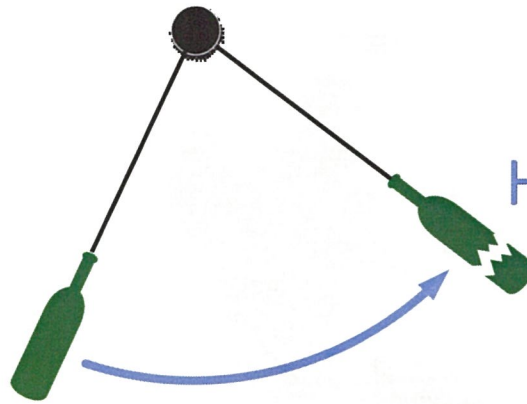

For teenagers most drinking happens in someone else's home.



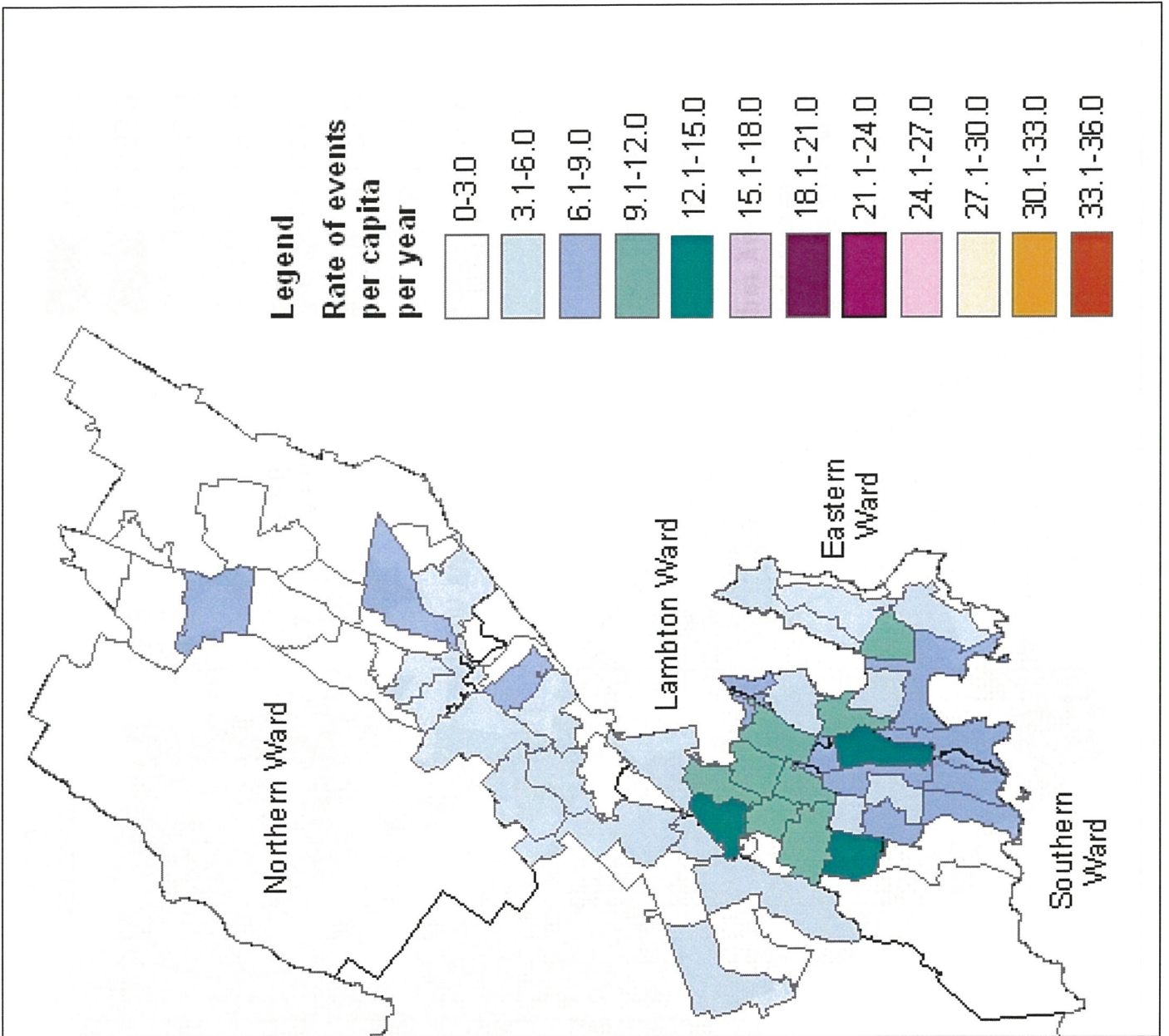

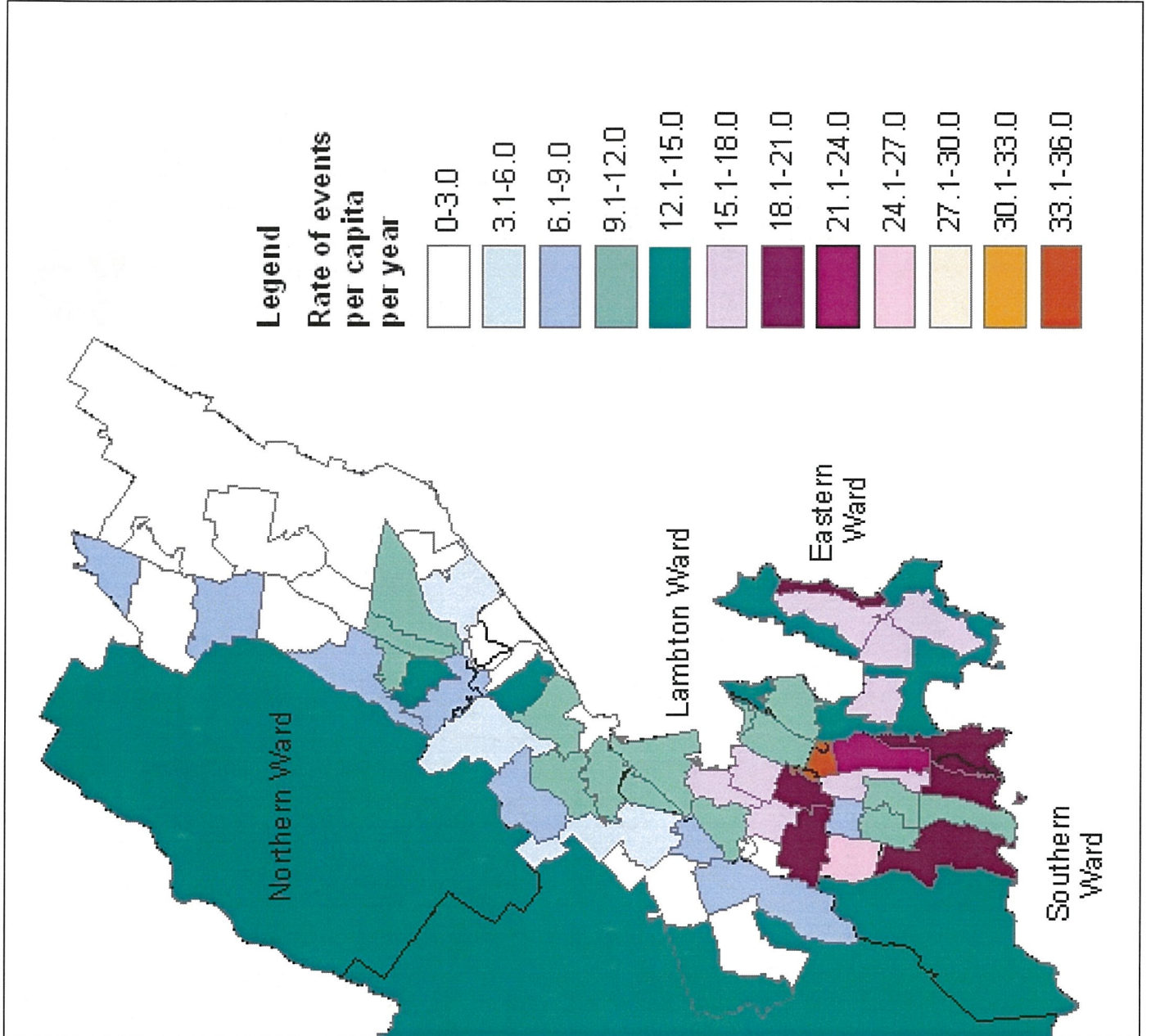

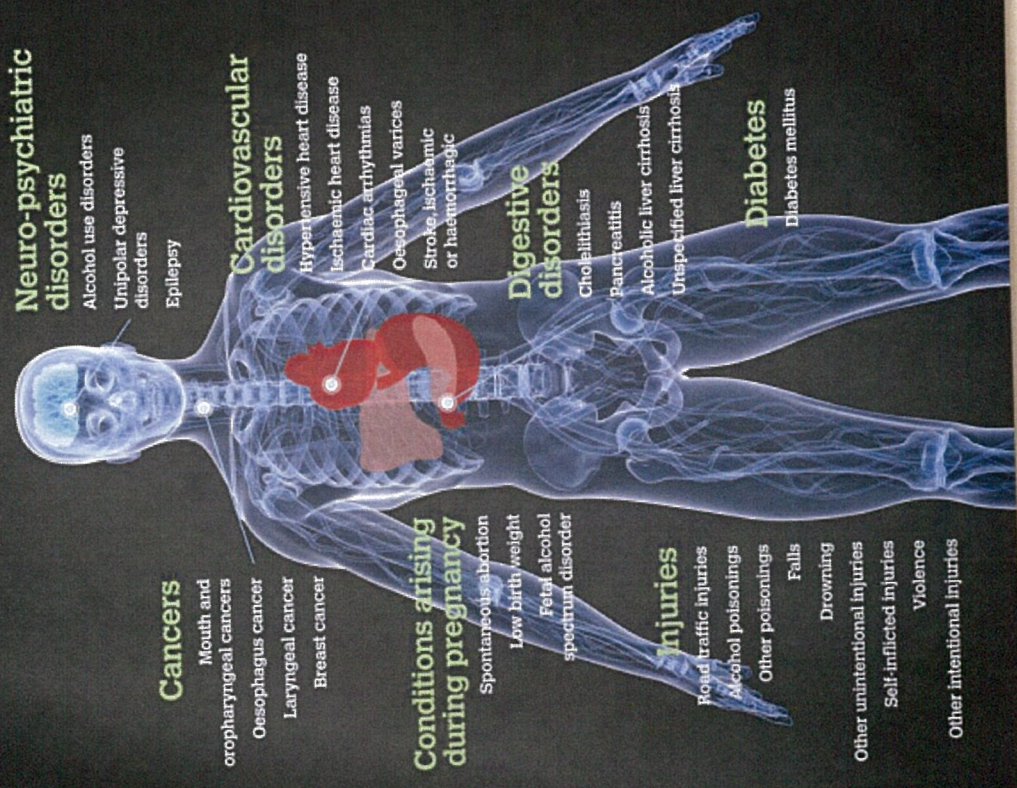

Alcohol-related conditions



What's the harm in getting drunk?

You might think that the biggest issue is a hangover the next day, but here is what research shows are some of the impacts of alcohol on us and our communities.

An estimated 3.8 percent of all global deaths and 4.6 percent of the global burden of disease (measured in disability-adjusted life-years) are attributable to alcohol (Rehm et al 2009).

In New Zealand, estimates indicate between 600 and 1,000 people die each year from alcohol-related causes (Connor et al., 2005).

More than half of alcohol-related deaths are due to injuries, one-quarter to cancer and one-quarter to other chronic diseases (Connor et al., 2005).

Between 18 and 35 percent of injury-based emergency department presentations are estimated to be alcohol-related, rising to between 60 and 70 percent during the weekend (Jones et al., 2009; Humphrey et al., 2003).

Fourteen percent of the population are predicted to meet criteria for a substance use disorder at some time in their lives (Wells et al., 2007).



Social costs

There have been a number of studies that estimate the cost of alcohol harm in New Zealand. No matter what methodologies are used they mostly agree that the annual cost of harmful alcohol use is in the billions. Previous estimates have ranged from \$735 million to \$16.1 billion.

- Root cause:
 - Binge drinking & pre-loading
 - Supermarkets drive down price
 - High accessibility:
 - Local proximity
 - Long trading hours

 1. Limit hours of sale
 - immediate effect
 - 9pm not enough for high risk areas
 2. Medium & longterm:
 - a) Density
 - caps & sinking lids
 - b) Sensitive locations
