Support Letter for Flamingo Scooters

Dear Wellington City Council

Nick Hyland and his team at Flamingo Scooters have been very valued supporters of Newtown Festival since 2019. We would like to acknowledge their generosity, their community mindedness and their Kiwi can do spirit, and we would highly recommend Wellington City renew their licence to operate as a city provider of micro-mobility. Their support for the Newtown Festival team and the mahi that goes into making such a fantastic free event has been amazing. It totally transforms our ability to set up and pack down the event – an absolute lifesaver on the 18 hour day of the Festival. We couldn't do it without them. It is a brilliant community partnership that our core crew looks forward to every year. Nick and his team have been very easy to communicate with, very responsive to our needs and very kind and generous.

10 weeks of Flamingo Scooters makes Newtown Festival prep manageable

This support letter is a sneak peek behind the scenes of the Newtown Festival organising, to explain the significance of the generous collaborative spirit whereby Nick Hyland and the Flamingo Scooters team have over the years helped support us to run the event. Nick has never sought the limelight for this contribution, but for us it's been a game changer, and we feel Wellington City should know how helpful and community minded they have been.

Flamingo's generous annual donation of free scooter mobility for the festival team has become integral to the functionality of putting on Newtown Festival. The scooters they provide us with make the hard work fun. Our site covers over 2km of streets with 16 stages and 10 road closure points that all need checking by members of the core team as the festival sets up before dawn and packs down at night, as well as during the running of the event all day. It's too far to be walking back and forth, not feasible to drive up and down the site while stalls are setting up and people are thronging the streets, so scooters are a fabulous way for the team to get around the site easily and safely.

Every year since 2019 Flamingo's generous donation of 4 or 5 e-scooters begins in late January and runs right through till mid-March. Having these free scooters and the Flamingo safety helmets on tap at Newtown Festival HQ provides us with a vital tool for our core crew, making our pre-event prep and set-up, road marking, site checking and then post-event pack down, site clean-up and equipment demounting so much easier than it used to be.

Electric micro mobility helps us have a low carbon footprint and enables us to be nimble – to be readily available to local businesses, schools and residents as the community gears up for the Festival. We can easily and quickly meet anywhere on site with our tech crew and providers prepping and fine-tuning the site layout, and with our Traffic Management Contractor arranging



signage and safety barrier layouts and with WCC Officers checking the site prep or road works. And there's the added bonus that by e-scooter is a fun way to travel !

On the Friday afternoon, or Saturday morning, of Festival weekend the Flamingo electric van arrives at Festival HQ and 12 to 14 more scooters are dropped off to us. This enlarges the fleet of scooters that are free for our team to use, matching the growing needs of our crew and volunteers assembling and prepping ready for a very full-on Sunday. The very first question several regular volunteers and paid crew ask is: "Have we got those free Flamingos again this year ? followed by "Right count me in !"

Newtown Festival – Aotearoa's largest annual free music festival and street fair

Throughout the entire day of the Festival our core team use the free e-scooters donated by Flamingo to keep things running smoothly. We couldn't do this without them.

Some background about the event: On the Sunday of the first full weekend in March every year the streets of central Newtown are closed to traffic to make room for a day-long family-friendly free street party. This much-loved fabulous event has grown over the last thirty years to become the largest free music festival, street fair and market in the country.

From 4.15am in the morning our crew and volunteer marshals use the 22 scooters to deploy themselves to a wide variety of set-up tasks. Some set-up roles require nimble mobility from one end of the road closure to the other ASAP, for which the Flamingos are ideal. Other tasks require repetitive trips back and forwards with key pieces of equipment (while power is being distributed, or recycling bases are being established, or wrongly parked vehicles are being towed....). Key stage techs use them to go from one backstage to the other. In some cases, the volunteer marshals simply use them to minimise standing and walking time, a must when you got out of bed to assist with set-up before the road closure begins at 5am. And it turns out by Flamingo scooter is a great way to deliver take away coffee to your fellow volunteers.

Here's why it's such a complex job for so many people: On Aotearoa Children's Day, Sunday 5 March 2023, Newtown Festival hosted 16 stages featuring both well-known and emerging Kiwi musicians from a range of genres, performance parades, cultural groups, kapa haka, street

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performers and circus. During 15 hours of performance Newtown Festival's 16 stages, the Festival parades, and 8 local Newtown venues saw programmed performances by 237 acts, over 1,000 artists. The full day's Performance Programme info sign is appended here, showing the amazing talent who provided such a fabulous free show.

There were also free family focussed street sports and games, free carnival rides and balance bike and scooter skills tracks for tamariki and around 420 stalls including crafts, fashion, homewares and a huge variety of ethnic and international food from 150 food stalls. As a whanau friendly event we also host community and sports group information stalls for a token booking fee between \$25 and \$50 – and sometimes for no charge at all, so they can reach our massive crowds.

The detailed event site plan showing all the stalls, the 16 stages and free activities from this year's Newtown Festival is appended here to give you an idea of the scale and complexity of the 2 kilometres of streets transformed by Newtown Festival. Activating and managing this extraordinary transformation involved 165 volunteers along with 266 people who were paid to contribute their skills on the day.

At around 10.15am, after everything you see on the site plan has been set up in place and is running smoothly, our Marshal team hand at least 12 of our 22 e-scooters back to the Flamingo crew who then run the free Flamingo Scooter ride zone for the public. The Flamingo zone provides a whole day focussed on free skills training for the public to learn to ride safely and well.

From mid-morning on Newtown Festival day when the streets fill with the crowds there are between 25,000 to 30,000 people on site, over the course of the day around 80,000 people attend the Newtown Festival.

You can't e-scooter inside the Festival, it's far too crowded. Flamingo geo-block their hire fleet so all except the ones they have lent to us shut down inside Newtown Festival. To assist the public and the running of the Festival the Flamingo crew spend the day curating scooter parking zones at our two busiest entrances for the public to get to and from the event by scooter.

Safe Road Closure for our vast crowds – coordinated thanks to Flamingo Scooters!

The implementation and management of the Traffic Diversion Bypass and a Safe Road Closure are vital to the success of our iconic event. Throughout the entire day our core team use our Flamingo scooters to help keep this aspect of the event running smoothly and safely.

Every year, we safely close to all traffic 12 blocks of the 3 main arterial Newtown roads, a onekilometre spine along with 14 associated side streets. We use the Flamingo scooters to nimbly check around the outside of this vast site which has more than 10 separate entry and exit points that are monitored by Road Closure Marshals and Traffic Management Crews from 5am in the morning till 9pm at night. The last road re-opens to traffic at 11.30 pm.



For the public being there, out in the street, celebrating, performing, watching, dancing, enjoying food and drink, enjoying free games and free rides all in the outdoors, in central Newtown, while the roads are closed to traffic is a key aspect of the popularity of the Newtown Festival, for both young and old.

The detailed event site plan showing all the stalls, the 16 stages and free activities from this year's Newtown Festival is appended here showing the scale and complexity of the 2 kilometres of streets transformed by Newtown Festival. The Road Closure Map, also attached, highlights the key features inside the Festival and shows the 2 kilometres of the Festival Traffic Bypass along with its temporary one-way streets and the 7 Newtown Festival temporary bus stops.

On the day of the Festival managing and overseeing all of this on site begins at 4.15am, with a very complex closure set up. Pack down ends for us just before midnight. With our Flamingo scooters we can move around easily and cope with such a long day while successfully keeping an eye on the event and the closure edges as well as checking that the Festival Bypass is running smoothly. Thanks to the ability to rapidly respond on a Flamingo scooter we even manage to take a break or two!





Newlands and Woodridge - Towers to Poles



Who is Transpower?

Transpower is the owner and operator of the National Grid - the high voltage transmission network made up of lines and substations connecting areas of generation with towns and cities across New Zealand.

Transpower is replacing the old transmission towers in and around Newlands and Woodridge with modern steel poles.

The old towers need an increasingly large amount of maintenance due to their age and condition. Putting in new steel poles will reduce the maintenance needs for this electricity transmission line and make it more resilient to any extreme weather or natural disasters.

Replacing the towers with poles is planned to take about 18 months, starting from winter 2024 and ending in summer 2025/26.

Before we do this, we will do one final round of maintenance on the existing towers from March to May 2024, to strengthen them and make them easier to remove.

Much of this work is on private land near people's homes. We will work to minimise disruption to residents and neighbours and make sure property we work on or near is taken care of.

The transmission line and tower locations in Newlands and Woodridge

When this work will happen

Tower strengthening work – planned for March to May 2024

This work involves attaching steel to some of the existing towers to strengthen them and may also involve some small amounts of painting. The strengthening work will also make it easier and faster to remove the tower during the replacement phase.

Tower replacement work – planned to begin from June or July 2024

This work involves using cranes to install new poles next to the existing towers, then removing the towers.

Indicative timeline:

- From Winter 2024 begin work to prepare the foundations. •
- From Spring 2024 start installing the new poles. It may take up to 18 months to replace all the • towers on the line in the area.

The new poles

The new poles require less maintenance and will take up a smaller space at ground level. The images shown are taken from the same line further north where similar pole replacements have already been made. The poles shown here are taller than those that will be used in Newlands and Woodridge.

About this transmission line

This transmission line runs from the Transpower substation on Takapu Road (near the Transmission Gully motorway) alongside Grenada North and Grenada Village, though Woodridge and Newlands to connect with Wellington Electricity's network at Ngauranga. This line operates at 33,000 Volts (33 kV) and supplies electricity to homes and businesses in Ngauranga, Johnsonville, Newlands, Paparangi and Woodridge.

Cost

The total project to replace the towers with monopoles is expected to be around \$12 million.

What we will do at each site

The work will involve the activities of drilling and pouring the foundations required for the new poles (from Winter 2024), erecting the new poles (from Spring 2024), and then removing the old towers. We are still designing the methodology for these activities, but it will largely require

large boom cranes like the one shown on the right, and other heavy equipment. We will be working with the local community to keep our impact to a minimum while we undertake this work.

Where can the public find out more?

We are talking directly to landowners hosting our existing towers.
