Our keynote speaker is Colleen Fitzpatrick from California, USA, who will speak about cases she has been involved with in her role as a forensic genealogy consultant. Colleen emphasises that forensic genealogy enhances but does not replace conventional methods of research. As well as using DNA, Colleen explains how she uses photographs, databases, historical documents and all our familiar genealogical techniques to reveal fascinating family history case studies.

Other speakers include Tony Simpson on 'Edward Gibbon Wakefield, Karl Marx and Early Wellington', Jane Tolerton on 'Effie Rout, Guardian Angel of the Anzacs', Brad and Kathryn Patterson on 'Irish Soldiers Forgotten Migrants' and 25 others all with new and interesting presentations, including four from each of National Library and Archives New Zealand to talk about how to get the best from their collections.

Plus rooms full of computers where you can get help from representatives from your favourite website, and 'the Hub' with Interest Group, repository and help tables to assist you to get the best from your research.

If you would like to know more about family war medals you have, bring them along – people from the New Zealand Defence Force will be there to tell you their history.

Ariana football team

We are the Afghan football team; we are group of boys and men ageing from 14-30 years old in the Wellington Afghan Community who all have a refugee background. We started out as only a couple of boys trying to have a bit of fun in our spare time, as the community grew so did the number of boys wanting to join us to play. We sometimes reach up to 15-20 players and providing resources have become very difficult. All the boys are from Afghanistan and for most boys playing in this group is the only social activity that they have. The group started playing football together in 2006 and have been growing ever since.

All though we live in New Zealand, we were still refugees and this caused some boys to be unable to afford football gear. To solve this we helped each other with spare gear we had so that we could enjoy being together. Another problem was that we could not find proper fields to play or train because the costs of booking proper fields were high. We look places to play each week as each park or field might be occupied. We use our bags or spare shoes to make goals so that we can play some football. Although we had all these problems we still managed to stay together and even some boys were able to enter local clubs or school clubs. Some boys even reached the highest team in schools such as 14A, 15A and even 1st and 2nd XI grades.

Some achievements were also made by the team as whole by being able to participate in tournaments in recent years. These tournaments included culture kick which was funded by Wellington City Council and the team has gone as far as winning the tournament in 2013. Another recent triumph for the team was that some boys entered the indoor soccer tournament at Victoria University and they managed to win that as well.

Because of the passion and commitment that the boys as a group have shown, we have decided to seek for funds to try and improve the team so that we could go further and achieve more and better goals in life.

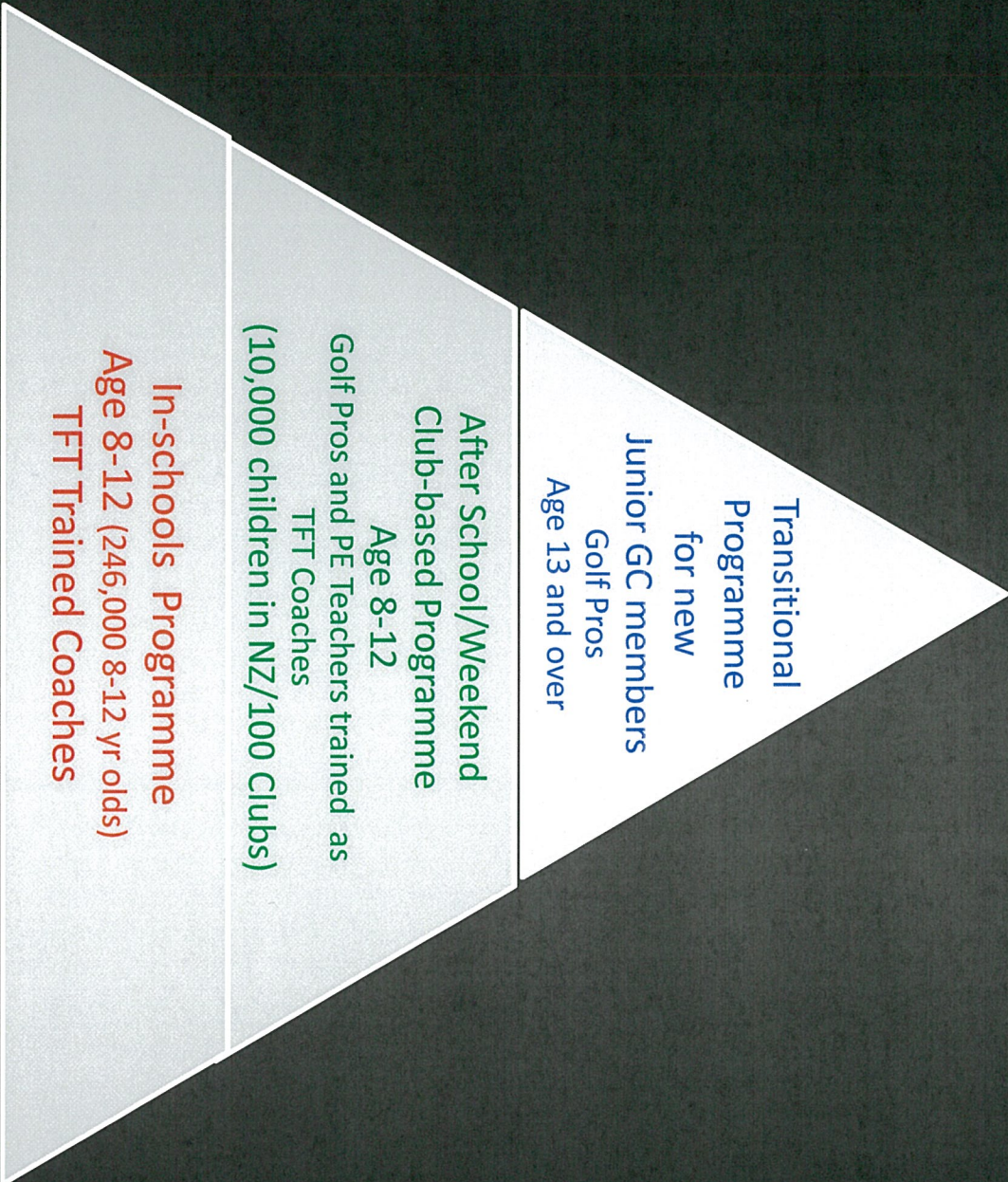

It's time to talk about you for a change - not your baby, not your parenting skills, but you.

Motherhood can be exciting and rewarding, yet can be equally isolating and challenging.

For over 30 years Mothers Network has been bringing mums together in discussion groups all over Wellington. We also create community online, through our events and through employment opportunities that are suited to busy mums.

- Meet in the daytime (with babysitters) or in the evening
- Focused on your needs
- Topics selected by the group
- 2 trained facilitators guide the discussion
- Most groups continue to meet once the course has finished.
- Our online community and events keep you in touch and supported.
- Cost around \$40 but no one is excluded if they cannot pay.

Sales of Fairtrade products continue to grow around the world. Recently Fairtrade International (FLO) released 'Monitoring the Scope and Benefits of Fairtrade 2012'. By the end of 2011, the total number of small-scale farmers in the Fairtrade system reached 1.24 million with a 26% increase in sales revenues on Fairtrade terms. There was strong growth in cocoa and sugar between 2010 and 2011. The Fairtrade Premium received by smallholder cocoa farmers increased 89%. 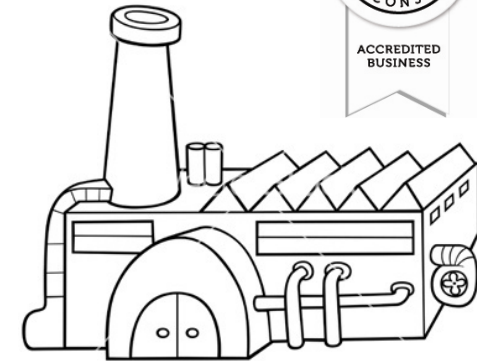

What is Recycling?

Recycling gives potentially valuable resources a second life, rather than throwing them into a landfill. In New Zealand it is possible to recycle paper, plastics, glass, aluminium and tin.

Benefits

Every year we dump about 3.2 million tonnes of waste in NZ landfills, about a third of which could be recycled. Sending waste to landfill is bad for the environment because it produces leachates and emissions which pollute water ways, contribute to climate change and can make people sick. Recycling helps conserve resources and means less energy is required to produce new materials.

Costs

The costs of recycling varying on a case by case basis, depending on volumes and location. However on average, the collection of a general landfill waste bin will cost you slightly more than the collection of a comingled recycling bin. Ask our *recycling suppliers* for the current pricing on their recycling services. Although recycling won't increase your financial costs, you will need to spend time: educating your staff to put the recyclables in the right bins; and ensuring the recyclables are not contaminated with food. You will also need to allow additional space for multiple bins.

- Find out what materials can be recycled in your region: *Auckland, Waikato, Wellington, Christchurch and Target Sustainability, Dunedin*

- *Waste audits*: If you are keen to cut down your waste you might find it useful to first review your café's waste generation by carrying out a waste audit.

Smart Waste Management

Smart waste management involves avoiding waste at source, minimising the use of harmful chemicals, reusing materials and, as a last resort, recycling or disposing of waste in a responsible manner.

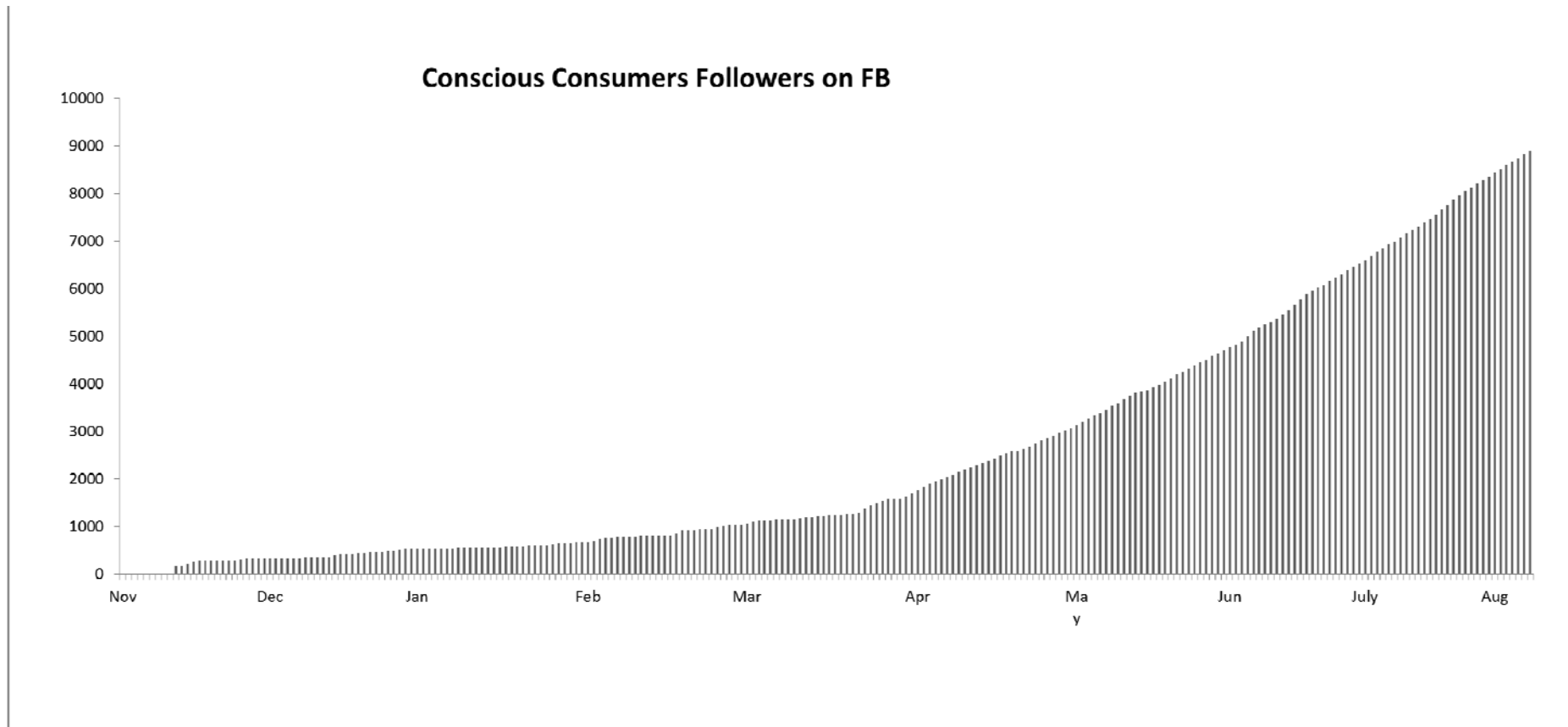

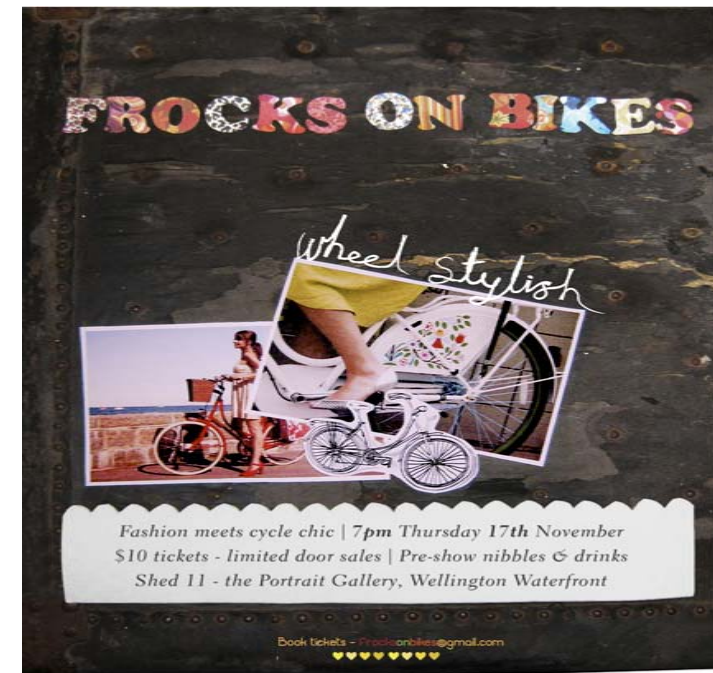
