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## PROPOSED TEMPORARY ROAD CLOSURE – IMPACT REPORT

#### POLISH CHRISTMAS MARKET SATURDAY 20 NOVEMBER 2021 6AM TO 11.30PM RAIN DAY SUNDAY 21 NOVEMBER 2021 6AM TO 11.30PM

#### 1. Description of Event

The Dom Poliski (Polish) House has been located at 257 Riddiford Street Newtown since 1956. The Polish Christmas market has been held for 4 years, last year there was overwhelming support for this market, so to cater for the growing number of participants an application has been made to hold it on the street this year.

Dom Polski has an extensive frontage along the Riddiford Street end of Rhodes Street, and it is therefore proposed to use this section of Rhodes Street through to Ferguson Street, and nearby Arney Street to hold the Christmas Market this year. If this is a success, the organisers will look at continuing to use Rhodes Street and Arney Street in the future.

Please refer to the map on Attachment 1 for details of the proposed road closures.

It is expected the market will add to the on-street vibrancy in Newtown. It is supported by the Newtown Residents Association an organisation with extensive experience in organising events such as the Annual Newtown Festival.

The proposed road closures to vehicles and cyclists, are as follows: Polish Christmas Market: Saturday 20 November 2021 6am to 11.30pm. Rain Day Sunday 21 November 2021 6am to 11.30pm.

- Rhodes Street (between Riddiford Street and Fergusson Street)
- Arney Street (Riddiford Street to the End)
- Outdoor Market opens at 8.00am and closes at 8.30pm

Please refer to the map attachment for further detail.

Road closure notification boards will be placed at each end of the closure at least 10 working days prior to the event.

The event will be managed by a qualified temporary traffic management company.

Pedestrian access will not be restricted, and emergency services will have immediate access to the area if required. Public transport operators have been notified of the proposed closure

#### **Climate Change**

Now in its 5<sup>th</sup> year the Wellington Polish Christmas Market started 2017 with a ban on plastic single use bags before this became a legal requirement. Organisers have produced 100% cotton calico bags that will be available for sale.

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From 2018 year onwards, this event has had a zero-waste target. To achieve this

- All stalls are required to use compostable packaging. Other stalls are not allowed to use plastic bags and packaging (there are exceptions for reuse of used packaging materials i.e., bubble wrap).
- Market goers are encouraged to bring keep cups.
- Organisers collected used (and sterilised) glass jars to package items from the market café.
- Glass bottles are collected and reused by home brewing enthusiasts within the community (also advertised via social media).
- Decorations for the market space are mainly made from recycled materials.
- All market waste is handled through the organisers own waste stations.

  congregate will dictate any postponement date should it be required.





#### Officers' Recommendations

Delegate to the Chief Executive Officer the power to conclude all matters in relations to the road stopping and disposal of the Land, including all legislative matters, issuing relevant public notices, declaring the road stopped, negotiating the terms of the sale or exchange, imposing any reasonable covenants, and anything else necessary.
- 3) Note that if objections are received to the road stopping, and the applicant wished to continue, a further report will be presented to the Regulatory Processes Committee for consideration.

#### Whakarāpopoto

#### Executive Summary

- 4. The owners of 40 Avon Street, Island Bay (the Owners) have applied to purchase approximately 315m2 legal road land (the Land) adjoining their property.
- 5. The Land is shown outlined red on Attachment 2.
- 6. Utility providers and relevant Council business units have been consulted. All support the proposal, subject to conditions (where relevant).
- 7. Initial consultation letters were sent to the adjoining and adjacent neighbours and, at the time of writing this report no responses had been received.
- 8. If the Council agrees with the recommendations of the Regulatory Processes Committee, the road stopping will then be publicly notified. At that time, any neighbours, organisations, or any other member of the public will have the opportunity to make a submission.

#### Takenga mai

#### Background

- 9. Avon Street is a short carriageway comprising a formed two-way road extending from The Parade in the west for approximately 300 metres to the east, where it adjoins the unformed portion of the street which extends for approximately 100 metres up to Volga Street.
- 10. A formed pedestrian walkway extends over the unformed portion of the street linking Volga Street with the eastern end of the formed portion of Avon Street.

- 11. The Land is located on the unformed portion of the street extending off its western side. It is of an irregular shape and predominantly has a sloping contour either above or below the main building platform of 40 Avon Street. It is covered in a mixture of vegetation of lawn, long grass, low-lying shrubs and trees as well as a small formed concrete path. Attachment 3 shows views of the legal road land, proposed to be stopped, from the public pedestrian path.
- 12. 40 Avon Street is a triangular shaped lot with frontage on Avon Street. It is accessed by foot only from either the formed carriageway of Avon Street to the west, or Volga Street to the east.
- 13. The owners of 40 Avon Street have applied to purchase the Land to provide options to build a tiny house or a granny flat.

#### Kōrerorero

#### Discussion

- 14. Advisors from Council's Transport Network Team have confirmed the Land is not required for future road widening or public access purposes. They supported the proposal subject to the adjoining public walkway not been affected, and retaining a minimum width of 7m between the new frontge and the property at 11 Erica Pabst Way, located opposite.
- 15. Should the road stopping proposal be successful, the Land will be amalgamated with 40 Avon Street.
- 16. Road stopping is provided for under Sections 319 and 342 and the Tenth Schedule of the Local Government Act 1974 (LGA).
- 17. The Council, under Section 40 of the Public Works Act 1981 (PWA), 'shall endeavour' to dispose of any land not required for the public work for which it was taken, and which is not required for any public work. Section 345 of the LGA provides Council with the statutory power to dispose of stopped road.
- 18. Relevant Council business units have been consulted and none wish to retain the Land.
- 19. Officers are giving the Walking Access Commission the opportunity to comment on road stopping proposals early in the process. The Commission supports the proposal by 40 Avon Street, without conditions.
- 20. As is normal practise in the early stages of the road stopping process, officers have written to the adjoining and adjacent owners notifying them that Council had received the road stopping application. All the owners will be consulted again when formal public consultation is carried out later in the road stopping process.
- 21. If Council approves the above, officers will establish whether any offer back obligations under Section 40 of the PWA exist.

#### Kōwhiringa

#### Options

22. The alternative to the recommendations would be to continue with the current situation which would incur some holding costs to avoid the area becoming overgrown.

#### Whai whakaaro ki ngā whakataunga

#### Considerations for decision-making

#### Alignment with Council's strategies and policies

- 23. The recommendations of this report are consistent with the Road Encroachment and Sale Policy 2011 policy.
- 24. This proposed road stopping has no significant impact on the Long-Term Plan.

#### **Engagement and Consultation**

- 25. Letters were sent to the relevant adjoining and adjacent owners notifying them that Council had received this road stopping application. At the time of preparing this report no responses had been received.
- 26. These neighbouring owners will be consulted again when the formal public consultation is carried out later in the road stopping process and they will have an opportunity to enter a written submission if they so choose.

#### Implications for Māori

27. Iwi groups have not been consulted. The proposal does not conflict with the principles of the Treaty of Waitangi nor is the Land located within a Māori Precinct or an area identified as significant to Māori. The Land is not being disposed of on the open market and will not become a standalone allotment as amalgamation is proposed.

#### **Financial implications**

- 28. There are no significant financial considerations related to this recommendation. Any costs associated with the disposal of the Land will be recovered from the applicant, and the proceeds of the sale are directed towards the general fund.
- 29. In August 2011 new cost sharing initiatives were approved by Council, with rebates being applicable to make purchasing legal road land more attractive. The rebate amount is determined at the end of the road stopping process when all the costs are known.

#### Legal considerations

 The road stopping process is consistent with the requirements of Sections 319, 342, 345 and Schedule 10 of the Local Government Act 1974 (LGA). The sale and purchase agreement will be prepared by Council's in house solicitor.

#### **Risks and mitigations**

31. The road stopping proposal is being carried out in accordance with LGA legislation and therefore risk is mitigated. There will be public notification, as is required.

#### Disability and accessibility impact

32. The proposal is considered to have no disability or accessibility impacts.

#### **Climate Change impact and considerations**

33. There are no known climate change implications for this road stopping.

#### **Communications Plan**

34. Public consultation in accordance with the Tenth Schedule of the LGA will be carried out later in the road stopping process.

#### Health and Safety Impact considered

35. Officers are not aware of any negative health and safety impacts relating to the proposal.




