienced the negative aspects of booze on campus and by students.

Yes: Kilbirnie. I detailed some of my experiences in my previous submission. I have lived and worked in the three areas of Kilbirnie, Newtown and Miramar for 48 years. My life and work week is still in these 3 areas. So I will be in the shopping area of Kilbirnie (Bay Rd) as well as the Library, and Community Centre at least 3 time a week. In the last ten years, and in particular the last five years, the public street behaviour has become extreme, and the abuse of alcohol underscores the issues. These types of disgusting behaviour

was highlighted by many at a recent public meeting on the 15 April 2019 which was organised jointly by the Kilbirnie Business Association and City Council.

I have witnessed people in Bay Road pissing next to the Community Centre, spitting and yelling abuse at innocent passer-by's, drinking to excess early in the day and afternoon and fighting. When I was the elected Chair of the Kilbirnie/Lyall Bay Community Centre it was a big problem for the staff and the visitors to the Centre, and still is. I know a number of shop owners who have a regular hardship with street drunks scaring off customers and I have seen that regularly.

Social Housing

In my submission of 25 October 2018 I referred to issues of alcohol abuse in social housing, both WCC and NZH. (appendix E). Given the close proximity of Duncan Tce and Kotuku complexes, as well as the many NZH units close to Bay Road, a number of tenants have drink and drug problems. Some are facing their issues, some are not. Hence I am of the opinion that it assists these people to have a public street liquor ban. That is my experience in Newtown and it will work in Kilbirnie. I think City Housing should have more pro active programmes to manage their tenants. A number of the people who cause problems down Bay Road do live in the local complexes. I excuse them to some extend because the Social Housing units were established (in the 1970s) well before the two local supermarkets brought the booze to Kilbirnie. I have worked in the volunteer sector for 15 years helping people with drink/drug issues. A public street liquor ban protects the broader pubic needs of safety, as well as being a timely prompt to those who do want to get pissed in public to not do so, or go home and drink and leave law abiding citizens to go about their business.

In the supporting documents that were first submitted to Council in September 2018 reference was made that a ban would NOT include the WCC social housing units. That needs clarification because in the communal (grass) areas of those complexes there are signs up saying no drinking & smoking allowed, so why now portray it as being exempt under a general public street liquor ban.

Statistics from the police.


I have raised with Councillors the matter of the police statistics presented to Councillors. Explanation has been given to me and I think that further clarification needs to be tabled by Council officers. It's a matter of having the same statistics to be able to compare drunk apples with drunk apples rather that having a lack of categories of police offences involving alcohol related offences along Bay Road, and which areas do the police statistics relate to. The mute point is that regardless of what ever area one is accessing, the statistics show that indeed there is a high level of alcohol related criminal offences in evidence.

In summary I strongly recommend a public street liquor ban in Kilbirnie.



NEW STUDENTS GET ORIENTATED

New Students' Orientation Week has come and gone again, kicking off another year at VUW with a bang.

This year's line-up included the requisite toga party, a comedy show with Melanie Bracewell, and live music headlined by Rudimental, Netsky, and Winston Surfshirt.

O-Week was a wild success in terms of attendance, with the toga party and gigs selling out in record time.

In response, VUWSA added an official afterparty, featuring local artists P-Money, Church & AP, and 1174.

The events did not run entirely without incident, however, with 58 students passing through VUWSA's saferoom.

The saferoom provides a space for students who are injured, intoxicated, or otherwise in distress, to get away from the main event and be looked after by trained staff.

The majority of students admitted to the room were from halls of residence, mostly for alcohol-related issues.

Drug-related incidents were up on 2018 figures, at 14 admission throughout the week.

Two students were also admitted to hospital, one for continuou vomiting and one for a head injury sustained on the way to an event.

While students were impressed by the quality of the internation musicians O-Week attracted, some felt that the venue, the Hunta Lounge, did not do the artists justice.

"It just got really crowded," said first-year student Erin, who attende the toga party and Winston Surfshirt.

Fellow fresher Eliza agreed that the events were "too busy", and bigger venue would "definitely" improve the events, especially the eve popular toga party.

The university also held orientation events for Māori, Pasifik postgraduate, mature, refugee-background and rainbow students, a well as a variety of academic workshops.

VUWSA President Tamatha Paul summarised the week for Salient, "was great."

COMPLAINTS OF INAPPROPRIATE, DRUNKEN BEHAVIOUR FROM UNI HALL STAFF

CW: Sexual violence, harassment

Uni Hall staff members allegedly demonstrated drunken, inappropriate, and sexually abusive behaviour towards residents last year.

Two staff members had concerns raised about their behaviour at the Victoria University of Wellington (VUW) hall; Bryan*, a Residential Advisor (RA) and Joel*, a Senior Resident (also known as a Kiwi Mate).

RAs and Kiwi Mates are covered by the university's Staff Conduct Policy. The policy strongly discourages "entering into an intimate personal relationship with a student, particularly with a student for whom they have responsibility."

VUW hall staff members also sign a code of ethical behaviour which states that the "staff-to-resident relationship requires strict boundaries so that a positive and trustful Halls environment is maintained."

Both were able to continue their positions at Uni Hall for the rest of 2018. However, VUW were unable to provide a list of names confirming staff who are working at Uni Hall in 2019.

Bryan had multiple complaints raised against him of indecent behaviour and sexual intercourse with residents, with little initial response.

"When I followed up to see what had been done about it, Louis said he'd spoken to [Bryan] and had given him a verbal warning. Louis had said that he didn't want to tell his manager as there weren't enough staff and Bryan would be fired."

A Uni Hall resident also complained to management about Bryan's inappropriate drunken behaviour.

Bryan found out about these complaints and went into the resident's room, reportedly causing damage to their belongings.

After this incident, hall management moved Bryan to his own flat and implemented an alcohol ban.

According to Caitlin, no staff member enforced the alcohol ban and no compensation was provided to the resident whose room Bryan went into.

Salient brought the complaints to the attention of the university.

In response, VUW said that the allegations against hall staff members are "concerning", and acknowledges that it appears complaints made to hall management were not well-handled.

VUW says "a review of how the complaints were handled and addressed in these

The need to have a Liquor Ban in Kilbirnie.

I have lived in the Southern and Eastern Wards for 50 years. Taught in the schools. Lived in Coutts, Yule and other streets close to Bay Road Shopping Centre. I started the Kilbirnie Branch of the NZ Labour party. My two daughters attended Lyall Bay primary school, and Evans Bay Intermediate. I have been a Netball referee at the outside courts. I have been a life guard and swim instructor at the Aquatic Centre. I helped out at the Kilbirnie/Lyall Bay Community Centre as elected chair for 6 months in 2016 to maintain operations before we could have someone take on the task to provide continuity. So I think I know the area and its people, and its problems pretty well.

I opposed the booze License renewal of Pak & Save Kilbirnie (twice) and also Countdown Kilbirnie (once). Even the I lived at that time in Newtown and outside of a 1000mtr radius as drawn by the licensing inspector in the first public hearing against Pak & Crave in 2015 I was granted "standing" by the DLC Commissor Rex Woodhouse.

I think Council should be provided with the decisions in the two cases concerning Pak & Save and also Countdown by the licensing inspector. There is highly relevant data in those decisions that show the massive amount of booze sold, when it is sold and the relative increase in crime and disorder with a 500 meter radius of these supermarkets. Ref

Pak & Save Kilbirnie wanted to renew their booze licenses and have closing hours for liquor to be 11pm. I have always oppose supermarkets and want liquor to cease being sold at 9pm. The pressure was on Pak & Save in 2015 to reduce their hours to 9pm as also wanted by the Police & MOH. But Pak & Save's position was to say across the road Countdown has longer trading hours of booze. So in 2015 the DLC indicated that the would bring the renewal dates into line into the same period, hence Pak and Save got a shorter license time frame to be in the same period as Countdown. Remember that Pak & Save also had a 'sting' operation on them and they lost their trading of booze for 4 days as a penalty for selling to minors!

Then in the following year at the time of renewal both Countdown and Pak & Save were approved to sell booze to 10pm, but Pak & Save argued and got 10:10pm on the basis of customers needing to get 10 minutes to get to the cashier!

The bigger point is that in 2015 I estimated that Pak and Save sold \$10million dollars of booze a year in Kilbirnie, and Countdown sold \$4million. So I estimated that these two supermarkets were dumping \$14million dollars per year worth of booze on the local area.

Its any wonder there are problems in the home and in the streets! In the decision by the DLC the amount of booze sold is expressed as "the amount of beer pallets loaded onto a truck." This methodology was invented by Sgt Rapira-Davies. He was the best Community Constable Newtown/Kilbirnie every had, and also went on to be the best Police representative on Liquor Licensing the City has ever had so far but has now been transferred.

Remember prior to the 1989 Sale of Liquor act NO SUPERMARKETS sold grog.

So Kilbirnie, with its large placement of Social Housing, both WCC and Housing NZ have been in the area for decades yet the supermarkets brought the excessive booze to Kilbirnie.

The Police and Supermarket data in the Pak & Save case shows:

- a) a spike in booze sales between 8am 9am being traders buying supplies
- b) a spike in booze sales between 3pm and 6 pm and
- c) a spike in booze sales after 9pm.

GUESS WHAT:

The police data shows a spike in alcohol related crime and disorder relative to the two later spike in sales.

Police data produced at the earlier hearing show that there were 282 calls for assistance in incidents involving alcohol within a 500 meter radius of Pak & Save! I think the Police and Licensing Inspector should up date this information for Council, as it is still at the same high level. The majority of offences were in Bay Road.

The call to have a Liquor Ban in Kilbirnie June 2015

On the 16 June 2015 a public meeting was convened in the Kilbirnie/Lyall Bay Community Centre as facilitated by Swampy Marsh. Other Councilors were in attendance. The Community Centre was packed with angry and concerned citizens

Everyone spoke of the difficulties of bad behavior, public street drinking, disorder and threatening incidents when all what people wanted to do was shop without being harassed. I attach reports of that meeting. If another meeting was called today people would be twice as irate over the difficulties of Bay Road and close by areas.

lattach a copy of my part of my submission to the DLC in July 2017 against Countdown. This explains what the Community Centre experienced and how they had to react to protect clients. Jenny Rains the Director of Community Centres knows full well of the difficulties faced by this Centre and she should report to Council about that. The problems still exist today.

People in Kilbirnie got sick and tired of complaining to the Council and Police and the City Host people are seldom in the area.

The Social Deprivation Index

The Health authorities and State use a Social Deprivation Index. Wellington City is divided into 40 areas from Tawa to Seatoun & Island Bay.

KILBIRNIE is listed as number ONE out of forty. That is: the worst

I hope the details of how that is measured is enlarged upon by Council Officers and understood by Councilors. So this is a measurement tool used to established across a number of factors how difficult your life can be

Social Housing Complexes

Kilbirnie has large social housing complexes in Duncan Terrace and Kotutuhu Flats.

They have been there for decades and many years before the two big Supermarkets brought the booze into the area to normalize alcohol as being a necessity food item.

The are also close by state housing complexes as well.

Given the criteria that Council has for entry into social houses:

old people over 65 refugees multi disadvantaged persons

ex prisoners/rehabilitation/mental health

understandably this poses certain issues.

I am a strong supported of Social Housing, in fact argued with Council not to reduce the number of bed sits and one bedrooms in its housing stock, which has happened in the Council up grade programme. In fact this has meant that single men and women have been pushed out of social housing. I have argued and still do for an increase in our social housing stock

But this issue remains that a great number who become tenants need social service support. In reality internally us tenants use the phrase that "new tenants with high needs of support are not getting it as they are.....dumped and left

I have worked in a voluntary capacity for 15 odd years to support tenants in social housing situations and one aspect that emerged in the last 5 years has been the network of 'drop in centres' that existed across the city. These were places of destination and did have opportunities for support staff to give needed help.

In the same period IHC closed their day bases. I worked in Newtown in a IHC home and also ran a IHC day base.

This meant that mental health and health users no longer had places to go for support, friendship and useful programmes, so they are now on the street, or washing into our public places of the libraries, streets or overloading the few small drop in centres around the city.







- 14. The Council's call centre data (Confirm Complaints) has been used to analyse the number of phone complaints that mention the terms "drunken", "drinking", "breaking bottles."
- 15. There have been 83 calls relating to the above terms as part of the Confirm Complaints between 2013 and 2018. This has been broken down into suburbs below and the results point to the 65 calls relating to suburbs inside the existing liquor control areas. There are 16 calls related to areas outside the Liquor Control area.









The call to have a Liquor Ban in Kilbirnie June 2015

On the 16 June 2015 a public meeting was convened in the Kilbirnie/Lyall Bay Community Centre as facilitated by Swampy Marsh. Other Councilors were in attendance. The Community Centre was packed with angry and concerned citizens.

Everyone spoke of the difficulties of bad behavior, public street drinking, disorder and threatening incidents when all what people wanted to do was shop without being harassed. I attach reports of that meeting. If another meeting was called today people would be twice as irate over the difficulties of Bay Road and close by areas.

I attach a copy of my part of my submission to the DLC in July 2017 against Countdown. This explains what the Community Centre experienced and how they had to react to protect clients. Jenny Rains the Director of Community Centres knows full well of the difficulties faced by this Centre and she should report to Council about that. The problems still exist today.

People in Kilbirnie got sick and tired of complaining to the Council and Police and the City Host people are seldom in the area.

The Social Deprivation Index

The Health authorities and State use a Social Deprivation Index. Wellington City is divided into 40 areas from Tawa to Seatoun & Island Bay.

KILBIRNIE is listed as number ONE out of forty. That is: the worst!

I hope the details of how that is measured is enlarged upon by Council Officers and understood by Councilors. So this is a measurement tool used to established across a number of factors how difficult your life can be.

Social Housing Complexes

Kilbirnie has large social housing complexes in Duncan Terrace and Kotutuhu Flats.

They have been there for decades and many years before the two big Supermarkets brought the booze into the area to normalize alcohol as being a necessity food item.

The are also close by state housing complexes as well.

Given the criteria that Council has for entry into social houses:

old people over 65

refugees

multi disadvantaged persons

ex prisoners/rehabilitation/mental health

understandably this poses certain issues.

I am a strong supported of Social Housing, in fact argued with Council not to reduce the number of bed sits and one bedrooms in its housing stock, which has happened in the Council up grade programme. In fact this has meant that single men and women have been pushed out of social housing. I have argued and still do for an increase in out social housing stock.

But this issue remains that a great number who become tenants need social service support. In reality internally us tenants use the phrase that "new tenants with high needs of support are not getting it as they are.....dumped and left alone."

I have worked in a voluntary capacity for 15 odd years to support tenants in social housing situations and one aspect that emerged in the last 5 years has been the network of 'drop in centres' that existed across the city. These were places of destination and did have opportunities for support staff to give needed help.

In the same period IHC closed their day bases. I worked in Newtown in a IHC home and also ran a IHC day base.

This meant that mental health and health users no longer had places to go for support, friendship and useful programmes, so they are now on the street, or washing into our public places of the libraries, streets or overloading the few small drop in centres around the city.



Youth council was initially opposed to the introduction of a liquor ban for the Kilbirnie area. We understand that there is an issue with alcohol and related nuisance in Kilbirnie particularly in and around Bay Street, however we felt that it would not be an effective method of addressing the issue of alcohol related harm in Kilbirnie. This is because the issue is mainly due to a small group of individuals who are in essence living and rough sleeping in the Kilbernie. We thought that a punitive approach (such as an Liquor ban) would not be an appropriate response for some of our communities most vulnerable members, and we would simply see the problem move elsewhere.

However in light of information from council officers about the new approach to assisting these individuals and addressing issues such as addiction in a more proactive and empathetic manner, we welcome this fresh approach. And, combined with the information that the police will not be fining individuals, but rather referring them to the appropriate agencies, we tentatively support the proposal so long as this approach is adhered to.

Wellington City Youth Council does not support an alcohol ban in Kelburn Park. Kelburn Park is seen by university students as an iconic space to be students and this would take this away from them. Kelburn Park is one of the safest spaces for students to be drinking and Youth Council raises concerns with how this proposed ban will impact the safety of students. This proposed ban risks driving students into the bushy areas surrounding Kelburn Park to drink, which could have major safety risks for both those drinking and the general public. Students will drink, and Youth Council believes it is better that this is done in an open space such as Kelburn Park. As well as this, the proposed ban in the area would be difficult to enforce by police, and students may simply hide their drinks leading to this being an inefficient use of resources.



Submission on Alcohol Control Bylaw - Kilbirnie and Kelburn

The Kilbirnie Business Network welcomes the opportunity to make a submission on the Wellington City Council Alcohol Control Bylaw – Kilbirnie and Kelburn. As we represent only the commercial property owners and businesses in Kilbirnie, we will restrict our comments to Kilbirnie.

The Kilbirnie suburb includes two supermarkets, a retirement village, a community centre, three colleges, one intermediate school, three primary schools, an indoor sports centre used by children; a swimming pool used by children, a number of early childhood day care centres, a number of churches and other social support agencies.

Our submission is that:

- <u>We support</u> the proposed liquor ban area A bordered by Mahora Street, Coutts Street, Childers Terrace, Evans Bay Parade (from Kemp Street) and Road
- We support the proposed liquor ban area B in Kilbirnie Park and surrounding streets
- Our reasons for supporting the liquor ban being established in these areas are as follows:
 - The Kilbirnie Business Network argued strongly for the Kilbirnie shopping area to be included as a liquor ban area the last two times this was reviewed in 2015 and 2018 and many of the reasons we argued then are the same today.
 - The issue of alcohol-influenced anti-social behaviour has continued to get worse along Bay Rd and has been identified as the number one concern by both retailers and visitors to Kilbirnie, with many people reporting to us that they have received threats and intimidatory behaviour from people clearly under the influence of alcohol (evidenced by the bottles and cans alongside them).
 - In 2015, 273 members of the public signed an online petition with the Wellington City Council to have the alcohol ban extended into Kilbirnie to tackle the problem of alcohol consumption in the centre of Kilbirnie and its associated offending.
 - Over the past few weeks we have had had forms in local stores available for the public to sign to show their support for a liquor ban - we attach copies of this petition form signed by 400 local residents supporting the proposed liquor ban.

- There have been a number of recorded complaints by people to Council over the past 5 years. A spate of broken windows along Bay Rd earlier last year was attributed to alcohol, evidenced by the beer bottles that were left behind.
- We understand that Council has received data on alcohol related crime or disorder in Kilbirnie from Police which shows 409 alcohol related offences between 2016 and 2019. We agree with the note that not all of these are related to drinking in public places, but it does paint a picture of alcoholrelated crime in the area.
- Local residents have reported incidents of drunks causing trouble around Kilbirnie. Anti-social behaviour, including aggression and abuse towards members of the public and begging, has caused a number of concerned residents to seek solutions from the Police and Council.
- Local businesses continue to report serious concerns with the harm being inflicted on staff and customers as evidenced in the email attachments below.
- We believe that the proposed liquor ban will see this type of behaviour drop significantly. Other behaviour reported are drunks urinating in the street, sniffing glue, hassling shopkeepers and demanding money from people at cash machines.

We respectfully submit that the Council implements the proposed 24/7 liquor ban in Kilbirnie (area A and B) as outlined in the statement of proposal.

We wish to be heard in support of our submission at oral hearings.



Submission on the proposed Alcohol Control Bylaw - Kilbirnie and Kelburn

This submission is from the Newtown Residents' Association.

We wish to speak to our submission.

Introduction

The Newtown Residents' Association is the Incorporated Society representing Newtown and the surrounding suburbs. We are an active local group of residents and businesspeople, concerned with maintaining and improving our area's liveability, connectedness and sustainability and working to make our community a thriving, diverse, great place to live.

Submission

In September 2018, in our submission on the Alcohol Control Bylaw, we said that we supported our neighbouring suburb Kilbirnie in efforts to extend the alcohol ban to cover their area. We are reiterating that support now.

We understand that following the alcohol ban being imposed in Newtown the problems in Kilbirnie increased so that they are now equivalent to those we used to have. As the existence of the ban has been an important factor in reducing the problems here we advocate for the same protection being extended to Kilbirnie.

There used to be serious problems with people drinking alcohol in public places in Newtown, leading on to disruptive and antisocial behaviour and issues with broken bottles and other waste – including human waste – littering areas where drinkers congregated. There have been improvements in behaviour since the liquor ban was established, but this needs vigilance - there are still people who break the ban and need to be reminded about it.

We recognise that the ban doesn't solve the underlying problems that lead to drinking, and that increasing the area of the ban might move the drinkers elsewhere. However in spite of this the liquor ban is needed as a mechanism to give residents, businesses and visitors confidence that action can be taken to curb and control antisocial behaviour that impacts on the enjoyment of daily life in our suburbs.

Wellington City Council Alcohol Management Strategy

In our September submission we supported reviewing the above strategy and said that we would like to be involved. It is good to read in the current statement of proposal about the proposals for managing alcohol related issues in Kilbirnie, including an increased presence of Local Hosts, access to Meaningful Activities programmes, and supporting a more intentional outreach service and tenancy services to address homelessness and those at risk of

homelessness. These services need to be more present in Newtown as well, and we look forward to hearing more about this.

Answers to specific questions posed by WCC

- We support creating an alcohol ban area in the Kilbirnie business area and in Kilbirnie Park. We also suggest extending the area so that it includes the Kilbirnie Mosque and its environs.
- We support the alcohol ban in Kilbirnie having the same conditions as the existing ban, and being in place 24 hours a day seven days a week.
- We are not commenting on Kelburn Park as it is out of our area, although we expect the principles are the same there.

Response to consultation questions

We thank Council for further continuing their liquor ban consultation and acknowledge their commitment to addressing the needs of these communities.

1. Do you support the proposal to create an alcohol ban area in the Kilbirnie area - shown as 'A' in Figure 1?

Regional Public Health (RPH) supports the liquor ban if it is used with appropriate discretion and is supported by a range of activities to address the particular needs in Kilbirnie that will further assist the desired change. Police and community evidence shows an area with significant antisocial behaviour impacting on the community. A liquor ban is an accepted tool that when used with discretion is useful in controlling such behaviour and can reduce the impact of alcohol misuse in the community.

To enable effective solutions to be implemented it is important to understand the core features and the drivers of the presenting social problems. It will be important for Council, Police and RPH along with other agencies to work collaboratively to address the underlying problems to better support change in the community. It is our understanding the issues in Kilbirnie may be derived from both alcohol misuse and possibly drug use and distribution, primarily from a small number of residents within the area. It is also plausible that others are being drawn to the area if drug supply and use is a defining problem. It is our understanding that rough sleeping or homelessness is not a significant feature of the issues although it may not be entirely absent.

A core concern for us is that those with dependence and addiction issues receive the appropriate health and social assistance to foster change in their lives. This is not as easy as it sounds and requires a thorough knowledge of the driving issues with sustained support to create change in their life circumstances. A collaborative approach coming from an understanding of the personal and community context with engagement of the appropriate services will provide the best opportunities for improvement.

RPH is less supportive of liquor bans where rough sleeping and homelessness driven by substance abuse are found to be the core features of the antisocial behaviours. A liquor ban in this situation would prompt relocation and it would be more difficult to connect those needing support to the appropriate services.

2. Do you support the proposal to establish an alcohol ban area in Kilbirnie Park and the surrounding streets - shown as 'B' in Figure 1?

RPH supports the introduction of an alcohol ban in area B. The concerns expressed by the community hub and sports centre are important to acknowledge and it would not be unexpected that the antisocial behaviours could be relocated here and exasperate the existing problems.

3. If an alcohol ban was created in Kilbirnie, do you support it being in place 24 hours, seven days a week?

RPH supports the ban being 24 hours, seven days a week if it can be demonstrated that the issues connected with the public place consumption of alcohol occur across that period. The evidence from community submissions would suggest this is appropriate. Other agencies may be able to provide greater clarity.

4. Do you support the proposed change to the alcohol ban area in Kelburn Park shown in Figure 2?

RPH supports the introduction of an alcohol ban in Kelburn Park. The park is a well-known public location for the consumption of alcohol. Our concerns regarding the misuse and excessive consumption in the tertiary population are well known to Council and we continue to present health information to Wellington District Licensing Committees in efforts to reduce alcohol related harm. Excessive consumption is impacting on student health and likely their performance, as well as diminishing the amenity and good order of the area creating stress and welfare issues for residents.

We acknowledge that Victoria University has adopted a number of approaches in efforts to reduce alcohol related harm; such as increased security, social norm approaches where greater visibility is made of students' non-drinking or moderate consumption, support for students with problem consumption and restorative justice for those adversely impacting on their local communities. These policies at Victoria may be making some impact on hazardous consumption alongside a general culture shift in the younger population associated with the increasing interest in healthy living and sustainability.

NZ research shows that policy and wider environmental changes are contributing to a small reduction in the tertiary student prevalence of drinking to intoxication and the prevalence of drinking generally¹. However excessive consumption levels are still too high. Further this reduction in consumption is not necessarily visible for those living alongside student populations. Increased student numbers means the population level reduction in harm is less visible in these communities. With student numbers expected to grow further the problem is not likely to be resolved in the short term.

We expect the introduction of a ban to have a dampening effect on the consumption of alcohol in public and would not result in a total transfer of the problems to another location, particularly if adopted with further actions to reduce consumption and harm. Concerns about displacement could be well managed through an evaluation of the ban. We would be willing to work with interested agencies, the university and students to assess the bans impact and progress further strategies to reduce alcohol harm in the tertiary population.

5. If an alcohol ban was established in Kelburn Park, do you support it only being in place between the hours of 8pm and 8am, seven days a week?

It is our understanding that students are more likely to be drinking in Kelburn Park in the evenings and the evenings are more problematic for residents. We therefore support the 8pm to 8am time frame for the ban.

6. Have you experienced any alcohol related crime or disorder in any of the proposed areas?

Kilbirnie

Kilbirnie residents exhibit higher levels of hospital admissions from intoxication and alcohol poisoning being in the top 10 per cent worst in the Wellington region. The crude rate which measures the actual level of harm in the resident population area units places Kilbirnie East at 15th and Kilbirnie West-Haitaitai South at 17th in the region. The standardised rate which gives each population the same demographic make-up ranks Kilbirnie East at 14th and Kilbirnie West-Hataitai South 11th. This means that the harm here is less defined by the age make-up of the residents where young people tend to be more hazardous drinkers. Residents here have more hazardous consumption behaviours than their peers of a similar age regionally.

Kelburn


Kelburn Park is a large sports ground situated in the Lambton area unit boarding Kelburn. The majority of the university hostels which house predominantly first year students are located in the Lambton area unit in close proximity to the park, see maps attached.


NZ studies have found a higher prevalence of hazardous drinking among students when compared with their non-student peers with first year students at particularly high risk². The population crude rate of acute hospital admissions for alcohol intoxication and alcohol poisoning in Lambton and Kelburn place them in the 10 per cent worst areas in the Wellington region. Lambton ranked 2nd and Kelburn 11th. Assessment of the standardised rate where each area unit is assigned the same population demographics has Lambton still ranked 2nd and Kelburn drops to 28th. This demonstrates that for Kelburn the level of harm is partially accounted for by the demographic age makeup having a high proportion of young people who tend to drink more hazardously than the population generally. However in Lambton the standardised rate demonstrates that the behaviours of the young people in this area are more extreme than young people's drinking habits regionally and mirrors the national research which shows first year students to be at very high risk.

Figure 1: Aerial View of Kelburn Park and Surrounds






