OBJECTION TO A CLASSIFICATION UNDER THE DOG CONTROL ACT 1996

1. This report asks the Pūroro Hātepe | Regulatory Processes Committee to determine whether to uphold or rescind a classification as a menacing dog under the Dog Control Act 1996 (the Act).

Executive Summary

5. This report asks the Pūroro Hātepe | Regulatory Processes Committee to determine whether to uphold or rescind a classification as a menacing dog under the Dog Control Act 1996 (the Act).

Takenga mai

Background

6. Under the Act, Council may classify dogs as menacing (section 33A) if
 - a) A dog has not been classified as a dangerous dog under section 31; but
 - b) A territorial authority considers may pose a threat to any person, stock, poultry, domestic animal, or protected wildlife because of –
 - i. Any observed or reported behaviour of the dog; or
 - ii. Any characteristics typically associated with the dog's breed or type.
7. The effect of classification as a menacing dog is referred to in section 33E of the Act.

Kōrerorero

Discussion

8. Council's Public Health team has classified a dog as menacing and the dog owner has objected to this classification.
9. Both parties were asked to submit evidence, which has been attached to this report.

10. The committee will sit in a quasi-judicial capacity for this hearing. The meeting will proceed as follows:
 - The WCC Public Health team will present their evidence and any witnesses and answer any questions from committee members.
 - The dog owner will present their evidence and any witnesses and answer any questions from committee members.
 - The WCC Public Health team will have the opportunity to respond to the dog owner's case.
 - The dog owner will have the opportunity to respond to the WCC Public Health team's case.
11. No cross-examination of one party by the other will be permitted.
12. Following hearing from both parties, the committee will adjourn to deliberate on the matter. The deliberations will take place with the public and both parties excluded but will be minuted in detail. These minutes will form the basis of the determination issued by the chairperson.
13. Following the deliberations, the committee will reconvene, and a motion will be moved, seconded, debated, and voted on. Standard committee procedures for debate and voting will be used. The vote will be by simple majority.
14. Following the meeting, the chairperson will issue a determination which will be attached to the standard meeting minutes.

Objection to Dog Classification Section 33 A

Executive Summary

Warning: Please note document contains graphic photographs of a serious injury.

On 31 October 2021, [REDACTED], a witness, contacted Wellington City Council's Animal Services advising that "a lady was attacked by a dog", he also advised that her taken to hospital by his friend (Appendix 1).

Ms [REDACTED] was bitten and dragged to the ground by the dog which resulted in; an open fracture, a compound fracture, exposed tendons and serious lacerations. These injuries required both general and plastic surgeries.

The incident occurred on Townsend Road, a public street in Miramar.

On 1 November 2021 Senior Animal Control Officer (ACO) [REDACTED] commenced her investigation

On 4 November 2021, the dog was seized and assessed under an attack rating report (Appendix 3) and classified as a menacing dog under Section 33A of the Dog Control Act 1996.

On 17 November 2021, Colin Wood lodged an appeal against the Menacing Dog Classification.

On 16 December 2021, ACO [REDACTED] received a sworn statement from Ms [REDACTED] where she advised that as she walked past the Dog Owner Colin Wood, that the dog jumped up and bit her.

31 October 2021 Incident

On 31 October 2021, Animal Services received notification by Mr [REDACTED] (Appendix 1) that he had a lady had been attacked by a dog, and his friend had taken her to hospital. He provided Animal Services with the dog owners details.

Ms [REDACTED]'s sworn statement (Appendix 4) advises that she was walking her usual route on Townsend Road towards the junction with Wilberforce Street at approximately 10:30 – 10:45am on 31 October 2021, a public place.

She saw the dog owner and the dog on the grass verge, stationery. She advises that as she passed the dog it bit her and pulled her to the ground. She didn't see the dog jump, "just remember it grabbing my hand".

Ms [REDACTED] states, "when I fell to the ground the dog still had my hand in its mouth. The dog released my hand I was still on the ground". Ms [REDACTED] goes on to state that she saw she had a very bound wound and thought "I could see the bone".

Mr Wood states (Appendix 5) that he was managing the dog's faeces at the time of the incident. He had taken a poo bag out of his main bag and was "kneeling down in the grass with my back to the foot path". From Mr Wood's statement it is indicated that the dog was on lead at the time of the attack.

Mr Wood also states that when he looked over a "and saw he (the dog) had [REDACTED]'s jersey sleeve in his mouth". He went on to state that his "first reaction was to pull the dog away from [REDACTED]" and believed "that this is where most of the damage done to [REDACTED]'s hand came from".

After The dog releasing Ms [REDACTED], Mr Wood secured the dog and went to attend to Ms [REDACTED]. Upon his return, Ms [REDACTED] states that he took off his top and wrapped it around Ms [REDACTED]'s hand.

At this time, two members of the public ([REDACTED] and [REDACTED]), driving passed, saw Ms [REDACTED] on the ground and stopped to render assistance. [REDACTED] took Ms [REDACTED] to hospital and [REDACTED] remained on the scene and entered into a conversation with Mr Wood. Mr Wood advised him that this had never happened before (Appendix 1).



There is no disagreement between parties that Ms [REDACTED] was attacked and bitten by the dog.

Investigation into 31 October 2021 incident.

On 31 October 2021, Senior ACO [REDACTED] commenced her investigation.

On 31 October 2021 Senior ACO [REDACTED] advised Mr Wood that he must present the dog to the pound. Mr Wood advised that he was on his way to the hospital, Senior ACO advised that the dog can stay at home, but not to walk him or muzzle him. This request was repeated on 3 November 2021 by request of Team Leader Public Health, Jude Austin (Appendix 1).

During the investigation, it was revealed that the dog was registered to [REDACTED] [REDACTED] who resides at the same address as Mr Wood. The ownership of the dog was transferred to Mr Wood on 3 November 2021.

Mr Wood presented the dog to Senior ACO [REDACTED] on 4 November at 10:17 am. At that time, Mr Wood provided Animal Services with his statement of the events (Appendix 5). The dog was conditionally released with a menacing dog classification.

Senior ACO [REDACTED], assessed the dog under the Attack Rating Report as is consistent with all dog attacks.

The outcome of “The dog’s” rating is a risk level of 48 requiring ACO’s to issue, warning notice, Menacing Classification, Infringement and prosecution assessment.

On 1 November 2021, Senior ACO [REDACTED] received photos of Ms [REDACTED]’s injuries and x-rays (Appendix 6).

On 3 November 2021, [REDACTED], Ms [REDACTED]’s brother advised Senior ACO [REDACTED] that they were still considering their options.

On 4 November 2021 Senior ACO [REDACTED] issued Mr Wood:

1. Notice of Retention of Dog/s Threatening Public Safety under Section 71 (Appendix 8 & 9)
2. Notice of Seizure and Removal of Dog (Appendix 9)
3. Email detailing release and classification (Appendix 10)



4. Notice of Menacing Dog Classification (Appendix 11)

On 4 November 2021, Mr Wood contacted Senior ACO [REDACTED] requesting the consideration of a probationary period of 6 months to a year on the muzzling requirement (Appendix 12).

On approximately 8 November 2021, hospital reports from both Wellington Hospital and Wellington Regional Plastic, Maxillofacial & Burns unit, covering Ms [REDACTED]'s injuries and treatment (Appendix 7).

On 17 November 2021 Mr Wood submitted an appeal against the menacing dog classification to Wellington City Council (Appendix 13) The findings of the investigation were upheld and Mr Wood advised that he wishes to continue his appeal to be heard in Council (Appendix 14).

Injuries sustained to Ms [REDACTED]

The injuries sustained to Ms [REDACTED] as a result of the dog attack required both General and Plastic Surgery. Ms [REDACTED] was hospitalised for 3 days and required medications and ongoing treatment.

A review of the medical report outlined the injuries as follows:

- Compound fractures
- Open fracture
- Significant tissue damage and exposed tendons.
- Bleeding
- Loss of sensation
- Pain

Ms [REDACTED] has also provided a victim impact statement, which covers her experience, ongoing physical and psychological trauma, ability to care for her parents, perform everyday tasks, loss of independence, financial constraints and restrictions on her leisure time.



History of the dog

The dog has not come to the attention of Animals Services prior to the incident on 31 October 2021.

Dog Owner Colin Wood has demonstrated responsibility over the incident. He attended Ms [REDACTED] at the time of the incident, visited Ms [REDACTED] in hospital and entered discussions with her brother. He has also offered to cover any expenses, (Appendix 4) however it is unclear whether any reparations have been made. The Dog Control Act 1996 provides under Section 63 - Owner Liable for damage done by dog.

Grounds for Appeal of Menacing Dog Classification.

On 17 November 2021 Mr Wood lodged an "Appeal for the dog (Appendix 13). The grounds for the appeal are as follows.

- No Previous incidences of aggressive behaviour towards humans
- The dog is a family dog
- Property is fenced and he is kept on lead on the deck.

Mr Wood goes on to state that.

"The dog didn't attach (to) her as he is almost 60 Kgs and if he attacked the outcome would have been totally different. The dog just grabbed her jersey sleeve and unfortunately caught the bottom of her hand. He released her when requested".

Mr Wood advises that the dog has rejected two muzzles and proposes a one-year probation period. There is no provision in the Act for probationary periods for menacing or dangerous dogs.

On 14 January 2022, Senior ACO [REDACTED] completed her investigation, the outcome of which

Analysis

In the original statements (Appendix 4 and 5) Wellington City Council is satisfied that the dog, did attack Ms [REDACTED] on 31 October 2021, causing significant injuries to Ms [REDACTED]'s hand, a prosecution offence under Section 58 of the Act.

Mr Wood has demonstrated concern for Ms [REDACTED] at the time of the attack and acted responsibly in his willingness to assist her.

Section 5 – Obligations of Dog Owners

Section 57 – Dog attacking Persons or Animals

Section 58 – Dog causing Serious Injury

Section 63 – Owner Liable for Damage Done by Dogs

The incident occurred in a public place; Mr Wood had the dog on lead but not under control a breach of Section 5 (b) Obligation of Dog Owners. At the time of the attack Mr Wood was occupied with picking up faeces from the grass verge and stated that he “felt a tug”.

At the time of the attack [REDACTED] was the registered owner of the dog and ownership was transferred to Mr Colin Wood. Mr Wood was responsible (Appendix 5) for the control of the dog under Section 2 Interpretation of Owner (b) as he had the dog in his possession.

Ms [REDACTED] was walking on her usual daily walk on Townsend Road, towards the junction of Wilberforce Street. Ms [REDACTED] states “the dog bit me and pulled me to the ground” (Appendix 4). This is a breach of Section 57 of the Act.

Mr Wood states “my first reaction was to pull the dog away from [REDACTED] before calling him to let go, which he did (I believe this is where most of the damage to [REDACTED]’s hand came from)”. The evidence reveals that the dog latched on to Ms [REDACTED]’s hand, pulled her to the ground and it required Mr Wood to pull the dog from Ms [REDACTED]. This differs to the statement in Mr Woods Appeal (Appendix 13) in which he states that the dog didn’t attach.

Both parties agree that the Dog did attack and bite Ms [REDACTED], causing a serious injury which required hospitalisation and medical attention (Appendix 4 and 5) an offence under Section 58 of the Act.



Mr Wood does not dispute the injuries that Ms [REDACTED] received, and Medical Records submitted in Appendix 7 are provided as evidence as to the seriousness of the attack.

The assessment chart applies risk levels based on the following criteria;

- The seriousness of the attack
- Public Interest,
- Legislative Intent
- Classified (unleashed or muzzled)
- Victim Impact
- Dog Surrendered or Destroyed
- Observed aggression
- Negligence
- Co-Operation
- Previous history
- Dog registered at the time of incident
- Restraint
- Known by owner to be dangerous
- Recurrence Likelihood
- Trained to be aggressive
- Damages
- Breed characteristics

The outcome of The Dog's rating is a risk level of 48 requiring Senior ACO [REDACTED] to issue a warning notice, Meaning Classification and Or Infringement. The dog was conditionally released into Mr Woods possession, classified as a menacing dog under Section 71 and 57 of the Act. (Appendix 11). The score matrix is as follows;

Score	Outcome
09-29	Warning Notice, Menacing Classification and or infringement
30-36	Dangerous Dog Classification and or infringement
Over 37	Prosecution

Due to the dog's rating of 48, Wellington City Council is undertaking a prosecution consideration and Dangerous Dog Classification. The decision to prosecute will be undertaken by Wellington City Council Legal.

Section 63 is a provision that states that the owner is liable for damage done by dog. Mr Wood has offered reparation, however Wellington City Council is unaware if this has been undertaken.



Wellington City Council is satisfied that;

- Breaches under Sections 57 and 58 of the Act has occurred.
- The incident occurred on public property.
- The dog was on lead but not under control.
- The dog attacked Ms [REDACTED]
- Ms [REDACTED] suffered serious injuries as a result of the attack.
- Based on the evidence provided, the menacing dog classification decision is robust and justified.
- That a prosecution consideration under Section 58 must be undertaken.

Conclusion

Animal Services have an obligation under Section 33 A to classify a dog as menacing to ensure that further aggressive and uncontrolled animal behaviour is prevented.

The dog if unmuzzled is a risk to the public.

The dog has not come to the attention of Animal services in the past.

Based on a sufficient set of facts and evidence the Attack Rating Report assessment was an appropriate cause of action.

Based on the score of the Attack Rating Report assessment, Wellington City Council has an obligation to classify the dog as Dangerous under section 31 of the Act. – Territorial Authority to classify dangerous dogs.

Due to the significant injuries suffered by Ms [REDACTED], Wellington City Council has an obligation to consider prosecution under section 58 of the Act.



The defendant is obligating under the Act to ensure the dog is kept under control at all times.

The dog owner is obligated to ensure that he takes all reasonable steps to ensure that the dog does not injure, endanger or intimidate or otherwise cause distress to any person.

Wellington City Council must keep in mind the public interest test given the severity of the attack. It is in the public interest, where Wellington City Council believes that the dog, unmuzzled is a significant risk to the public and the possibility of an attack reoccurring.

Wellington City Council has a responsibility that members of the public are protected from aggressive animals that can and have caused serious harm.

Wellington City Council must be confident that no further harm will occur to members of the public and therefore require the menacing dog classification to remain.

Introduction:

The victim in this matter is [REDACTED] [REDACTED] does not know WOOD personally but has seen him and Lomu walking several times. The offending dog is "Lomu" who is a male, black and tan Rottweiler

At the time of the incident, he was currently registered to [REDACTED] but has now been changed into WOODS name.

Background:

Lomu is currently registered and has not come to the attention of Animal Services before.

Circumstances:

1. At around 1015hrs on Sunday 31st October 2021 WOOD was walking Lomu on Townsend Road.
2. He had his back to Lomu as he was picking up his faeces.
3. [REDACTED] was walking past him when Lomu jumped up, biting her left hand and pulling her to the ground
4. The injury was considered serious harm
5. [REDACTED] who initially called the incident through to WCC was driving with his friend [REDACTED] and saw that [REDACTED] was injured.
6. They stopped to see if they could help, and [REDACTED] took her straight to Wellington Hospital
7. [REDACTED] was transferred to the plastics unit at Hutt Hospital
8. She underwent surgery that evening
9. She stayed in hospital Sunday and Monday night and was discharged on Tuesday
10. Lomu was seized on 4th November 2021 and following a release request was returned to WOOD that afternoon. Lomu was released with a Menacing Classification

Scene:

The incident happened on Townsend Road near the intersection with Wilberforce Street, Miramar

Victim:

On 16th December 2021 [REDACTED] took a statement from [REDACTED] She advised:

1. That she was walking her usual route on Townend Road
2. That she saw WOOD and Lomu approx. 5-6 metres away from her, they were stationary
3. That she has walked past WOOD & Lomu numerous times without incident
4. That she does not recall if she stepped out into the road, but that she normally would when passing a dog
5. That as she passed them, Lomu jumped up at her, biting her left hand and dragging her to the ground
6. That WOOD pulled Lomu back quickly

7. That she believes WOOD took Lomu away and tied him up as when he came back to check on her, Lomu was not with him
8. That [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] were driving past and stopped to help
9. That [REDACTED] took her to Wellington hospital

10. That WOOD had visited her in the hospital to check on her and apologise
11. That she underwent surgery

12. That following the attack she was unable to drive for 2 months and is still in a great deal of pain
13. That she has been told that due to the nerve damage, the Dr's have told her it may never heal properly and her little finger may always be bent

1. He did not witness the attack
2. He was driving with his friend [REDACTED] and saw [REDACTED] clutching her hand and screaming
3. They pulled over and saw lots of blood on the pavement
4. They assisted her and [REDACTED] took her straight to Wellington Hospital
5. He stayed behind and spoke to WOOD.
6. WOOD told him that Lomu had never done anything like this before and that he had his back turned while picking up his poo when Lomu lunged at [REDACTED]
7. He noted that Lomu was calm and not behaving aggressively after the attack
8. He contacted Wellington City Council to report the attack

Alleged Offender:

After the attack was reported to WCC, ██████ spoke to WOOD on the phone. He confirmed what had happened. At the time, he was on his way to the hospital to check on ██████ On 4th November 2021 after advising that Lomu was to be seized, Colin brought him to the shelter and provided a statement. In it he advised:

- 1 That he was walking Lomu on leash and had his back to him while picking up his faeces.
- 2 That he felt a tug on the lead
- 3 That he turned and saw that Lomu had ██████ sleeve in his mouth
- 4 That he quickly pulled Lomu back and told him to let go, which he did. WOOD believes the action of pulling him back quickly may have been where most of the damage was done.
- 5 That he does not believe Lomu "attacked" ██████ more that he was going for the sleeve of her jersey
- 6 That he gave his details to ██████
- 7 That he visited ██████ in the hospital and had subsequent contact with ██████
- 8 That he offered to cover any medical expenses, travel bills etc.
- 9 That Lomu has never behaved like this before

Colin provided a release request advising that in order to ensure this type of incident does not happen again he will:

1. Muzzle Lomu when being walked. WOOD has suggested that the muzzle requirement be for a probationary period of 6 months to a year
2. Continue to walk him on leash
3. Keep him confined to his fully fenced property. The fenced area allows free access to the front door and WOOD also has a kennel and run.

1. Lomu was being walked on leash but while WOOD was distracted jumped up at and bit [REDACTED]
2. [REDACTED] was taken to hospital with a serious injury to her left hand
3. [REDACTED] will require further treatment and may never regain full use of the little finger
4. [REDACTED] has provided a signed, sworn statement
5. Lomu has not come to the attention of Animal Services before

It is my recommendation that WOOD be prosecuted under Section 57 of the Dog Control Act 1996 for owning a dog that attacked a person. I also recommend that WOOD receives an infringement under Section 53 of the DCA for failing to control Lomu in a public place.

1. On 31st October 2021 at around 1015hrs I went out for my daily walk. I left my house. I was walking on Townsend Road near the intersection of Wilberforce Street.
 2. I saw Colin around 5-6 metres away from me. He was on a grass verge on Wilberforce Street.
 3. I saw that he had a dog with him. Previously when I have seen him the dog appears to be on a lead. I can't be sure whether it was on or off lead at the time of the incident.
 4. They were stationery. I was walking on the path. I don't recall whether I stepped out into the road. I normally would if I pass a dog, but I do recall there being lots of cars parked on the road so may not have.
 5. As I passed the dog the dog must have rushed over to me and pulled me to the ground. I didn't see it jump at me, just remember it grabbing my hand.
 6. When I fell to the ground the dog still had my hand in its mouth.
 7. The dog released my hand. I was still on the ground.
 8. I saw that it was a very bad wound and think I could see the bone.
 9. I cannot remember what he said to me after the attack. He must have taken the dog and secured it as he came back without it. He didn't seem to know what to do.
 - 10.2 young men, [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] pulled up in their car. They came to help me. One of them said "does she need a tourniquet?"
 11. Colin took off his top and wrapped it around my hand.
 12. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] discussed calling an ambulance, but then decided to take me straight to the hospital. [REDACTED] drove me there.
 13. I can't remember anything said to me by Colin. [REDACTED] stayed behind and that is when he must have called the Council.
 14. When I got to the hospital, I went to the reception area and I got the impression that they knew I was coming, so someone may have called ahead.
 15. They started tending to the injury. My brother [REDACTED] had been contacted and he came to the hospital

16. Colin arrived at the hospital and was able to come in and see me. I don't remember a lot of what he said but I do remember him saying that the dog had never done anything like this before. He spoke to [REDACTED] more than me.
-
17. I had surgery that evening. I had to go out to Lower Hutt hospital. My brother drove me out.
-
18. The surgeon prepped me beforehand and told me that there was a possibility the finger may die. The surgery took around 3 hours.
-
19. They had to put 2 plates in the hand as the bones were fractured. I cannot bend the little finger at all.
20. I spent Sunday and Monday night in hospital and was discharged on Tuesday afternoon.
21. I have had 3 follow up consultations at the plastics unit in Lower Hutt. Each consult can take up to 4 hours with travel and waiting time.
22. The Dr's at the Hutt hospital have told me that because the nerves are damaged it may never heal properly and always be bent.
23. I must see the hand therapist weekly. I have been going once a week, but she has said I will need to go twice a week. She said if it doesn't heal after a certain time frame – I think she said 3-4 years; it may not ever heal properly. I am on pain relief, but I am still in a lot of pain. *months JL*
24. I am still unable to drive so must get someone to take me to my appointments
I don't know if I will need more surgery, they haven't indicated that I will.
I don't know when the consultations will stop.
25. The Dr's are also worried about the scarring as that can also make the skin tighter and more rigid.

Victim impact statement:

1. I live with my elderly parents and am their primary care giver. My mother has dementia.
2. The injury has made my life extremely hard. Most everyday tasks now take ~~me 3 times~~ ^{longer} ~~as long~~, or I can't do them at all _{NZ.}
3. As I am unable to drive, we now must get groceries delivered. This costs extra.
4. I am reliant on family and friends for transport to medical appointments
5. If and when I can drive again, I will likely have to change my car as I don't believe I will be able to pull up the handbrake. I will have to get a car with a pull button handbrake
6. I remember waking up after surgery and remember the pain being so intense. It wasn't going away. I asked for more pain relief. The nurse told me he couldn't give me anymore. I recall asking him to knock me out and not wake me up. I just wanted to black out.
7. I am aware that this will be a very long recovery time and I am still so worried that I may never regain use of the finger.
8. With all the follow up appointments, my days are taken up with them. I feel like I don't have time to do anything
9. The finger is still numb, and I have no temperature sensation in it. The finger also sticks out on an angle and gets in the way of anything I do. It is also still terribly swollen and may be so for up to a year. There are thick scars on my hand which are sore to the touch and are hampering finger recovery
10. I feel self-conscious about them
11. I attend a regular fitness class and the hand injury will significantly impeded participation if I can resume
12. I have changed my walking route as I do not want to see Colin or the dog again. I worry about what Colins reaction might be. This annoys me as it is a route I do regularly and enjoy.
13. The afternoon of the attack I was due to go to the Ballet but obviously could not attend. I have also got some events planned next year which I may not be able to attend as I can't drive and may still be in pain. I don't want to fly.

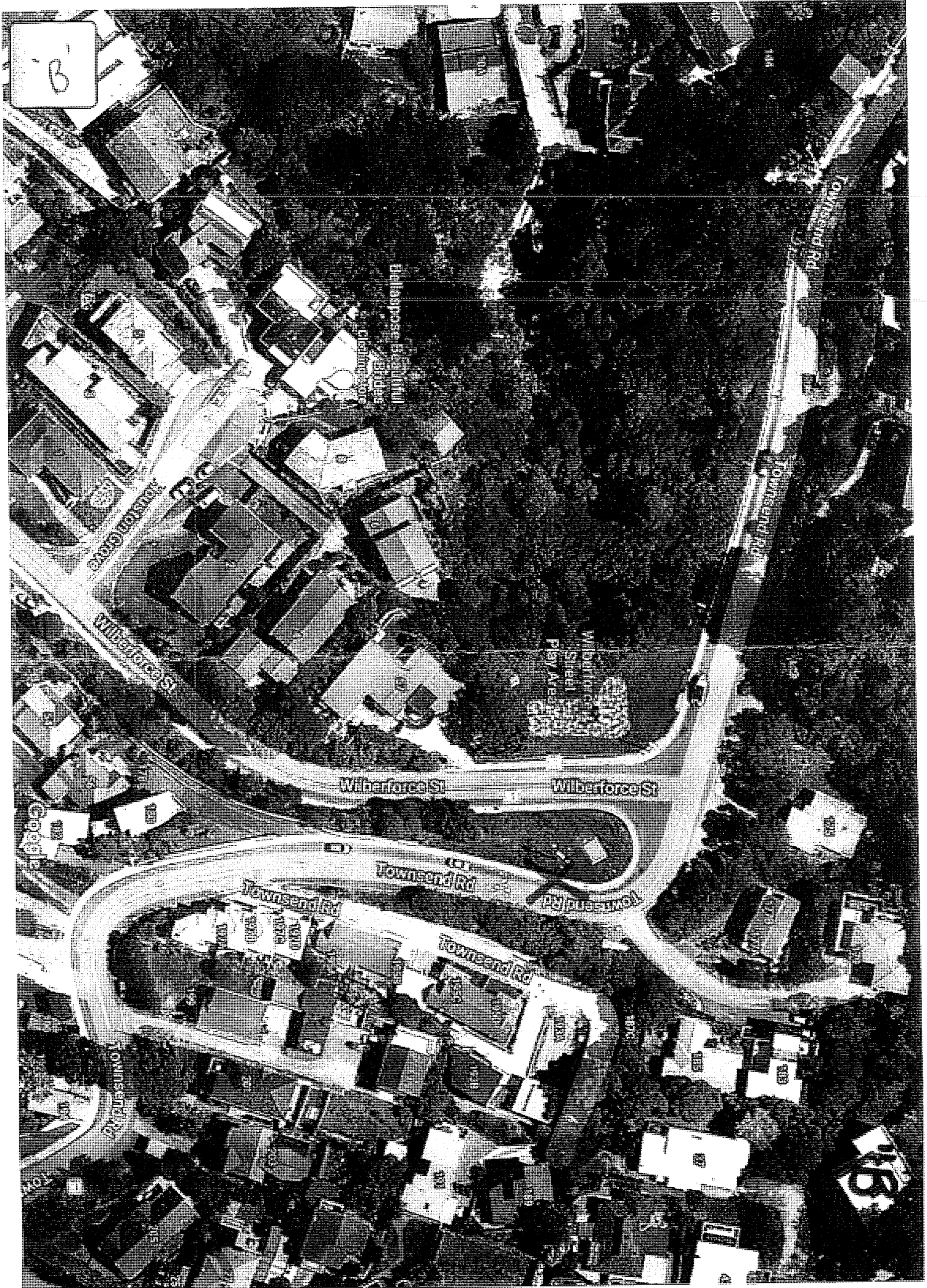

I GOT READY FOR WALK WITH LOMU. THIS ENTAILS OPENING FOOD BAGS, FILL UP WATER BOTTLE, GET LOMU TO HAVE DRINK. HEADED OFF FROM ATHON'S STREET THEN UP TOWNSEND ROAD. LOMU SEEMED TO BE HIS USUAL SELF DOING USUAL ACTIVITIES WALKED UP TO CNR WILBERSON STREET/TOWNSEND ROAD CROSSED THE ROAD FROM CHILDREN'S PARK TO THE CROSSED AREA OPPOSITE FROM THE PARK. LOMU HAD A SWIFF SOUND ON THE WAY THROUGH THE GRASS (NOT ON FOOTPATH). AT THIS POINT WE HAD PASSED APPROX 8 PEOPLE, BY WITH DOGS WITH NO PROBLEMS. LOMU STOPPED APPROX 1 TO 1 1/2 METRES FROM THE EDGE OF THE FOOTPATH AND WENT FOR A POO IN THE GRASS. WE HAVE BEEN DOING THE SAME WALK FOR NEARLY 3 YEARS NOW SO WE SEE A LOT OF THE SAME PEOPLE SOME ALMOST DAILY AND HAVEN'T COME CLOSE TO ANYTHING THAT HAPPENED NEXT. LOMU HAVEN'T ATTACKED ANOTHER HUMAN NOR DOG BEFORE NOW IN THE NEARLY FOUR YEARS IVE KNOWN HIM. AFTER HE POOED IVE HAD A LOOK AROUND FOR PEOPLE NEARBY. COULDN'T SEE ANYONE CLOSE IVE TAKEN A POO BAG OUT OF MY MAIN BAG AND KNELT DOWN IN THE GRASS WITH MY REAR TO THE FOOTPATH. FEELING A TUG ON THE LEAD I LOOKED OVER AT LOMU AND SAW HE HAD ██████████'S SLEEVE IN HIS MOUTH. HER SLEEVE WAS COVERING HER HAND. MY FIRST REACTION WAS TO PULL LOMU AWAY FROM ██████████ BEFORE CALLING TO HIM TO GET GO. WHICH HE DID (I BELIEVE THIS IS WHERE MOST OF THE DAMAGE TO ██████████'S HAND CAME FROM). I DON'T THINK LOMU ATTACKED ██████████ I THINK HE ONLY NOTICED ██████████ AS SHE APPROACHED US AT THE LAST MINUTE AND THE FIRST THING HE SAW WAS THE SLEEVE OF ██████████'S SLEEVE

Today I reviewed M [REDACTED] eight days after her operation. She has been progressing well since her discharge. She has completed her course of oral antibiotics but has noted some tingling sensations in the left little finger. She is right hand dominant. She is retired but does care for her elderly parents at home. The wounds have healed quite well today and the sutures were removed. There are no signs of infection. There is some bruising over the fracture areas. Today she reports reduced sensation on the ulnar side of the left little finger rather than the radial which does not correspond to the repair. She has also been reviewed by Dr [REDACTED] who is happy that sensation is present just reduced which may be due to swelling. She has flexion and extension present. She is still quite tender over the fracture sites.

X-rays today show good fixation and satisfactory bony alignment. The plan will be to start movement with hand therapy to continue with her ulnar gutter thermoplastic splints and we will review her in three weeks time to check her progress and assess her ability to commence driving at that stage as per Dr [REDACTED]

On Sunday the Sunday 31st October 2021 your dog Lomu did attack and injure a person while being walked in a public place.

Under section 57(2). The owner of a dog that makes an attack described in subsection 57(1) commits an offence and is liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$3,000 in addition to any liability that he or she may incur for any damage caused by the attack.

In response to your application dated 4th November 2021 Council has considered your request for the release of the dog:

“Lomu” Microchip # 956000005493488,

Under section 71(1)(d), Including the officers observations at an inspection on Thursday 4th November 2021;

- The property is fully fenced at the rear of your section with suitably high fencing.
- The dog can be confined to a kennel and run when at home alone.

Council decision is based on the above and a conditional release is approved.

These conditions are as follows.

1. Lomu will be classified as a Menacing dog under section 33A(1)(b)(i)
2. You must not allow Lomu to be at large or in any public place or private way (other than completely confined within a vehicle or cage) without the dog being muzzled in such a manner as to prevent the dog from biting but to allow it to breathe and drink without obstruction
3. Lomu must be kept under control at all times;


4. the dog will be kept on a lead at all times when off your property unless he is in a designated dog exercise area;
5. You will keep the dog adequately confined to your property, or the dog must be under the direct control of a person while on your property;
6. Any person in charge of the dog must also comply with this notice. If this dog is impounded, the person in charge may be subject to legal proceedings.
7. You will pay Council the full impound fees;
8. You will pay Council the sustenance fees owed of \$18.50 per day, the total of which will be calculated by Animal Services.

These conditions must be adhered to and signed in agreement.

He is a family dog not for protection or any other reason. Lomu only leaves the property to walk, get a wash, go to the vet. He is not left to roam the property without supervision otherwise he is tied on his lead on the deck. There is a separate fence allowing visitor's to approach the front door. The front of the property belongs to the cat. Lomu has walked the same walk for nearly three years now and we never had a problem except for this one time. we were approached unobserved at close quarters. Lomu didn't pull hard on his lead. I feel the responsibility falls on my shoulders . For a few seconds of inattention on my part scooping poo from the ground. I didn't see [REDACTED]

Lomu didn't attach her he is almost 60 kgs and if he attacked the outcome would have been totally different. These are two separate processes. The prosecution consideration is based on section 57, this is a council consideration. Injuries are outlined in Section 58.

57 Dogs attacking persons or animals

(1)

A person may, for the purpose of stopping an attack, seize or destroy a dog if—

(a)

the person is attacked by the dog; or

(b)

the person witnesses the dog attacking any other person, or any stock, poultry, domestic animal, or protected wildlife.

(2)

The owner of a dog that makes an attack described in subsection (1) commits an offence and is liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$3,000 in addition to any liability that he or she may incur for any damage caused by the attack.

(3)

If, in any proceedings under subsection (2), the court is satisfied that the dog has committed an attack described in subsection (1) and that the dog has not been destroyed, the court must make an order for the destruction of the dog unless it is satisfied that the circumstances of the offence were exceptional and do not warrant destruction of the dog.

Dogs causing serious injury

The owner of any dog that attacks any person or any protected wildlife and causes—

(a)

serious injury to any person; or

(b)

the death of any protected wildlife; or

(c)

such injury to any protected wildlife that it becomes necessary to destroy the animal to terminate its suffering,—

commits an offence and is liable on conviction to imprisonment for a term not exceeding 3 years or a fine not exceeding \$20,000, or both, and the court shall, on convicting the owner, make an order for the destruction of the dog unless satisfied that the circumstances of the attack were exceptional and do not justify destruction.

Where you have exercised your rights to appeal, under section 33 A is the classification of your dog, this is your consideration.

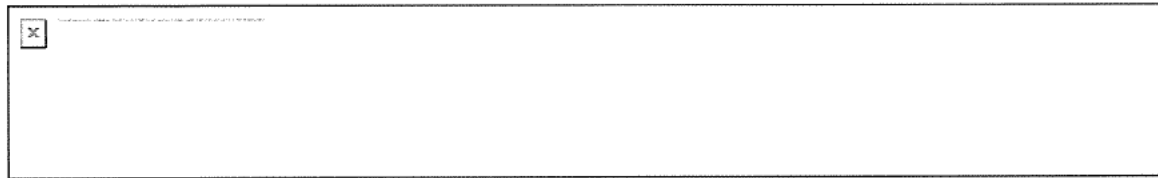



A description of the dog/owner

I think the dog was a Rottweiler. The owner was an older caucasian male.

What you saw

I was driving past with my friend when I saw [REDACTED] clutching her hand screaming with lots of blood dropping all over the pavement. The owner was tying the dog up at the time. We stopped the car and assisted her. The owner took off his sweatshirt and used it to stop the bleeding. He then helped her into my friends car who took her to the hospital. I did not see the actual attack.

If you had a conversation with the owner, what was said

I briefly asked him what happened and he said the she was walking past and the dog had lunged at her while his back was turned picking up the poo. He said it had never happened before.

Anything else you think may be important.

-The dog seemed to have calmed down once we got there and was not aggressive while we were tending to [REDACTED]

-I have family who live right where it happened and they have seen him and his dog before and often cross the street to avoid them and have suggested to me that the dog looks rather menacing.

-My mother in law saw the owner and his dog walking in the same place about a week after the attack and the dog was wearing a muzzle.

STATEMENT

On Sunday morning 31 October 2021 I received a distressed call from someone. At the time I didn't know who. The person was crying uncontrollably down the phone, so much that she could not even form words to say who it was or what had happened. 10 mins later I got a call from my brother who said he had received a call from [REDACTED] that she had been bitten by a dog whilst out on a walk and had been taken to the Emergency Department at Wellington Hospital by some bystanders who had witnessed the event.

When I arrived at ED [REDACTED] was being attended to by the ED physician to assess her injuries and to administer pain relief by way of intravenous analgesia and a local nerve block. She subsequently went to radiology for x-rays confirming she had sustained compound fractures to 2 bones in the left little finger.


Due to the nature of her wounds, she was subsequently transferred to Hutt Hospital under the care of the Plastic surgeon. Later that night she underwent 2 ½ hours of surgery to the finger which included exploration of the digital nerves and blood supply to that finger, plating of the 2 fractures bones and closure of the skin defect. She was later discharged home and remains under the care of the Plastic Surgery team and is undergoing Hand therapy to restore the function of the finger

During her time in the Emergency Department at Wellington Hospital, [REDACTED] was visited by [REDACTED] Senior Animal Control Officer. My understanding is that she was contacted by one of the gentlemen who had witnessed the event and taken her to ED. We were advised that the owner of the dog, Colin Wood was in the Department and was keen to see [REDACTED] and see how she was. He spoke to her on her own and I spoke to him afterwards. He said that this had never happened before, and he was at a loss as to why. He appeared genuinely concerned for her wellbeing. I phoned Colin later that evening to report her progress and that she would be going to theatre that night to salvage the badly damaged finger. The following day I also texted him to let him know that the surgery had gone well. He offered to send her flowers once she was discharged home which he subsequently did.

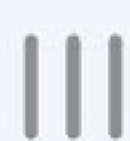
